"We're so very, very happy," the singer exclaimed yesterday in confirming a reconciliation during an interview.

Miss Garland said she and Luft will leave for the West Coast next week to get their children, and then return to New York to settle down here. She said Luft plans to produce a new play on Broadway next season.
