PORTLAND — The Oregon Board of Pharmacy Wednesday revoked drug store licenses for 12 Fred Meyer supermarkets in Portland.

Pharmacists are on strike against the big chain. The board ruled that the store cannot hold licenses while no pharmacists are on duty.

Prescriptions are being handled by a 13th Meyer store where the drug department is being operated by non-striking pharmacists.

Ired Britishers Threaten Suit Against Rainier

NICE, France — Sir Bernard Docker says he's going to get the best libel lawyer he can find to sue Prince Rainier's Monaco for having him and his wife kicked off the French Riviera.

"This affair will cost Monaco 200 million francs (almost half a million dollars)," raged the British industrialist.

"They are fools," snorted his blonde wife, Lady Norah Docker of the gold-plated Daimlers, marble championships and other headline-grabbing pursuits.

Lady Docker's current appearance in the limelight—from which she has been absent for some time — began Sunday. Monaco charged she insulted Prince Rainier and Princess Grace by tearing up a small paper Monacan flag at the Monte Carlo casino.

The tempestuous Englishwoman said she didn't mean to insult the Prince and his American-born wife, but she was disappointed that she couldn't take her 19-year-old son to the palace reception Sunday in honor of Rainier and Grace's new son.

Young Docker didn't have an invitation, and the palace said even if his ma and pa had sent Christening gifts worth more than \$1,000, sonny couldn't join the hundreds of invited guests.

Safety Fair Poster Contest Rules Listed By Chairman

Rules for the poster contest at the Central Douglas County Regional Safety Fair May 11 have been announced by Edell Bryant, contest chairman.

The posters must be in the office of the county school superintendent at the courthouse by May 5. They must have the student's name, address and phone number on the back.

Entries must be 18 by 24 inches and mounted on tagboard. They must also be connected with safety either in the home, on the farm, job or highway.

Judging will be based on arrangement and spacing, neatness, color and lettering and effective interpretation of the theme.

The central Douglas County Safety Council, sponsors of the fair, will notify the contest winners and would like to have them present to receive their awards at the morning session of the fair.

High school, seventh and eighth grade students in the Oakland, Sutherlin, Umpqua, Camas Valley, Douglas High, Glendale, Roseburg and Roberts Creek schools are eligible.

Prizes will be: High school first place \$25; high school second place \$15; high school third place \$10; junior high first place \$25; junior high second place \$15 and junior high third place \$10.

In addition ribbons and ballpoint pens will be given for first, second and third place winners in each of the four themes for high school students and the same for junior high students. A student may win prizes in all four classifications if he or she enters separate posters in each classification.

Posters must be drawn in pen and ink, opaque water colors or cut paper. Roseburg Art Assn. members will serve as judges.
