Federal Money Asked For Junior College Program

WASHINGTON — A billion dollar, five year program of federal assistance for the construction of community junior colleges was proposed Monday by Rep. Ullman (D-Ore).

"I firmly believe that the next logical step in our educational system is the development of the two-year junior college," he said in a speech prepared to accompany introduction of his bill Monday.

"It has the dual advantage of offering easily accessible, low-cost general educational opportunities as well as technical and semi-professional training."

The bill would provide 200 million dollars in federal aid for five years. Half of each year's money would be divided equally among the 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. The remaining 100 million each year would be apportioned on the basis which a state's elementary and high school enrollment bears to the national total.

State Matching Provided

Participating states would be required to match only that sum which they receive from the second 100 million dollars.

The bill would permit the money to be used for construction of new facilities or expansion of existing educational plants on the two-year level. None of the money could be used for such purposes as athletic stadiums.

Ullman said he realized fully his proposal was not a cure-all for the nation's education problems.

Ullman said he could think of seven sites in his own congressional district of Oregon which might easily qualify for junior college consideration.

Senator Accuses Meat Institute

WASHINGTON — Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) Monday accused the American Meat Institute of vicious, untrue lobbying in fighting humane slaughter legislation. Monroney testified before a Senate Agriculture Subcommittee.

He said the institute has told Oklahoma farmers the bill would lead to federal supervision of dehorning and require anesthetizing of cattle before branding and would put small packers out of business.

"This is an example of the vicious, untrue lobbying that is going on," said Monroney.

Members of women's and anti-cruelty organizations who long have supported humane slaughter legislation jammed the hearing room to hear Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) open the day's testimony.

Neuberger called methods used in many packing houses "grossly cruel" and urged enactment of the measure on humanitarian grounds.

Ballistic Tests Lead To Murder Suspect

AMBRIDGE, Pa. — Authorities report that state police ballistic tests show the bullets that killed two men in an auto ambush were fired from a rifle found in the home of Arthur G. Schuck, 41, a Baden electrician.

Schuck was taken into custody shortly after the shooting early Sunday at nearby Economy. A woman in the auto with the two victims was wounded.

Dist. Atty. Richard Steward said a decision will be made soon on the possibility of filing charges against Schuck.

Schuck told police he has no knowledge of being near the scene of the shooting. Police quoted him as saying he was too drunk to remember.

Killed in the ambush were William E. Engle, 41, owner of the Ambridge Tool and Machine Co., and Vincent Quigley, 34, a bartender. Angelina Puglino, 33, of Fair Oaks, was wounded.

4,000 American Tourists To Visit Russia This Year

NEW YORK — A New York tourist agent estimates about 4,000 American tourists will visit the U.S.S.R. this year—about 60 per cent more than in 1957.

Gabriel Reiner of Cosmos Travel Bureau reports that the Soviet tourist monopoly, Intourist, is striving hard to attract more Westerners.

Soon you'll be able to get a visa in seven days, Reiner says. It has been taking up to four to six weeks.

Intourist has opened up several new tourist routes this year. Among them are two automobile tour routes for persons driving into the U.S.R. in their own cars. One can drive from Moscow to Leningrad and out of the U.S.S.R. via Finland. Or a tourist can drive from Moscow to Leningrad and out of the U.S.S.R. via Finland, or a tourist can drive from Moscow to Romania via Kishinev.

Previously the only touring permitted was from Warsaw to Moscow via Brest, Lwow and Minsk, or from Moscow to the Crimea and back.

Americans may also take cruises down the Volga River or on the Black Sea. The cruises on the Volga are new.

Armenia, previously closed to Americans, will be opened to organized tours.

Intourist retains the same prices as previously. De luxe tours sell at \$30 per day including transportation, hotels, food and cars. Lowest rate is \$10 per day.

Kennedy said important labor legislation on the floor of the Senate prevented him from coming to Oregon for a two-day tour that was to have begun Sunday.

The senator said he hoped to re-schedule the visit later this spring.

U. S. Consulate Warns Americans In Cyprus

NICOSIA, Cyprus — The U.S. consulate warned American citizens Tuesday to stay out of the walled Greek sector of Nicosia as a deadline for renewed underground attacks on British soldiers expired.

U.S. Consul General Taylor G. Belcher issued the warning to the approximately 600 Americans in this British Crown Colony. British military authorities Monday put Greek sections of all Cyprus towns out of bounds to their troops and ordered troops and police to carry arms at all times.

The British order resulted from a threat by EOKA, the Greek Cypriot underground movement seeking union with Greece, that it would resume attacks on Britons again after a 13-month truce.

Cardinal Stritch's Condition Good

ROME — Samuel Cardinal Stritch was reported in excellent condition Tuesday. He had a good night following the amputation of his right arm.

The private physician of Pope Pius XII, Prof. Riccardo Galeazzi-Lisi, who witnessed the operation so he could report to the Pope, said the Cardinal had no fever and was sleeping well.

The Pope received in special audience the two Chicago doctors who flew to Rome Sunday for consultation. They are Cardinal Stritch's personal physician, Dr. Ralph Bergen, and heart specialist John Keeley.

The Cardinal told visitors Monday night, "I know they're not there, but I feel sensations in the tips of the fingers of my right hand."

LANDLORDS, BEWARE

KARLSRUHE, Germany — The West German Federal Supreme Court has ruled that American soldiers can sue their German landlords if they charge exorbitant rents.

British Columbia Fetes Centennial

VICTORIA, B.C. — British Columbians gave thanks Sunday for the bounty of the province's first 100 years, then lit bonfires against the night sky to herald their next century of progress.

Special services in churches throughout the province and a string of beacons from the southern tip of Vancouver Island to the Peace River country of B.C.'s northeastern corner marked the official start of summer-long centennial celebrations.

The day's observances centered on this flag-decked capital city where 2,500 persons heard acting Premier Eric Martin declare it a time for prayer.

As darkness fell, a plane dropped a one million candlepower flare off the Victoria waterfront and Atty. Gen. Robert Bonner set a torch to the province's master bonfire.

The flame was answered across the Strait of Juan de Fuca as the mayor of Port Angeles, Wash., lit a similar fire in B.C.'s honor.

Meanwhile other bonfires were lighted in 300 communities throughout the province.
