Spokane Firm Submits Low Construction Bid

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—A Spokane construction firm, Johnson, Busboom and Rauh, submitted a low general contract of \$1,940,494 Friday for construction of a big plant science building at Washington State College.

School officials reported the bid consisted of \$1,700,493 for general construction of the laboratory wing of the building and \$240,001 for the classroom wing.

Low combined bidder on the mechanical contract was Warren, Little and Lund, Spokane, with a bid of \$1,223,025.

Electric Smith, Inc., Spokane, was low bidder on the electrical work, school officials said, with a combined offer of \$253,601.

A recommendation for award of contracts is expected to be submitted to the WSC Board of Regents before their next regular meeting here May 1.

Americans Overcoming Racial Bans—Truman

NEW YORK (AP)—Former President Harry Truman says Americans are working diligently to overcome instances of racial discrimination.

"If we look at ourselves in the true spirit of brotherhood," Truman said Saturday, "we must acknowledge that in the United States there are instances of discrimination and injustice because of difference in color, religion or national origin."

"But we are working diligently to overcome these violations of the fundamental faith which holds us together."

Truman spoke at the eighth annual dinner of the Universal Brotherhood Movement of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. He was presented with the movement's annual Brotherhood Award.
