Beamer Tosses Two-Hitter In Winning First Contest

The Roseburg Indians finally began their league baseball action at Springfield Saturday and came away with a split for their efforts, winning 1-0 in the opener and dropping the nightcap 7-1.

Ron Beamer pitched another win for the Tribe, his fourth of the season, by shutting out the Millers with only two hits in the first game.

Tagged with the second game loss was Dick Meredith. The sturdy right-hander gave up just four base balls while his mates were booting the ball around to the tune of seven errors.

The Indians were limited to seven hits in the pair of games, four in the first game and three in the second.

In the opener, Beamer pitched good ball in the clutch as the clubs battled through a scoreless six innings. It was in the last frame, that the Tribe came through with the run which gave them the ball game.

Beamer hits single
Beamer began the action in the inning by beating out an infield single. A sacrifice moved him along to second, and he advanced to third on a passed ball. A bit of alert base running by Beamer brought in the game winning run as the Roseburg hurler streaked home on Meredith's ground-out.

The Millers threatened in the last of the seventh as two walks and a single loaded the bases with two away. Beamer then settled down and retired the last hitter on a strike-out.

In the second contest, the Millers jumped off to a 6-0 with two tallies in the second and four more in the third. The Indians got on the scoreboard in the fourth chapter as Jim Richardson walked into to be forced out at second by Don Wells' ground ball which was played as a fielder's choice.

Beamer then doubled to left-center, advancing Wells to third. With one out, Mike Hatfield lofted a sacrifice fly to right on which Wells scored.

The Millers picked up another marker in the fourth also, for the final score of the game.

Beamer didn't reach the usual number of strike-outs recorded by him in a game, being forced to settle for just four against the heavy-hitting Millers. He gave free passes to five. In the five-inning nightcap, Meredith had three strike-outs and three walks.

Vikings Edge Myrtle Point In Saturday Track Meet

What was to have been a three-way track meet at Myrtle Creek Saturday turned into a dual test between the host Vikings and the Myrtle Point Bobcats when the third team, the Reedsport Braves, were unable to make the trip.

As a result, the Viks and the Bobcats came down to the wire with only five and a third points separating them as the Myrtle Creek trackmen won 63 2-3 to 58 1-3.

The Vikings had actually won the meet with two events still to go, the pole vault and the discus, but the Bobcats came on to score nine points in the former and another six points in the latter, to narrow the final margin.

Jim Murray of the Vikings was the leading scorer for the afternoon with 14 1/2 points. He won the 100-yard dash and the 220-yard dash and took second in the broad jump. Murray also ran a leg on the 880-yard relay.

Goff Wins Points
Brad Goff picked up 9 1/2 points for the Vikings, with a first in the low hurdles and a second place in the 100. He also ran a leg on the relay.

For Myrtle Point it was Ray Christenson pacing the Bobcats with 13 points and Marv Radloff with 11. Christenson won the high hurdles and the high jump while Radloff won out in the pole vault and the discus.

Badloff reached the 11-1 mark in the pole vault — a measured height. The Bobcat vaulted but 11-4 when the standards ran out of raising marks, thus was forced to stop. He was clearing that point without trouble when officials were unable to raise the bar. They explained, "We've never had anyone who could reach that point before."

In contrast to the Spokane-Vancouver second game, Sacramento defeated Phoenix 13-10 in a slug-fest contest which saw the teams gather a total of 30 hits in the seven-inning contest. Sacramento had 16 of the safeties. Phoenix had won the first game, 4-3.

Portland was knocked out of first place in the league by San Diego which won both ends of the doubleheader in the Oregon city, 5-0 and 8-4.

Hanson's no-hitter at Vancouver was the first in the PCL since July 25, 1935, when Oakland's Chris Van Cuyk tossed one against Los Angeles.

Home runs were scarce in the league. Ray Webster of Sacramento got one in each of the games at Phoenix. Al Heist, Sacramento, hit one in the first game and Earl Averill of San Diego homered in the first game at Portland.

All teams have a day off Monday, the first since the opening of play on April 15.

Tuesday the clubs open the season in four cities whose teams were on the road for the first day. Portland will host Sacramento, Vancouver at Salt Lake City, Phoenix at San Diego and Seattle at Spokane.

Joseph Lane Track Squad Beats Marshfield, Central

Junior high seventh and eighth grade trackmen were in action Saturday in a three-way meet in Roseburg, with the Joseph Lane Junior High team showing their heels to the Central and Marshfield in both classes.

Joseph Lane racked up a total of 50 1/2 points in eighth grade action and 34 1/2 in the seventh grade meet, to win both.

The Brothers boys, Bill and Paul, combined track talents to gain five first place finishes between them for Joseph Lane. Paul was a triple winner in the seventh grade action, with wins in the pole vault, the high jump and the low hurdles.

Bill, who won the pole vault and 660-yard dash in the eighth grade class, tied an existing school record in the latter with his time of 1:38.8. The mark was set in 1956 by Bill Friday of Joseph Lane.

In the seventh grade division for Joseph Lane, Al Neal won a first place in the 75-yard dash as well as two second places in the subplot and in the 150-yard dash. Gerry Gumm had a first in the broad jump and a second in the 230-yard dash.

The Central trackmen gained two first place ribbons in the eighth grade meet and Marshfield field two top spots in the seventh grade action, while Central failed to win a first place.

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
