Oregon To Spend Million More On Urban Highways
SALEM — An extra \$1,070,000 for urban highway projects will be spent in Oregon in the fiscal year starting July 1 as a result of the highway bill which President Eisenhower signed Wednesday. Forrest Cooper, deputy state highway engineer, said Thursday. The new law itself provides an extra 19 millions of road building for Oregon. Cooper said the urban \$1,070,000 portion will be spent for extensions of primary and secondary highways on existing routes through cities.

Holmes, Wallace Disagree Over Cutting Of Expenses

PORTLAND — Gov. Robert Holmes Thursday said the only areas in which Oregon could cut its expenses are in education, welfare and "institutions."

"And as long as I am governor, I will not recommend such cuts," Holmes said, as he and the other two men seeking the Democratic nomination for governor appeared on the same program.

Another candidate, Lew Wallace of Portland, replied that "The governor's statement is a lot of baloney."

Wallace said "The people of the state of Oregon have gone crazy spending money. Our officials don't talk about how to economize. They talk about new ways to raise taxes."

In his brief speech to the Jane Jefferson Club of Democratic Women, Holmes said his administration developed the state's first department for economic planning and development.

Expanding Industry
"Its members have been working diligently to expand our present industry and get more," the governor said as he discussed anti-recession measures.

"Oregon was the only state in the union to call a special session to deal with a tax surplus last year, resulting in a tax cut of nearly 20 per cent," Holmes said. Holmes also advocated a state treasury surplus of 50 million dollars.

This also drew criticism from Wallace, a former state legislator. "There's not one thing in the Constitution that says we should create a surplus. I believe any taxpayer could go into court and de-

mand his share of the surplus," Wallace said.

Sentiment Like GOP's
The governor replied: "Wallace's sentiment is that expressed by the Republicans in the Legislature. They would have us move into the next biennium facing a possible tax increase of 60 per cent."

The other Democratic candidate to appear on the program was Wiley Smith, the Multnomah County assessor. Smith said he also is interested in taxes and finances and urged that property taxes be snipped in half for homeowners.

Too many business firms, he said, have been getting too many allowances.

"Over the past four years one The Reynolds Metals Co.—has had its taxes reduced over \$700,000 because of differences in assessed valuation," he said, blaming the state Tax Commission for revising the assessments he made.

Dr. and Mrs. H. Dean Hoskins have three other girls, Judith, 14, Barbara, 12, and Martha Jean, 6. Dr. Hoskins is 40 and his wife Dorothy is 38.

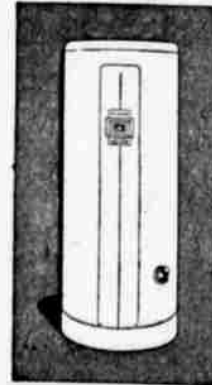
