

Annual Hi-Y Youth Legislature Holds Session In Salem

SALEM — Three hundred high school boys and girls met here Friday for the two-day annual Hi-Y Youth Legislature.

With legislators and legislative officers guiding them, the youths will consider 149 bills submitted by local Hi-Y chapters.

Cameron Hinman, Klamath Falls, youth governor, urged in his inaugural address Friday that the youths consider sales tax and education legislation, but he made no specific recommendations.

Most of the first day was devoted to work in committees. Saturday the young lawmakers will assemble to take action on bills which are approved by committees.

Officers of the Youth Senate are: President, Douglas Llewellyn, Weston; chaplain, Nancy Cannon, Oswego; clerk, Steve Coker, Portland; reading clerk, Joyce Gillsky, Medford; sergeant at arms, John Coleman, Corvallis.

House officers are: Speaker, Jerry Lear, Corvallis; chaplain, Buzz Williams, Salem; clerk, Thomas Moore, Baker; reading clerk, Brenda Beatty, Baker; and sergeant at arms, Marcell Ten Eyck, Portland.

The bills being considered include measures to levy a 2 percent sales tax, provide compulsory liability insurance for motor vehicles, make drivers over 50 years old pass physical examinations, and abolish the closed and union shops.

There also are bills to keep children under 18 off the streets at night, give family life courses in schools, regulate rocket missiles, create a state atomic energy commission, provide for motor vehicle inspection, and make all high school students take annual state examinations.

Dimick Schedules Talk At Tri-City Legion Hall

State Sen. Dan Dimick will speak at the Tri-City American Legion meeting tonight on the subject, "Farm and Home Loans to Veterans."

Dimick said that during the talk he will draw on his experiences as attorney for the Oregon Department of Veterans, a position he held for six years. He said he handled more than \$5 million dollars in veterans' loans during that time.

Dimick said about 4,000 veterans received loans during 1957, but added that a shortage of funds prevented loans to many more veterans.

He said he introduced an unsuccessful bill during the special session of the state legislature which would have authorized a loan of 10 million dollars from the general fund to the Department of Veterans. If the bill had passed, claimed Dimick, "I am convinced it would have done much to reduce unemployment, to stimulate and building industry and to help business generally."

Dimick will show slides of the Legislature and answer questions concerning veterans' rights following his talk.

New Attempt To Launch Vanguard Rocket Fails

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — An attempt to launch the Vanguard rocket with a basketball-sized satellite aboard was postponed early today after a countdown of several hours.

The Navy gave no reason for the postponement, which was decided upon at 12:59 a.m. There was no indication when the attempt might be resumed.

Several times the countdown or preliminary check progressed to within three to seven minutes of zero, then was set back.

The new Vanguard satellite is 29 inches in diameter and weighs 21½ pounds. It is three times bigger and almost seven times heavier than its predecessor, Vanguard I, launched March 17.

President Meets With Chiefs Before Departure

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower left Friday for an extended weekend of golf and rest at Augusta, Ga.

Before leaving, Eisenhower held a breakfast conference with the joint chiefs of staff and a cabinet meeting. Topics of the two meetings were not announced.

Eisenhower plans to return to Washington Monday afternoon. Thursday the President and Mrs. Eisenhower went to the Smithsonian Institution and spent about a half hour looking over 35 paintings by Sir Winston Churchill on display there.

Eisenhower, himself an amateur artist, had a big hand in persuading Britain's former Prime Minister to send the best of his paintings to the United States.

Shoulders' Son Called In Senate Rackets Probe

ST. LOUIS — Louis D. Shoulders Jr., son of a principal figure in the Greenlee ransom money mystery, has been subpoenaed as a witness in a Senate Rackets Committee investigation of Teamsters Union affairs in this area.

Irwin Langenbacher, an attorney for the committee, which is to conduct hearings here soon, handed the subpoena to Shoulders this week. The younger Shoulders, who has a police record, is a former taxi driver.

His father, a former St. Louis police lieutenant who arrested the two kidnapers of 6-year-old Bobby Greenlee in 1933, went to prison for lying about handling of suitcases containing ransom money. About half the \$600,000 ransom never has been recovered.

Foam Helps Extinguish Fire At Oil Terminal

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. — Firefighters put a foam tower in use with dramatic effect Friday on the oil terminal fire raging on this city's waterfront for more than 36 hours.

The foam extinguished the blaze in a huge storage tank. Another burned itself out. One tank continued to burn.

For the first time crews were able to get near enough to the furiously burning petroleum tanks at the Esso Standard Oil Co. plant to make use of the tower. Within an hour the blaze in a 41,000-barrel capacity railroad fuel oil tank was extinguished.

Company officials have said the damage in the fire which broke out Wednesday will run into millions of dollars.

Late Dale Carnegie's Ranch Sold At Auction

KANSAS CITY — It took less than two hours Thursday to auction off the 1,240-acre Dale Carnegie ranch, 336 Brangus cattle and a special tract for a total of \$319,000.

The ranch of the Missouri-born author and lecturer who died in 1955 is near Harrisonville, Mo. More than 200 potential buyers attended the auction.

The cattle — part Brahmas and Angus — sold for \$118,000 to Kirk Foulke, Lancaster, Pa. The farm, in six parcels, went for \$154,000. A tract near Belton, Mo., suitable for residential construction, was sold for \$47,000.

Banished Britisher Plans To Get Even With Prince Rainier

NICE, France — Lady Docker, banished from the playgrounds of Monaco and the French Riviera, flew off to London Friday full of outrage.

She went a little bit more up fairly well under the decree of expulsion by Prince Rainier III, monarch of Monaco, who ruled the fun-loving, free-spending lady had insulted his principality.

She kissed everyone within range — hotel employees, an airways man and a baggage handler — pulled her mink coat around her shoulders and walked up the steps of the plane. With her were her industrialist husband, Sir Bernard, and their son Lance, 19.

"This is only an act of revenge," Lady Docker told the crowd of newspapermen, hotel workers and airport officials. "I'll be back."

Banished For Tearing Flag

She was banished from Monaco for ripping up a small paper Monaco flag. She was angry because her son could not get an invitation to the baptism reception for Prince Albert, infant son of Prince Rainier and Princess Grace.

Sir Bernard was expelled because he did not say he disapproved of his wife's action. Through treaty arrangements with France, the banishment was extended to the adjacent French Riviera.

"I am at war with Rainier, not with Grace," Lady Docker said. "The princess had known I wanted an invitation for my son. She would have given me one. Rainier has the right to do what he wants in his own country, but it is unpardonable to have him upset our beautiful vacation at Cannes. For that I will never pardon him."

Then, taking a broader, more historic view, she added: "It is absolutely intolerable that a foreign personality has interrupted the long period of Franco-British friendship."

B47 Stratojet Bomber Crashes

LINCOLN, Neb. — A B47 Stratojet bomber assigned to the Lincoln Air Force Base crashed shortly after takeoff from Goose Air Force Base, Labrador, early Friday killing two of three crewmen aboard, Lincoln Base officials reported.

The aircraft was on a training mission and was headed for Lincoln.

The dead were 1st Lt. Benjamin C. Iglauder of Baltimore, Md., pilot, and 1st Lt. Thomas H. Oppenheimer of Kankakee, Mich., navigator.

Reed College Censure Proposed By Professors

DENVER — The American Assn. of University Professors met here Friday to consider censuring Reed College in Portland, Ore., and eight other universities.

Earlier, an investigating committee of the association said Reed violated academic freedom by discharging Stanley Moore, who was a professor of philosophy at Reed.

Moore was discharged after appearing before a House investigating committee and refusing to answer questions about communism. The college later said Moore's conduct before the committee was the reason for discharging him.

The association said several of the teachers in the colleges under fire were dismissed after refusing to answer questions of Congressional committees.

Others, the group said, were fired for their social or economic points of view.

Tiller School Bus Contract Awarded

George B. Stone of Tiller has been awarded a contract to operate a school bus in the Tiller area, Kenneth F. Barnburg, county school superintendent, said.

The contract was awarded at a Non-High School District Board meeting this week. The contract calls for \$171 a month plus 20 cents a mile for mileage beyond a specified point.

Stone will operate a school bus from the Firmin mill, approximately six miles above Tiller on the South Umpqua Road, to Tiller. There, the run will connect with a school bus which runs from Drew to Days Creek.

Navy's Unmanned Rocket Sled Zips 2,827.5 M.P.H.

CHINA LAKE, Calif. — The tug of war for speed records between the Navy and Air Force has had another strong pull—this time from the sailors.

A two-stage unmanned rocket sled ripped down its monorial track this week and hit a top speed of 2,827.5 m.p.h., a spokesman at this naval ordnance test center announced.

This eclipsed the Air Force mark of 2,794 m.p.h. set last month at the Air Force Missile Development Center, Alamogordo, N. M.

Scientists scoot the sleds down rails at supersonic speeds to test airplane and missile components on the ground.

self, I cried and I prayed a little. But mostly I talked to myself to keep up my spirits."

The pretty, red-haired housewife said she was not able to move until yesterday.

"Then when I heard airplanes I knew I had to get out from the shelter, which was hidden by the timber. I rolled about 300 feet down the slope into the clearing."

"There I waved and screamed at the planes, although I knew they could never see me," she said.

But one of the planes that participated in the intense search of this northeastern Oregon area saw the wreckage and directed an Air Force helicopter to the scene.

The copter landed on a frozen lake a quarter of a mile away, and its four-man crew hiked to Mrs. Davis.

They found her conscious and thirsty. She was bundled in four sweaters, her husband's overcoat, his business trousers and his socks.

She appeared very tired on the flight here, but when the helicopter settled to land, she waved to a large crowd of people that had gathered.

In the hospital she was reunited with her husband, whose clothing, physicians said, played a vital factor in saving the woman.

Davis, who suffered rib fractures, said that he followed racing mountain streams in his quest for help.

The path carried him through snow up to four feet deep, through dense timber, and over wind-swept ridges.

"I felt a hundred times," he said of the exhausting trek. "Every time it took me 15 minutes to get up."

But he kept on and on, and finally reached a ranch house early Thursday. Its occupant, a woman, was frightened. She locked the door and turned him away, Davis said.

So on he went. At the next ranch Mr. and Mrs. Gus Robertson took him in and called rescuers. Nearly 12 hours later his wife was safe. Their plane crashed in a snow storm on a flight from Fresno to Spokane, Wash., where Davis parents reside.

Big Wheat Crop May Be Headache For Government

WASHINGTON — This year's wheat crop may turn out to be a big headache for government farm officials but it promises to become a recession-time job-maker.

The Agriculture Department says the crop may turn out to be at least 25 per cent larger than last year's production, and the fourth largest of record. A crop of this size — forecast at 1,190,000,000 bushels compared with 947 million last year — would add probably 200 million bushels to the government's surplus.

But it would require much more labor and machinery to harvest than was needed to get in the 1957 crop. It would require many more trains and trucks to move it to market and into warehouses than did last year's production.

Officials said this would add up to more work for custom harvesters, more jobs and truck drivers, and more for railroad workers, and more for workers at market and storage centers.

This year's wheat crop, like those since 1934, is being grown under rigid controls and retirement of some wheat land under the soil bank program. But unusually favorable weather and moisture supplies — plus overplanting of allotments by some growers — is boosting production this year fully 20 per cent above levels desired by farm officials.

If the crop turns out as now indicated, there undoubtedly would be a net movement of at least 200 million bushels into government hands under price supports at a cost of about 360 million dollars.

Harvest of the winter wheat portion of the crop will get under way in the extreme southwest within a few weeks.

UAW Cutting Chiefs' Salaries

DETROIT — The United Auto Workers Union, now negotiating for profit-sharing and a wage increase from the auto industry, is cutting the salaries of 25 top officials and laying off 100 staff employees to offset a decrease in union revenues.

This was disclosed Friday by a union official, who declined use of his name.

Top officers affected by the cut are president Walter P. Reuther, secretary-treasurer Emil Mares, four vice presidents, Richard T. Gosser, Pat Greathouse, Norman Matthews and Leonard Woodcock and 19 members of the executive board.

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Britain Planning Big H-Bomb Test

LONDON — Britain gave formal notice today that she is ready for a big new H-bomb test in the Christmas Island area of the south Pacific.

The admiralty and the Foreign office declared a 38,000-square-mile area of ocean dangerous due to the test of nuclear weapons and warned all shipping to keep out from tomorrow until further notice.

"Early warning will be given if it is necessary to extend the danger area," the statement added.

The warning was flashed by radio throughout the world and the government sent copies to foreign embassies here in London.

The British made their announcement in the face of a Soviet challenge to join her in a suspension of nuclear bomb tests. The United States also is continuing with its plans for a test series in the Pacific this summer.

The Soviet pledge was hedged with a warning that it might resume testing if Britain and America didn't call theirs. The British and Americans pointed out in reply that the Soviet Union made its pledge only after completing a massive test series.

This will be Britain's third series of hydrogen bomb tests. The new series will be the biggest H-bomb testing program ever held in the Pacific. It said there are plans to test up to three H-bombs, one of which will be the warhead of the 2,500-mile rocket Britain is developing.

Sutherland Man Passes In Eugene Hospital

Virgil Clarence Plueard, 63, of Sutherland, died in a Eugene hospital early Thursday morning after a lingering illness.

He was born in Woodburn Dec. 11, 1893, and moved with his parents to Cottage Grove when he was five years old. He served in the U.S. Army in France during World War I.

Plueard moved to Sutherland in 1927 where he lived with the John Plueard family. He was never married.

Plueard had been employed for the past ten years by the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. He is survived by three brothers, Alfred of Portland, Ralph of Yakima, Wash., and Lloyd of Cottage Grove; two sisters, Mrs. Grace Queenen of Grove, and Mrs. Gertrude Davis of Baker, and cousins living at Sutherland.

Graveside funeral services will be held Saturday at 1 p.m. at Fairview Cemetery in Sutherland. The Rev. J. J. Linehan of the Sutherland Catholic Church will officiate. Sterns and Little Mortuary is in care of arrangements.
