West Downs East In Pro Cage Series

SEATTLE — Cliff Hagan, the Kentuckian with the velvet touch, tallied 27 points Sunday night and paced the West All-Stars to a 133-113 basketball victory over the East. The win gave the West a 4-3 edge in the series between the touring professionals.

The West was in charge all the way, and held a 67-49 lead at half-time.

On Saturday night Carl Braun of New York led the East to a 129-125 victory at Vancouver, Wash. Big Bill Russell of Boston, former San Francisco U. star who was injured in the NBA title series, saw his first action during the exhibition tour.

Klamath Falls Bowler In ABC All-Events Lead

SAN FRANCISCO — Larayne Harris of Klamath Falls, Ore., Sunday showed the type of bowler that has won for her numerous Klamath Falls city tournament honors and Oregon state laurels as well as honorable mention on the 1956-57 all-Pacific Coast team.

Miss Harris scored 554 for three games at doubles, 374 in singles and 520 with the Payless Drugs team for the lead in the first all events compilation since the Woman's International Bowling Congress tournament opened last Thursday.

Larayne's 1,848 score undoubtedly will fall far short of the ultimate winning total, inasmuch as the 1957 crown went to Anita Cantaline of Detroit, Mich., with 1,859.

Miss Harris' partner, Mary Bothwell, scored 493 to give them the doubles lead at 1,047, but Larayne's 574 was eight pins short of a tie for first place with June O'Brien, San Francisco, at singles.

SEATTLE — The University of Washington scored an 84-47 Pacific Coast Conference track victory in the rain Saturday over the University of Idaho Vandals.

The meet was featured by Dan Mitchell's record breaking javelin toss which gave the Huskies first place in that event, and by Jack Larson's upset victory over Idaho's Frank Wyatt in the mile run.

Mitchell threw the javelin 195 feet 4 inches, bettering the old meet record of 191 feet 1 inch set by Idaho's Paul Hanson two years ago.

Oregon Wins 26th Dual Meet In Row

EUGENE, Ore. — Oregon won its 26th straight Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference dual track meet Saturday as sophomore Dave Edstrom led the Ducks to a 71-59 victory over Washington State.

Edstrom won one event and picked up vital points in others. He breezed over the high hurdles in the winning time of 1:33.0. Then he went on to place second in the broad jump, to tie for second in the high jump and to win third in the shot.

Steve Frye of Washington State was the meet's lone double winner, tossing the discus 152 feet, 8 inches and hurling the shot 54 feet, 1/2 inch to break the meet record of 51 feet, 8 1/2 inches set in 1956 by teammate Burl Grinos.

Stanley Cup Goes To Montreal Again

BOSTON — The mighty Montreal Canadiens returned home with hockey's coveted Stanley Cup for the third straight year Monday after a pressure-filled championship series with Boston's battling Bruins.

"I guess we'll be in the same trouble next year — everyone will pick us to win by a lot of games," said Coach Toe Blake.

The Canadiens triggered a pair of goals in the first two minutes and held on for a 5-3 triumph and the championship Sunday night in the sixth game of the best of seven competition.

The two goal margin in the win was the same by which Montreal outscored underdog Boston — 16-14 — in the series.
