

Only About Half Precincts Have Candidates For Seats; Appointments Await Voting

Out of the 98 Douglas County precincts, only 48 Republican and 47 Democrats have filed for precinct committee and committee members.

After the May primary, vacancies in precincts will be filled by appointment. Chairmen of the central committees will make the appointments if write-in votes are not cast to elect committeemen and women.

The only contests are found in the Democratic party where in two precincts men are vying for the posts. In Reedport No. 1, Robert C. Sund and William L. Taylor are the candidates, while in Umpqua precinct, Edward F. Hulon and Arthur A. Wilson have filed for the position.

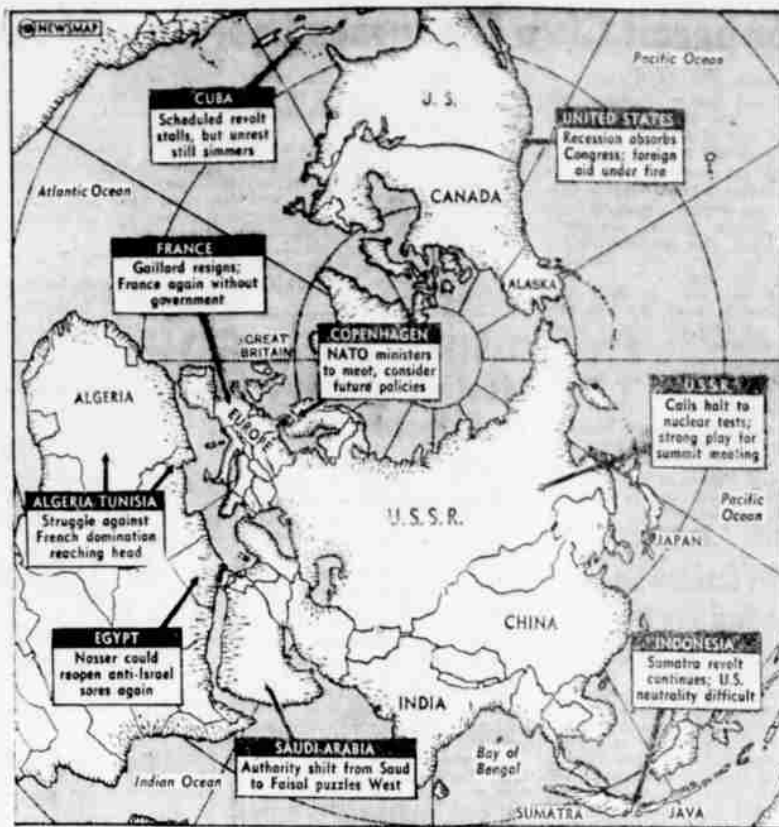

Inquiry Of Wife Bares Eviction Of Red From U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department said Monday 12 years of legal proceedings led to the deportation last Friday of William Heikilla from San Francisco to Finland.

The explanation was given as his wife, Phyllis, 35, prepared to go into federal court in San Francisco to seek an order for the government to explain what happened and where her husband is. The 36-year-old Finnish-born draftsman, charged with having a communist background, was arrested by immigration inspectors as he left his drafting office, Mrs. Heikilla said she had not heard from him since.

The Justice Department said the inspectors flew Heikilla in an immigration plane to Vancouver, B.C., where he was transferred to a nonstop Canadian Pacific flight to Amsterdam.

The service said arrangements had been made for him to connect there with a Finnish airline flight to Helsinki, where he was expected to arrive Monday.

Heikilla is the son of naturalized American parents who were visiting in Finland when he was born.

Joined Red Group
According to immigration records, Heikilla returned to this country as a small child but was never naturalized.

The Immigration Service picked him up for deportation in December 1947, alleging that Heikilla joined the Young Workers Communist League while in his twenties and had since belonged to numerous communist organizations, including the Communist Party.

His case went through hearings dating back 10 years.

An immigration examiner ruled that he was deportable. That ruling was upheld in 1953, and thereafter an appeal to the Supreme Court was dismissed.

During the deportation proceedings, Heikilla married an American woman.

County Sheriff Capt. Dwight Crum called it "a terrible day."

Demurrer Of Two Youths Overruled By Judge
Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich has overruled demurrers filed by two youths indicted two weeks ago on charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Thomas Allyn Dorsey, 17, Reedport, and Richard Kelly, 18, Sutherlin, entered pleas of not guilty following the ruling. They are accused in connection with an alleged incident last March 9 involving a 15-year-old girl in Reedport.

Woodrich said trial dates will be set later.

Associated Press Defends Adherence To Professional Principles In News Service

NEW YORK (AP)—The government and press, radio and television have a duty to report the facts—unfavorable as well as favorable—directors of The Associated Press said.

They cited the business recession and failure of the first Vanguard satellite missile as examples of unfavorable news that should not be suppressed.

"It would be a disservice to emphasize bad news out of proportion, but it would be unthinkable to attempt to suppress news of any kind," the directors said in their annual report.

"Nothing could be better calculated to destroy public confidence quickly and completely."

The report, read at the AP annual membership meeting in this city said, "The strength of democracy lies in an informed people."

The directors noted that the launching of two Soviet Sputniks was followed by a clamor for the United States to match the Soviets.

Sputniks Fiasco Cited
"With much advance notice and full news coverage, the attempt was made in December to launch the Vanguard—and it failed," the directors said.

"Both the armed services and the news media were blamed by some critics for creating a spectacle of the failure and injuring the United States in the eyes of the world. We believe this criticism shortsighted."

"A totalitarian government can release only the good news and hide its failures. In a free country, it is the duty of the government—in this case the armed services and press; radio and television, to report the facts, good and bad."

The directors said, "Associated Press coverage has provided what the public has a right to expect—thorough, fair and factual reporting."

Obligation To Public Met
Referring to the Little Rock school integration story, the report said: "Editors of AP newspapers lined up on opposing sides editorially, but in this case the editors used almost without exception, the factual accounts by AP's reporters and photographers."

Describing the past year as one of dramatic news on many fronts, the report said the AP again had met challenges and demands.

Public interest shifted drastically with the shifts on the world scene," the report noted. "The news service of The Associated Press fulfilled its obligation to report objectively what was happening and to explain without bias its meaning."

Better Contacts With Reds
The report said there has been some improvement of coverage in Communist-dominated areas.

In Russia, AP now has a third American staff correspondent. It said, "Facilities for getting news from other Iron Curtain areas have been improved."

"There is no change regarding coverage of Communist China, however. An impasse between the U. S. State Department and the Chinese leaves an AP reporter and representatives of other news organizations with passports validated for travel into China. But the Chinese are unwilling to accept them pending arrangements for reciprocal admission of Chinese newsmen into the United States."

CLEVELAND (AP)—A woman told police Monday night that a man snatched a diamond ring and wrist watch she was wearing when she extended her arm from her car signaling a left turn.

Mrs. Ray L. Maylin, 37, of suburban Cleveland Heights, said she had stopped for a traffic light and when her left arm out for the turn when a man grabbed her arm and stripped the jewelry from her. She valued it at \$800.

Mrs. Maylin said the man then got into a car and drove off.

Sen. Morse Wants Ike To Take New Look At Aid

CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) thinks Congress should take a new look at the Eisenhower administration's aid programs.

Speaking at a meeting of the Independent Voters of Illinois, Morse criticized aid to Cuba, Spain, Yugoslavia, and Nationalist China.

"We should remember," he said, "that the only reliable allies are those who believe in freedom and will fight for it."

Singling out Spain, Morse said that aid programs to that country will total 1 1/2 million dollars. The senator said he doubted that the Spanish air bases and Generalissimo Franco are worth it.

He questioned the necessity for air bases in the age of missiles and asked, "Are they worth the price we pay for arming a dictator with weapons that probably will never be used against an aggressor?"

New Evidence Presented Of Fluorides' Benefits

SEATTLE (AP)—There is new evidence that fluorides are beneficial in preventing tooth decay, a nationally known authority on the controversial subject said here Friday.

Dr. Leonard S. Fosdick, chemist at Northwestern University School of Dentistry, said the electron microscope had aided researchers. It disclosed that local fluoride applied protects the enamel of teeth against the action of acids.

Other evidence indicates the "effect of fluorides taken into the body in drinking water" should be even greater, he said.

Sonic Device Charts Blood Flow Speed At Billionth Of Second

SEATTLE (AP)—Time gaps as short as a billionth of a second can be measured by a device developed at the University of Washington School of Medicine.

It was designed and built by Dean L. Franklin, electronics technician, for precise measurement of the flow of blood. He calls it an ultrasonic flow meter.

In operation for three months, the meter has provided valuable information on the effect of sudden fluctuations in heart activity on the circulatory system.

The device consists of two sonar crystals at opposite ends of a tiny cylinder just an inch and a half long. This is implanted surgically on an animal's vein or artery.

When the subject recovers from the operation its blood flow can be measured at any time.

Bursts of sound travel "downstream" with the blood from one crystal to the other; then a sound burst is sent "upstream." The difference in travel time of the sound waves gives scientists a check on the rate of blood flow.

The travel time is plotted continuously on graphs by a device connected to the meter. Franklin explained his meter this week at the Philadelphia meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology.

Fires Last Year Caused Record-Shattering Loss

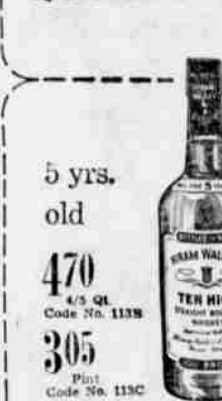
BOSTON (AP)—More than 400 big fires, each causing a loss of at least a quarter million dollars in the United States last year, produced a record-shattering 1957 total destruction of almost 350 million dollars.

The report on large-loss fires—especially affecting industries, stores, warehouses, schools, hotels, churches, aircraft and forests—was made public today by the National Fire Protection Assn.

The association said there were 422 such large fires last year, a drop of eight from the previous year. But the dollar cost was reported 20 million dollars higher than the total of large-loss fires in 1956, which had the previous worst record in history.

The nonprofit safety organization said the big-loss fires were a part of the unprecedented total fire loss of \$1,375,000,000 previously estimated by the organization.

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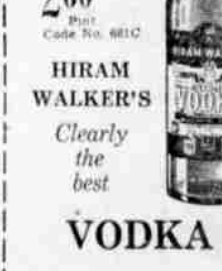
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
