

Court Approves Order For Leasing Park Area

The Douglas County Court has issued an order approving lease of a portion of Susan Creek State Park to the Bureau of Public Roads.

The bureau requested the site for use as a stockpile area and temporary paving plant in connection with construction of the North Umpqua Highway. The lease will remain valid for as long as the bureau needs the site, said the court order.

The leased portion of the park is located east of Idlewild Park.
