Tim Tam, Silky Derby Favorites

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The steadily improving Tim Tam and the sensational stretch runner Silky Sullivan were quoted as co-favorites at 5-2 today as the second richest Kentucky Derby in history loomed with 19 finely tuned 3-year-olds listed as probable starters.

As of now, the largest field since Court Turf turned back 19 rivals in 1931 is in prospect.

Three horses commanded major attention today as the vanguard of the festive-minded crowd moved into this Ohio River city.

They are Tim Tam, a royally bred son of Tom Fool from the fabulous Calumet Farm of Mrs. Gene Markey; Silky Sullivan, the flaming California chestnut who has caught the fancy of the public as few horses have since Man O'War; and Jewel's Reward, champion money winning 2-year-old of 1957 who heads the three-horse entry from Mrs. Elizabeth N. Graham's Maine Chance Farm.

Tim Tam, winner of only \$275 last year but victorious in the \$100,000 Flamingo and Florida Derby this year, won the trial stakes yesterday under 23-year-old Ismael Valenzuela.

The Texas-born Mexican was called on to ride the Calumet ace after Bill Hartack broke a leg last Saturday.

Injunction Halts Crackdown On Free Play Games

KLAMATH FALLS — Circuit Judge David H. Vandenberg Monday issued an injunction against a crackdown on "free play" pinball machines. The city joined operators in favoring it.

Dist. Atty. Richard Beesley had ordered the pinballs seized after Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton's ruling that such devices which pay off with free games are illegal.

The restrainer was asked by the Klamath Amusement Co. and the Southern Oregon Music Co. which own most of the pinball machines in the area.

The court was told by Henry Perkins, city attorney, that the city would be in a bad position if its police were forced to join county sheriff's deputies in seizing the devices. The city, he said, might be liable for damages if the state Supreme Court later held seized machines to be legal.

In issuing the restrainer, Judge Vandenberg said no particular speed is necessary in the courts because the state already has had the matter under consideration for six years.

Hero Of Futile Rescue Attempt Dies In Cave-in

PASADENA, Calif. — One of the heroes of the Kathy Fiscus rescue attempt was killed Tuesday in a cave-in.

Just as Kathy was trapped by a hole in the ground, so was Bill Yancey, 47.

He died in a ditch just a half-mile from the spot where nine years ago he and scores of men labored to rescue the 3-year-old girl from a well shaft while the world waited for news.

In both cases rescue efforts failed.

Yancey, a contractor of nearby La Puente, was inspecting a sewer ditch for a new home. There was a cave-in and he was covered with three to four feet of earth.

Tri-City's Braves rewarded a turnout of 2,784 fans in their hometown opener by whipping the Eugene Emeralds, 9-3.

The Braves got all the runs they needed in the first inning by scoring in four runs on a walk, four singles and an Emerald error. Hillary Stanton earned the win a five-hit pitching effort.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. — The international modern pentathlon entered the next to last event Wednesday with Mexico holding an 11-point lead.
