LONDON — Lady Norah Docker, still fuming over her banishment from Monaco and the French Riviera, walked out last night on a British television show which she said would have "made me look like an idiot."

The script gently spoofed the recent row between Sir Bernard Docker and his wife had with the dot-sized domain of Prince Rainier III and Princess Grace.

Rainier showed the flamboyant British couple the door by royal decree after Lady Docker tore up a Monaco flag. Under a good neighbor treaty, France then banded the Dockers and their yacht from the French Riviera as well. The TV show was to consist of a question-and-answer exchange between interviewer Hughie Green and Lady Docker. Ninety minutes before show time the blonde star decided she didn't like the script.

Standard Oil Reports Huge Drop In Earnings

NEW YORK — Standard Oil (New Jersey) Monday reported a decline of 70 million dollars from last year in earnings for the first quarter.

Net income of the big petroleum company was estimated at 167 million dollars for the first three months of 1958, equal to 82 cents a share.

This compares with net earnings of 237 million dollars or \$1.20 a share in the first quarter of 1957.

Billy Graham Draws 14,000 Opening Night

SAN FRANCISCO — Evangelist Billy Graham drew 14,500 persons to the first night meeting of his San Francisco Bay area crusade.

Some came Monday night from as far as Los Angeles, 405 miles to the south, and Redding, 234 miles to the north. Graham called it "the largest Monday night crowd we've ever had."

He noted some 2,000 empty seats in the Cow Palace and said "I hope you'll get the word around town there are some empty seats here tonight. This is encouraging. After Sunday, people got the idea they couldn't get here without getting into six miles of traffic jams."

Graham opened his six weeks crusade Sunday. The 16,300 capacity hall was jammed then with 18,000 persons and another 5,000 waited outside. Some 2,000 cars were turned away.

Graham led his second congregation in prayer, saying "Let's make the Cow Palace a great cathedral" and then gave a sermon on the Ten Commandments.

"We are all guilty of breaking God's laws," he said. "There is no one in this auditorium who has not broken every one of the Ten Commandments, at least in spirit."

At the end of the service 302 persons came forward to make "decisions for Christ." On Sunday 380 had walked down the aisle.

Graham announced that TV coverage of his Saturday night rallies will be carried by twice as many stations across the nation as were his telecasts from New York.

Early Morning Trains Canceled In Colombo

COLOMBO, Ceylon — All early morning suburban trains in Colombo were canceled today as railway bombings continued in the 6-day-old strike of some 37,000 Ceylonese civil servants.

Locomotive men and guards said they could not operate the trains without armed protection. A bomb explosion in a suburban train last night badly injured two 4-year-old children and six adults.

The Communist-dominated workers' federation called the strike last Wednesday in an effort to win political rights now denied civil servants, and lower costs of living.

Lawyer Admits Stealing Ashes Of Jap Criminals

TOKYO — A lawyer announced Tuesday he stole the ashes of seven Japanese major war criminals hanged in 1948. He is bringing them out of hiding to put them in a tomb to be inscribed "Tomb of Seven Samurai Who Died for the Nation."

Shohei Sanmonji, one of the two Japanese lawyers who defended GI William S. Girard in his Japanese manslaughter trial last year, made his disclosure at a party for other major war criminals whose life sentences were recently reduced to the 10 years they had served.

Among the ashes are those of wartime Premier Hideki Tojo.

Tojo and the other six, after their convictions by the 11-nation allied military tribunal, were hanged in Tokyo's Sugamo Prison and cremated in Yokohama on Dec. 23, 1948. The Allied Occupation ordered their ashes withheld from the Japanese to keep them from becoming an object of veneration by the militarist clique blamed for the war.

Sanmonji said the tomb for the ashes will be built this fall in a national park near Nagoya, central Japan.

NEW YORK — Elfrida Von Nardoff has surpassed Charles Van Doren as top winner on NBC-TV's "Twenty-One" quiz program.

The Brooklyn woman won \$11,500 Monday night and increased her quiz bankroll to \$146,000. This is \$17,000 more than the \$129,000 Van Doren won in March, 1957.

Next week, Miss Von Nardoff has a chance to push her winnings higher when she continues an uncompleted game against Lindsay M. Parrott Jr., a researcher. She was leading 11-0 when time ran out Monday night. After her game with Parrott, she has the option of quitting or continuing.

Before meeting Parrott, the Brooklyn woman defeated Joseph Morrison, associate professor of journalism at the University of North Carolina, 21-0.

Wiretap Trial Of Hoffa Delayed Until May 12

NEW YORK — The wiretap conspiracy retrial of Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa has been postponed until May 12.

Federal Judge John M. Cashin granted a government motion Monday to adjourn the trial until that date because of the continuing investigation of the Teamsters by a Senate committee.

It is expected that the committee will complete its investigation by then.

Cashin had said previously he would declare a mistrial if the committee hearing involved the union or Hoffa.

The first trial of Hoffa ended with a deadlocked jury last Dec. 20.

James Toner, 88, Succumbs Sunday

James Toner, former Yoncalla resident, passed away at his home in Eugene April 27 at the age of 88.

Toner was born in Bernes, Ireland, Feb. 7, 1870, and came to Canada when nine years old, and to the United States at the age of 18.

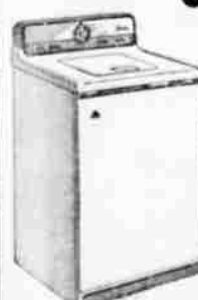
