As a lull before the storm, the only game played last night in the National League was homerless. The Cincinnati Redlegs beat Philadelphia 4-2 in a rain-interrupted 14 innings.

A walk and singles by Don Hoak and pinchhitter Bob Thurman broke up a 2-2 tie for the Redlegs in the 14th and they added a cushion run on a pair of errors by Philly shortstop Roy Smalley.

The Chicago White Sox may have the best pitching in the American League with a staff that has seven starters, but what Manager Al Lopez could use at the moment is a starter who can finish.

Dick Donovan blew a four-hit shutout in the last two innings for a 2-1 Detroit victory yesterday.

The New York Yankees won their sixth straight, defeating Boston 4-1. Kansas City, in second place 1 1/2 games back of the Yanks, collected eight runs on two hits in the eighth and beat Cleveland 9-4.

White Sox hitters were no help to Donovan. They got just three hits off Frank Lary in his eight innings, scoring without a hit when he walked two and hit two in the sixth. Vito Valentini won in relief.

The Red Sox lost their fourth straight, although getting 10 hits and six walks. Don Larsen, who hit a two-run homer in the second off loser Willard Nixon, won his second. Ted Williams, who singled for his first hit in 10 at-bats this season in the fifth, hit his 457th

home run in the seventh off Bob Grim. Whitey Ford wrapped it up with clutch relief.

Five walks, a single and Frank House's grand-slam homer gave the A's their big eighth against rookie Jim (Mudcat) Grant and losing reliever Steve Ridzik.

Singing Career Attracts Althea

NEW YORK (AP) — This may be the last year of big-time tennis for Althea Gibson.

Thenceforth if you want to see the gangling Negro net queen, don't go to Forest Hills. Just flip your television dial.

She now seems more interested in a singing career.

"I can't say exactly what my future plans will be," the 30-year-old Harlem girl said after returning from a spring tour of the Southern tournaments. "I love to sing. I'll just have to wait and see how things turn out."

Althea is booked for a singing appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show May 25, shortly before she takes off for England to defend her Wimbledon crown. She'll make another appearance on the same show July 15.

The TV debut will coincide with release of a new recording. Althea has a deep, throaty voice and specializes in pop numbers.

Asked what her plans might be if she happened to make a favorable showing on TV, she smiled.

"What do you mean 'if I happen to make a favorable showing'?" she asked indignantly. "This is a big chance for me. I fully intend to make a hit."

But what about Wimbledon and her American title? Has her show business aspirations cut into her tennis career?

"I am going to Wimbledon and I plan to play in the United States Championships at Forest Hills," she said. "Furthermore, I will win at Wimbledon again, also I'll win at Forest Hills."

Northwest Described Only Half Grown, But Potential Regarded Beyond Measure

SPOKANE (AP) — A New York economist Monday described the Pacific Northwest as only half grown and said "the growth potential borders on the immeasurable."

Robert H. Ryan, director of area development for the national Committee for Economic Development, said it is reasonable to assume that the population of the Northwest will double in the next 15 years.

"This will give great opportunity to the region, for with this population increase will come the markets close at hand which the Pacific Northwest needs," he told the Pacific Northwest Trade Assn.

"In a very real sense, the Pacific Northwest has a great advantage in that it is only half grown; that the present economic difficulties which the rest of the nation is now experiencing came a bit earlier in the Northwest, and that you are fortunately endowed with those elements which make for growth in the chemical and other process industries that are in their early development stages."

Cancer Control Depends On Early Stage Discovery

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A common type of cancer in women, which stays hidden for the first 10 years and then spreads quickly, can be fairly well controlled if caught when its first symptoms appear, a New York City surgeon reported here.

Ten years after operation, as many as 85 per cent of the women are alive in the cases in which the degree of malignancy is low. Where the cancer cells are widely malignant, only 20 per cent of the patients survive 10 years or more.

If medical science had a good hidden cancer during its decade of hibernation, a very high percentage of cures could be produced, said Dr. Carl T. Javert.

Dr. Javert addressed the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. He reported on 400 cases covering 20 years of practice.

This malignancy is cancer of the endometrium or inner lining of the womb.

Bleeding which cannot be otherwise accounted for is the most common symptom. But there could be some way of detecting it before this stage, Dr. Javert said.

Woman Awaiting 2nd Child To Wed Convict By Proxy

EVERETT (AP) — Mrs. Katherine Meyers, 21, plans to go to Walla Walla to try to marry convicted kidnaper George Edward Collins as soon as the couple's second child is born, she said Monday.

Mrs. Meyers said she assumed prison authorities would give permission for the ceremony since a marriage license application bearing Collins' notarized signature had been sent her from the prison. However, no prison official had signed the paper, she added.

Warden Bob Rhay has said prison policy would prevent the marriage, but indicated that officials would have no authority over a proxy ceremony.

However, Snohomish County auditor George Dubuque, from whom Mrs. Meyers obtained a marriage license Friday, said proxy marriages are not considered legal in the state.

If prison authorities refuse to allow the marriage, Mrs. Meyers said, she will attempt to obtain permission from her parole officer to leave the state for a proxy ceremony.

The 21-year-old Collins was convicted of second-degree kidnapping in the abduction of Lee Cray, 8, last September.

Mrs. Meyers, who is expecting her baby shortly, was given a one-year suspended sentence for her part in the kidnapping.

Child Dislocates Jaw In Discipline Howl

SPOKANE (AP) — Four-year-old Kathy Woolf, disciplined for misconduct at the breakfast table Monday, opened wide, let loose with a howl and brought out the State Patrol. She had dislocated her jaw.

Officer John Miltman was called and took the child to a hospital where doctors reset the bones and put her lips back together for a forgiving kiss at home.

Libel Suit Over Broadcast Opens

WALLA WALLA (AP) — The first trial in this state of one of a series of libel and damage suits by Mrs. Pearl Wamamaker over a 1956 radio broadcast opened here Monday.

Mrs. Wamamaker, former state superintendent of public instruction, asked \$175,000 damages of Walla Walla radio station KJL for a broadcast by commentator Fulton Lewis Jr.

She also has sued a number of other stations in Washington state, Maryland, Washington, D.C., and Oklahoma for a total of more than two million dollars.

All the stations carried the Mutual network broadcast in which Lewis linked Mrs. Wamamaker with Communism. He later acknowledged over the air he had made the "world's greatest boob" and apologized to Mrs. Wamamaker for the mistake.

Still awaiting trial in this state are suits for \$250,000 against station KVI in Seattle and \$350,000 against KNEW in Spokane.

The only previous trial of one of Mrs. Wamamaker's suits was early this year in Baltimore where a federal jury deadlocked after 7 1/2 hours deliberation. She had sought \$500,000 from three Maryland stations. The former educator has not indicated whether she will seek a retrial.

Mrs. Wamamaker contends in her suits that the Lewis broadcast defamed her character, held her up to public ridicule and caused her much pain.

In his broadcast the commentator connected Mrs. Wamamaker with a Sequim, Wash., man who had been identified at a congressional hearing as a former Communist.

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
