Contract Let For Alaska Nuclear Power Plant

SEATTLE — A \$4,897,217 contract for construction of Alaska's first nuclear power plant has been awarded by the Army Engineers to Peter Kiewit & Sons of Seattle.

The reactor will be built at Ft. Greely on the Alaska Highway about 85 miles south of Fairbanks. Work is scheduled to start next month and be completed by 1960. The reactor will provide both heat and power at the fort, supplementing the present system. Known as the Army's "package power reactor," it will be the second in operation. The first was completed at Ft. Belvoir, Va., in 1957.

Young Toughs Caused Most Of Lawlessness

WASHINGTON — A sharp rise in lawbreaking among young toughs was reported by the FBI today with the release of figures showing youths accounted for 47.2 per cent of major crime arrests last year.

The report, bearing out fears voiced by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover against an upsurge in juvenile - committed crime, said the crime rate among persons under 18 has increased 35 per cent since 1952.

Hoover long has advocated a "get tough" policy toward youthful criminals, whom he distinguishes from simple juvenile delinquents.

The increase in youthful crime over 1956 was 9.8 per cent.

This corresponded closely with the over- all 9.1 per cent rise in

major crime among all age groups. The FBI said its reports from the nation's local law enforcement agencies indicated a 1957 total of 2,796,400 major crimes. This represented a 23.9 per cent rise over the average for the past five years.

The report showed a major crime was committed in the United States once every 11.3 seconds in 1957. A murder, manslaughter, rape or assault to kill was committed every 3.9 minutes.

And, pointing out the growth of criminal activities, the FBI said there was one major crime for every 61 persons living in the United States last year.

A total of 12,669 persons died by violent means. There were 131,190 rapes and assaults; 61,140 robberies and 590,020 burglaries. Nearly half a billion dollars was lost in robberies.
