Reedsport Youth Freed From Charge Of Burglary

A circuit court jury Wednesday found Thomas Allyn Dorsey, 18, Reedsport, innocent of the crime of burglary not in a dwelling.

The trial, held before Judge Charles S. Woodrich, began Tuesday morning and ended at midday Wednesday. Dorsey was charged with participating with two other youths in the burglary of a Gardiner store last Nov. 17.

The Reedsport youth still faces a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. He has pleaded innocent to the charge since being indicted by the grand jury two weeks ago.

The case stems from an alleged incident March 9 involving a 15-year-old girl. Two other youths also have been indicted and have entered innocent pleas in connection with the case.

Search Resumes For Missing Boy

MILWAUKIE, Ore. — The grim search for a 3-year-old boy resumed Thursday after bloodhounds repeatedly tracked the missing tot to the end of a pier jutting out in the Willamette River.

Sheriff's deputies said it appeared that Steven Phillips drowned in the Willamette River after vanishing from his Oak Grove home late Monday.

Not ruled out by searchers, however, were the possibilities that the boy either had wandered into nearby wooded areas or been picked up.

The bloodhounds were pressed into the search after a day of dragging in the debris-clogged river failed to turn up a trace of Steven.

When the dogs were put on the scent, they followed a trail that led to the end of the pier. The scent repeatedly. Each time they ended up at the pier.

State's Case Against Gary Bault Is Reduced

Knowland Offers Revised Water Projects Measure

WASHINGTON — Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) Thursday offered a new water projects authorization bill stripped of 28 projects to which President Eisenhower objected in vetoing an earlier measure.

Knowland, the Republican Senate leader, said the bill would be cosponsored by Sen. Kuchel (R-Calif.) and other senators he did not name.

Knowland said if the Democratic leadership is interested in flood control projects and not politics the revised bill could be passed by the Senate in two to three weeks.

He said the Senate could act quickly on projects to which there is no objection either in Congress or the executive branch of the government.

Knowland drafted his bill to meet objections which Eisenhower voiced in his veto message on the 1½-billion dollar authorization bill April 15.

Eisenhower objected to 28 of nearly 150 projects for navigation, beach erosion, flood control and port improvement.

Eisenhower's chief objection was that Congress had authorized these projects without having full studies by the Army Engineers.

up. The board voted to review the architect's request when they have a problem at hand.

Park School Budget Reviewed

A 1958-59 budget for the Park School was reviewed by the board. No action was necessary. The county court has approved the budget and has agreed to proceed with the school during the 1958-59 school year.

The budget totals \$18,000. A breakdown shows \$1,500 for general control, \$10,745 for instruction, \$1,337.50 for operation of plant, \$20 for maintenance and repair, \$25 for auxiliary agencies, \$2,467.50 for fixed charges, \$445 for capital outlay and \$1,290 under the emergency category.

The school lunch program for March was reviewed. It showed that lunch sales totaled \$6,729.59 and federal reimbursement \$862.94 for a total of \$7,592.53. Under expenditures, \$3,838.35 was spent for food and \$3,181.82 for salaries. There was a net gain of \$337.32.

Approval was given to a 1958-59 school calendar. This was the third revision. It shows that students will attend classes 175 days during the year.

The number of days for Roseburg school pupils averages between 170 and 180 a year.

Teachers will report Sept. 2 and students, Sept. 8. Students will be dismissed from school June 5 and teachers, June 10. Teachers will have 188 working days.

No action was taken concerning an appointment to the Park School Advisory Board. There was a question concerning who's duty it is to make the appointment. There is an opening on the board because of the resignation of Dr. Harold W. Mickleson who has moved from Roseburg.

Students at the high school had asked the board's permission to install flood lights on the tennis courts. The board asked that a detailed plan concerning the lights be presented Wednesday night. Joe Seallan, dean of boys, presented the plan which was drawn up by Linda Carter, tennis light committee chairman, and Ona Liles, student body president.

The students answered five questions which had been asked by the board, but the board came up with more questions. School board members now want to know the opinion of residents in the area. The lights would be operated by coin meters and be regulated to shut off between 10 and 11 p.m.

Scout Leaders Receive Training At Camp Tsitcoos

The adults, who gradually have been moving in on kids' activities, finally have achieved the ultimate: A cookout that eliminates the kids.

They achieved this at Camp Tsitcoos, the Boy Scout camp six miles south of this Oregon coastal community. Included were 43 from the Douglas Fir District of Boy Scouts. A total 203 trainees and 33 instructors registered for the event, called a Showdown.

They came from all points of the Oregon Trail Council.

The purpose was to train the adults — Scout leaders, committee men who advise Scout troops, and fathers of Scouts — in Scout activities. In charge of the training session, the first of its kind in the West, was Myrtle Ladd, Douglas Fir District training officer.

He said today that another Showdown will be staged Sept. 27 and each fall thereafter.

The Showdown was divided into four general areas of training: The men from the Douglas Fir District were in charge of one of these, the cookout. The chairman of this phase was Tim Ellis of Drain.

Other members of the committee were Bill Todd, Neal Meyers and Bill Smith of Roseburg and George O'Malley of Myrtle Creek.

Despite drenching rains, the men spent 10 hours at the camp the other day, engaging in many types of Scout crafts. The session was climaxed by a campfire at night.

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Flood Waters Now Subsiding At Pendleton

PENDLETON — Flood waters subsided Thursday and evacuated families began moving back to their home along McKay Creek.

The creek was back within its banks, but some water, trapped by dikes and caught in low-lying spots, still remained around some homes.

At the peak of the flood 80 families were forced to move out.

Gov. Robert Holmes of Oregon asked the Corps of Engineers Wednesday night for help.

The engineers, Holmes said, should help with "emergency debris removal, erecting dikes in the event of re-flooding and do such engineering work as required to protect life and property."

The level of the stream is falling gradually, Holmes said, but new flood dangers are posed by deep water, families spent Wednesday night away from their homes which have been threatened by the flooding stream since Monday.

"Weakened dikes and river channels choked with debris would be a setting for disaster if another runoff occurred," Holmes said in a telegram to Col. Myron Page, district engineer at Walla Walla, Wash.

The governor said he made the request for the corps aid on the advice of Umatilla County officials and Arthur Sheets, the state's Civil Defense director.

Jurors Convict Portland Man

PORTLAND — Lee Allen Baker, a 31-year-old cement finisher, Wednesday was convicted of second degree murder in the slaying of Robert E. Holloway, 44.

Holloway disappeared last October and his body was found two months later in a backwoods well near Vernonia. A quantity of lime had been dumped into the well, apparently in an effort to get rid of the body.

The jury of 11 women and one man deliberated the case four hours before returning its verdict. The prosecution had asked conviction on a charge of first degree murder.

Parker showed no emotion as the verdict was announced. Judge Frank Longenecker said he will sentence Parker on Monday.

Harold Keith, 44, of Vernonia, also has been charged with first degree murder in Holloway's death. Keith's trial is scheduled next month.

Cheryl Crane's Fate Rests With Judge Today

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — Movie star Lana Turner today is just a mother hoping for custody of her child.

The future of the actress' 14-year-old daughter Cheryl rests with a juvenile judge presiding at a juvenile court hearing.

Cheryl has been held since her mother's lover Johnny Stompanato was fatally stabbed Good Friday night in the boudoir of the actress' rented mansion. Police said Cheryl admitted plunging a kitchen knife into Stompanato's stomach when he threatened her mother.

Three Men Fined Here In Lieu Of Fine Payments

Three men were fined \$25 after pleading guilty to vagrancy charges in Roseburg Municipal Court Wednesday.

Judge Randolph Slocum sentenced the trio to five days in lieu of fine payments. The three, Frederick Alfred Dyke, 36, Seattle; James Howard Chaisson, 31, Medford; and Samuel M. Kurtz, 30, Tappan, Wash., were picked up early Wednesday morning by Roseburg police.

5 Autos Damaged But No One Hurt In Accidents Here

No one was injured but five cars were damaged in two separate accidents in Roseburg Wednesday.

The first smashup occurred Wednesday morning when a 1954 sedan driven by Ray Vincent Walker, 30, 864 NE Knoll Ave., collided with a 1955 station wagon driven by Andrew Alexander Jacoby, 34, Rt. 4 Box 1200, at the intersection of Oak Ave. and Pine St.

Roseburg police, who issued no citations, said apparently neither driver spotted the other car before the collision. Walker was driving west on Oak and Jacoby was proceeding north on Pine.

Damage to the Walker vehicle was estimated at \$100, and the Jacoby car was damaged to the extent of about \$75.

Three cars were involved in the other collision, which occurred on SE Stephens Street just south of SE Washington Avenue.

City officers reported that two northbound cars had stopped for a traffic light on Stephens when they were struck from behind by a third car, a 1952 sedan driven by Kirby D. Bias, 26, Winston.

The other two cars were a 1951 sedan driven by Phyllis Laurette Ostrander, 38, Rt. 1 Box 164, and a 1955 sedan driven by William Sedar, 25, 633 NE Nash St. The Bias car struck the Sedar vehicle.

Police said Bias was cited for following too closely.

No damage estimate was listed for any of the cars. However, the Bias vehicle received front end and motor damage and was towed from the scene. The other two cars left the scene under their own power.

Missile Travels 5,000 Miles, Cone Missing

Russian Claims

The Russians have made claims of intercontinental ballistic missile flights at full range. The only U.S. missile that previously has flown full intercontinental range is the jet-powered Snark which requires about eight or nine hours for the flight.

On a brilliantly clear evening just at dusk, the Thor-Vanguard missile climbed so high so quickly Wednesday that the sunlight caught it, turned its vapor trail to a long and beautiful serpentine, and spotlighted the missile itself for long minutes.

The mission was to launch the highly advanced and elaborately equipped cone 50 miles up in space and then 5,000 miles southward to a previously selected impact area near Ascension.

Equipment Fails

But some of the radio reporting equipment in the second stage failed. One Air Force expert said, "without all our telemetry equipment — and we do need it all, not just part of it — I wouldn't give two hits right now for our chances of finding the nose cone."

"There's an awful lot of water in the South Atlantic. But the outlook may brighten tomorrow."

The rocket, a Thor 1,500-mile range missile, into the nose of which the second stage of a Vanguard satellite rocket had been set like a candle, took off at 7:10 p.m.

Expert observers said the missile traveled straight and true along the 5,000 mile test range as long as it could be seen.

After the burnout of its second stage, the missile nose would continue on ballistically, like a rock hurled into a long arc through the sky.

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector — Israelis danced in the streets until dawn today to celebrate the 10th anniversary of their nation's founding.

Big Three Ask Summit Meeting Talks Speedup

PARIS — The Western Big Three asked the Soviet Union Thursday to speed up diplomatic talks leading to a Summit meeting.

They said in a joint note they want their ambassadors in Moscow to meet in a group with Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko to make faster progress. Gromyko has been meeting the ambassadors separately but has not sat down with all three at the time.

Britain's foreign minister, Selwyn Lloyd, assailed this procedure in the House of Commons Wednesday as a waste of time.

The note from the United States, Britain and France was cleared in advance with their other partners in the Atlantic Alliance. It was handed personally to Gromyko in Moscow by the three ambassadors, Llewellyn Thompson of the United States, Sir Patrick Reilly of Britain and Maurice de Jean of France.

The note said the three Western powers believed joint meetings in rural areas were out of danger. Snow drifted 12 feet deep in places. Although light snow continued to fall throughout the southern Montana mountains, forecasters said the worst was past.

In north-central Wyoming, six persons were reported stranded by 10-foot snow drifts on U. S. 14 where it crosses the Big Horn Mountains 20 miles northwest of Sheridan.

One of the six, an unidentified woman, was reported to be ill and in need of aid.

The storm was described by a veteran U. S. Weather Bureau observer, I. A. Draper, as "the worst I ever saw in 56 years of recording."

He said the snow contained nearly seven inches of moisture.

House Committee Cuts President's Aid Measure

WASHINGTON — Chairman Morgan (D-Pa.) said today the House Foreign Affairs Committee's cut of \$39 million dollars from President Eisenhower's foreign aid bill should help the disputed measure get through the House.

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
