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RUBBER SKI PLANE—The usefulness of the Inflastoplane, air-filled rubber aircraft, has been extended by fitting it with a hydroski for water operation. Test pilot Dick Ulin, flying the plane over Wingfoot Lake in Akron, Ohio, reported it handled well during a series of take-offs and landings. Easily attached to the main landing gear, the hydroski is rigid in construction and fabricated of lightweight aluminum alloy. The plane was built for the Office of Naval Research by the Good-year Aircraft Corporation.
