

Cottage Grove's Burleson Lowers Prep Mile Mark

CORVALLIS — A skinny high school boy Friday ran the fastest prep mile in Oregon history. It also may have been the best such effort ever recorded in the nation.

Dyrol Burleson, a 17-year-old Cottage Grove senior, turned in a time of 4:13.2 over the mile course at Oregon State College here.

His performance was the high spot of the Corvallis High School Invitational meet.

Meet officials said they believed that the previous national prep record was 4:16.1, set in 1956 by Jim Bowers of Sterling, Ill.

Four stop watches clicked when Burleson lunged over the finish line. Three read 4:13.2. The other recorded 4:13.4.

The track was dry, and the sun filtered through the clouds on a few occasions.

A field of 12 prep runners entered the race with Burleson.

One of them, Darwin Smith of North Salem, hung far behind the pack and thus was in a position to pace Burleson the final quarter-mile.

For the 6-2, 155-pound Burleson, it was the best of three excellent mile times this season.

On his home field in mid-March, he toured the mile course in 4:21.8. Then he was clocked in 4:16.9 in winning the Willamette Relays April 7.

As an indication of the scope of his Friday performance, Burleson's record cracked the Bell Field mark of 4:13.3, set by Jim Bailey of Oregon in 1957.

Bailey was the first man ever to run the mile in less than four minutes in the United States.

After the race Burleson was asked how he felt.

"Dead tired," he replied. Then he added: "It might be this year that I get down to 4:10."

The rookies are really giving those rookie crowds a treat in San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The San Francisco Giants, winning their third straight, climbed into the National League Friday night with a 2-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs. Right-hander Ray Munson, no rookie but a youngster, gained his first major league shutout with a four-inning performance. He pitched a three-inning shutout for a 4-0 decision over the Dodgers' 5-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

At Los Angeles, rookie Norm Larker drove in a pair of runs while rookie southpaw Fred Kipp won his first as a NL starter in a game crowd of 69,856 sat in on the Dodgers' 5-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Milwaukee's world champion Braves gained a share of second with the Cubs, a half-game behind, as Cubby Bob Rush tossed a three-inning shutout for a 4-0 decision over the Philadelphia Phillies.

In the American League, Baltimore scored unearned runs in the ninth for a 2-1 victory over the first place New York Yankees. Washington took second in the back, by beating Boston 2-0 on Pete Ramos' six-inning, Cleveland clubbed Detroit 12-2 and the Chicago White Sox ending their losing streak at five with a 6-5, 12-inning victory over Kansas City.

Sanders paced the pack in the half mile until midway down the back stretch when he allowed Vern Gibbons to pass him. Sanders took second in the mile, with some yards behind Gibbons.

In the only other game played, Dom Zanni pitched a sparkling five-hitter in leading the Phoenix Giants to a 7-1 conquest of Sacramento.

A Portland-San Diego double-header at Portland was washed out and rain forced postponement of a singleton at Seattle between the Reds and Salt Lake City.

Zanni got tremendous help at the plate from Dusty Rhodes and Willie McCovey, who each batted for three hits for the Giants. One of McCovey's blows was a homer.

The Giants solved Sacramento pitching for 15 hits while Zanni was chalking up his second victory in three decisions. He fanned seven batters while issuing only two walks.

Jackson County Lake Trout Limit Dropped

PORTLAND — The trout season will open Saturday with a bonus for fishermen.

The state Game Commission announced Friday regular bag limits will be dropped at Fish Lake in Jackson County, and there will be no limit on the size of fish which may be caught.

Beginning Saturday, anglers may take 20 fish a day there and have 60 in possession.

This comes about because the commission has decided to exterminate all fish life there next fall, then to restock the lake. A spokesman said there are many roach, suckers and other undesirable fish there.
