

Supreme Court Announces Action

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court Monday struck down an Appeals Court ruling that the Panama Canal Co. must lower its tolls, and refused to order 27 million dollars in refund to steamship lines for assertedly excessive tolls.

Justice Douglas delivered the unanimous decision.

The litigation was begun by Grace Line Inc. and other steamship lines which use the canal. They contended canal tolls were excessive, asked an order requiring the fixing of new and lower tolls, and an order requiring refund of the allegedly excessive tolls collected in the past.

In other actions today, the Supreme Court:

- Refused to review a New York State court decision holding that New York City can levy a gross receipts tax on advertising revenues of the New Yorker Magazine. It said the case did not involve a substantial federal question.

Declared invalid Denver Union Stock Yard Co. regulations which the firm said were intended to safeguard its normal market. The regulations sought to bar dealers from soliciting business for other markets.

In an interpretation of the Alaska Workmen's Compensation Act,

ruled \$1 that a workman was entitled to compensation for temporary disability although he had already received a lump-sum compensation award for total permanent disability.

12-Story Building Sold In Portland Saturday

PORTLAND — Sale of a 12-story downtown building was reported today, along with plans for a renovation.

The Cascade Building at Southwest 6th Ave. and Alder St. was reported sold by the Bedell Estate to Melvin Mark of New York City. Mark said the lower three floors of the building would be rebuilt. He did not disclose the sale price, but said that plus the renovation costs would push the investment past 2 1/2 million dollars.

He said the Bedell Estate would continue to occupy the ground floor.

Dulles Has Extraordinary Session With Officials

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles held an extraordinary conference with top government officials at his home Saturday. A State Department spokesman said they met "to carry forward the continuing review of our disarmament policy."

Officials said privately that the session had nothing to do with reported impending action by the Western powers at the United Nations to bring about creation of a disarmament inspection zone in the Arctic.

This indicated that the primary subject probably was possible changes in U.S. policy on suspension of nuclear tests.

State Department Press Officer Lincoln White, who announced the two hour meeting at Dulles' residence, said he could not report what the group said or decided.

Pendleton Girl Named Queen Of Annual Rodeo

The queen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lazinka of Pendleton.

Nuclear Tests Sharply Rapped By Cong. Porter

WASHINGTON — Rep. Porter (D-Or.) said Monday he hopes an eye-witness view of this nation's forthcoming Eniwetok nuclear tests will provide some answers to his convictions they are not needed.

Porter said he will leave Tuesday morning for the Pacific to witness the tests as an official observer.

Among convictions which Porter said he now holds is the view that the United States needs no more or better nuclear weapons for national security "because we have more than enough now to deter intentional attack."

He questions also the need "to go to a lot of trouble to develop a 'clean' bomb when we have no assurance the Soviets would use such a weapon in war, and the concept of a 'limited' atomic war is a delusion based on wishful thinking."

Porter said he believes testing for peacetime uses of atomic explosions should be carried out underground to avoid fallout and be done under international supervision.

"Fall-Out Trespass" Rapped — "Fall-out from these tests, however small and innocent — and there is a real dispute among scientists about this — is both a trespass on other countries and an assault on all people, under Anglo-Saxon common law doctrine. We have no right to infringe on another's person and property even a little bit."

He reiterated his contention that "the real danger today is from an accidental or unauthorized nuclear explosion triggering the all-out war." Porter said an end of nuclear testing would be "only a first step toward effective disarmament and real peace."

"The mutual inspection process," he said, "should be expanded as soon as possible to include conversion of nuclear warheads to peaceful uses and to the outbreak of nuclear weapons production. Hard to do? Yes, but a lot easier than rebuilding the world after a 'massive exchange' of warheads. Trust the Soviets? Of course not, but recognize their self-interest in survival."

Porter said he plans to confer with nuclear experts traveling to and from the tests "to see how these firmly held convictions of mine stand up."
