

Rudie Sinfonietta Proves Delightful Musical Group

Talented instrumentalists combined with the delightful voices of two young vocalists to give Roseburg music enthusiasts a highly entertaining evening Tuesday at Central Junior High School auditorium.

Robert Rodie directed his ensemble, known as The Rudie Sinfonietta, through two hours of music that his audience was reluctant to leave him gave the audience just about everything it could ask for, ranging from the opening Haydn's symphony No. 14 in A major to Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical comedy favorites.

He himself entertained with the violin, accompanied by harpist Cynthia Otis in a special number, Saint-Saens' "Fantasy," which, he said, they had not played since leaving New York.

But with all due credit to the instrumentalists and to the able direction of Rudie himself, perhaps the highlight of the evening was the singing of the two vocalists: Petite and very attractive Phyllis Williams, soprano, and of good looking baritone Robert Kirkham.

Kirkham also was well received.

Publisher Says People Will Turn Recession

NEW YORK — The tide against the recession will be turned by a confident American people, fully informed of the facts, William Dwight, president of the American Newspaper Publishers Assn., said today.

Dwight, publisher of the Holyoke (Mass.) Transcript-Telegram, took sharp issue with anyone who would suppress recession news. "A constructive and confident attack on the recession cannot be made by throwing sand in the public's eyes or by asking it to bury its head like an ostrich," Dwight told the association's annual convention in a prepared address.

"From all sides the people are being asked to show confidence, but who is showing confidence in the people? The newspapers are when they lay the facts before them."

Clouds Shrouding Hills Hamper Plane Search

PENDLETON — Clouds shrouding hills on the western fringe of the Blue Mountains, south of here, as five search planes took off Wednesday morning in quest of a missing Fresno, Calif., flier and his wife.

Twenty-seven planes from five towns joined in the hunt Tuesday for Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Davis, who were en route from Fresno to Spokane. The searchers flew through snow squalls and were forced by low clouds from probing some of the higher elevations. They had no better weather Wednesday.

There were reports that a plane was heard in clouds southwest of here at 3:30 p.m. Monday, about the time Davis sent a radio message saying he was lost in clouds. Wednesday's search was to be concentrated in that area.

The plane was heard circling Topper Guard Station, southeast of Heppner. Jim Huddleston at Mitchell said that as he worked on a hillside above the town Monday he heard a plane which sounded as though it were circling Sutton Mountain, where snow was falling.

Sen. McClellan Demands Union Clean Up Local

WASHINGTON — The Senate Rackets Committee today asked court-appointed monitors for the Teamsters International Union to clean up Local 107 in Philadelphia.

The request was made by Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) in a letter to Chief Judge Nathan Cayton of the District of Columbia Municipal Court, chairman of the three-member monitor board.

The monitors were named to check up on operations of the international union as the outgrowth of a court suit challenging the election of James R. Hoffa as president last year.

McClellan said hearings of his committee "in no way indicate a complete disregard of the rights of rank-and-file members of this union by Raymond Cohen, the secretary-treasurer, and his fellow officials."

Immortal Bard Of Avon Honored In England

STRATFORD ON AVON, England — Flags of 91 nations flew in the streets of this English town today to commemorate the birthday of the native son who put it on the map.

Scholars and diplomats trooped amid pageantry and pomp to place wreaths on the grave of William Shakespeare, immortal bard of Avon.

As usual there were requests and appeals. Trinity Church was opened to establish the true authorship of works signed "Shakespeare."

The petitioners were members of the Francis Bacon Society, dedicated to the proposition that Bacon, not Shakespeare, was the real bard.

Said the canon of Trinity Church: "The grave certainly will not be opened."

House Group Votes Cut In Foreign Aid Arms

WASHINGTON — The House Foreign Affairs Committee voted Wednesday to cut next year's arms aid to friendly nations 100 million dollars below President Eisenhower's \$1,800,000,000 request.

Acting Chairman Morgan (D-Pa.) announced the committee action, its first vote on the total \$3,900,000,000 program Eisenhower wants for strengthening the free world during the year starting July 1.

Morgan said the administration opposed cut curbed by a close vote of around 15-12 in closed session. Morgan himself supported the slash.

Parker Murder Case Ready For Jury Today

PORTLAND — The case of Lee Parker, accused of murdering a man, dumping his body into a well, and covering it with lime was to go to a Multnomah County circuit court jury Wednesday.

Parker, 31, is accused of killing Robert E. Holloway, 44, last October. The body was found in a well near Vernonia in December.

Parker, who was on the witness stand Tuesday, denied any knowledge of how Holloway met his death.

He said the last time he saw Holloway was on Oct. 28, in a Portland tavern. That was the last time Holloway was seen alive, other witnesses said.

Parker said he had been a good friend of Holloway.

Indonesians Push Toward Rebels

JAKARTA — Indonesian government forces pressed closer to the rebel center of Bukittinggi from all directions Wednesday but progress was slow.

Three forces moved toward Bukittinggi from the south, one from the east and another from the north.

The rebels are said to have dug in at Solok, about 50 miles south of Bukittinggi. One government column moved toward Solok from Indragiri, captured Monday. Jakarta said 44 rebels surrendered with their arms when troops captured a bridge east of Indragiri.

Another government column advancing toward Bukittinggi along a coastal road reached Lubuklingung, 35 miles southwest of the rebel center.

A rebel radio in Sumatra heard in Singapore said Bukittinggi twice has been bombed by government planes.

"It is quite clear," the broadcast asserted, "that the pilots were unfamiliar with Bukittinggi and we believe that they were not Indonesian but Russian pilots."

Greenish-Blue Object Observed

A greenish-blue object showing a trail of sparks streaked across Pacific Northwest skies Tuesday night. Radio and police switchboards were swamped with telephone calls.

First report came from Everett, Wash., at 9:07 p.m. and one Everett man, Dennis Lundberg, reported it was bright enough to light up the roof of his home.

Another report, two minutes later, came from Aberdeen, Wash., and witnesses said it was traveling south to north. It also was sighted at nearby Hoquiam and Westport.

The object also was seen at Rainier, Ore., where Ira Mitchell said it moved across the sky from east to west.

Officers at Paine Air Force Base near Everett said the object was not sighted there and declined further comment.

Bulgarian Family Escapes To Greece

ATHENS, Greece — Riding a 1927 model Chrysler fitted with a periscope and armor of concrete slabs, five members of a Bulgarian family raced across the Yugoslav border today to seek political asylum in Greece.

The car was driven by Traiko Tamiano Ivanoff, 50, of Sofia. With him were his wife, 36, and three sons, aged 19, 15 and 14.

The Ivanoffs said they planned their escape for a year. They got permission from the Bulgarian authorities to visit relatives at Monastir, Yugoslavia, close to the Greek border. There they secretly fitted the concrete to the auto and installed the periscope so it could be driven living down as a further protection from bullets.

When the preparations were complete, Ivanoff packed his family aboard and headed for the frontier. Ignoring guards' signals, he smashed through a road barrier at full speed. Greek guards took the family to Sionika.

Queen Turns Down Movie Stars' Mix

LONDON — Queen Elizabeth II has turned down her invitation to this year's Royal Command Film Performance, ending an annual tradition of glittering nights at which the world's movie stars met Britain's royal family.

But with the glitter of the occasions went stinging criticisms of the bosoms and the bloopers that have often dominated the royal presentations.

The queen in a letter to film chiefs Tuesday, said she cannot attend this year because she wants to spend her limited time among a wider field of charities.

But British newspapers Wednesday recalled some past criticism of the handling of the royal shows.

There were plenty when voluptuous stars curtsied before their majesties in low-cut gowns chosen to please photographers more than royals.

There also have been rows over the choice of films, the biggest in 1954 when the queen was shown the Hollywood-made "Beau Brummel," in which the drooling madness of one of her royal ancestors was shown.

Brothers Who Demanded Women To Strip Caught

DALLAS, Tex. — Two brothers charged with holding up a redneck saloon and forcing some 18 women to strip at gunpoint are in custody here.

Billy Lambert, 22, and Clifton Lambert, 21, were picked up in a stolen auto. Sheriff's officers said they were being questioned about several other crimes.

The brothers got \$111 in the hold-up Monday night and one woman was struck across the face by a pistol. The clients and women employees at the saloon were forced to strip, but no one else was harmed.

Tornado Slams Block Into House, Killing Boy

SUMMERTON, S.C. — A tornado slammed a concrete block into a house Tuesday, crushing a 5-year-old boy to death.

The child's sister, sitting beside him, suffered only a scratch on the leg.

Mrs. Janey Carter said she, Willie and Emily Ann, 4, were watching the storm through the window of their concrete block tenement house on a farm near here. The tornado smashed a hole right through the house.

Hop-scotching tornadoes, hail storms and rain squalls slashed across other parts of South Carolina, doing thousands of dollars of damage to the state's multi-million-dollar peach crop.

First Trip To Moon To Be Boring Experience

PHILADELPHIA — The man who makes the first trip to the moon is going to be bored stiff.

That's the consensus of six Navy enlisted men who finished a simulated seven-day voyage to the moon Tuesday at the Philadelphia Navy Yard.

They worked, ate, slept and made feeble attempts to amuse themselves in a cramped, two-compartment space chamber.

They said they had little time for games because one man rested at any one time while the others worked.

The serious purpose of the test was to find out how men would stand a long flight in a cramped space craft.

Lana's Daughter Before Juvenile Court Thursday

LOS ANGELES — The question of what to do about Lana Turner's 14-year-old daughter Cheryl — admitted slayer of her mother's boy friend — comes before juvenile court Thursday.

These are the possibilities that could result from the closed hearing:

Cheryl could be restored to her mother's custody; placed in the custody of her father, Steve Crane, or her grandmother, Mrs. Mildred Turner, placed in a foster home, or committed to a state institution.

Lana and her former husband, Crane, have said they are going to fight for her release.

In the latest development in the sensational case, Lana, Crane and Cheryl have been sued for \$750,000 damages for Stompanato's death.

The action was filed on behalf of Stompanato's 10-year-old son, John III of Hammond, Ind. He lives with his mother, Sarah Ibrahim, first of Stompanato's three wives.

Stompanato was stabbed in the abdomen in Lana's Beverly Hills home April 4.

Heavy Wet Snow Falls In Utah

Heavy wet snow fell through Tuesday night in northern Utah and piled up a record 19 inches by the time of the morning rush hour in Salt Lake City. The soggy mass stalled autos and brought a rash of minor accidents.

The 10-inch measurement was at the Salt Lake airport. The Weather Bureau said 124 inches was piled up at the federal building in the heart of the city.

However, there were only four inches at Ogden, 40 miles to the north and none at Provo, 35 miles to the south.

Snowfall amounted to eight inches in Sheridan, Wyo., and five inches in Lander, Wyo., and Livingston, Mont.

Stock raisers were warned of northerly winds and snow in western South Dakota, western Nebraska and northwestern Kansas.

Douglas County Adds \$2,637 To Heart Fund
