U. S. Commercial Fishermen Caught Less, Earned Less

WASHINGTON — U.S. commercial fishermen caught less and earned less last year, the Fish and Wildlife Service reported Tuesday. Tuna led in the total food fish catch, with salmon second.

The service, in its annual preliminary review of U.S. commercial fisheries, said the total 1957 catch dropped to 4 1/2 billion pounds — down one-half billion pounds from 1956.

Prices last year were slightly better — averaging 7.39 cents a pound at the boatside, compared with 7.05 cents for the 1956 catch. But total receipts were down. The service estimated the fishermen got 351 million dollars for their 1957 catch. They got \$369,018,000 in 1956.

Lower Receipts

The processor received 592 million dollars, compared with 622 million in 1956; the wholesaler \$26 compared with \$29; and the retailer \$1,091,000,000 compared with \$1,147,000,000.

The 1957 catch consisted of about 2,230,000,000 million pounds of industrial fish and some 2,320,000,000 pounds of food fish, the service said.

The bulk of the drop in last year's total catch was attributed to a 400 million pound decrease

in the harvest of menhaden, chief industrial fish. It totaled 1,700,000,000 pounds and accounted for 35 per cent of the total take of fish. The fish is used principally for oil and fertilizer.

San Pedro, Calif., continued as the leading port in both landings and value of fish. It took in 354,400,000 pounds, which returned \$25,440,000 to fishermen at boat-side. Landings were principally tuna, mackerel and sardines.

Tuna led the food fishes in pounds harvested — 235,600,000. Salmon was second with 275,200,000 pounds and shrimp third with 204,400,000.

Effort Started To Set Aside Sales Of Timber

PORTLAND — Seven Klamath Indians and the federal government opened in court here Monday an effort to set aside timber sales and to collect at least \$600,000.

They say Moore Mill & Lumber Co. bought timber from Fred M. Marsh and John C. Blanford, knowing that the Indians who sold it originally had been defrauded. The company and the two men are defendants.

Marsh and Blanford were convicted in earlier Indian timberland fraud cases in which similar charges were made.

The Moore company says that it considers the case outside Indian Service jurisdiction, but that if the court finds otherwise, its liability should be limited to the value of the timber at the time it bought it.

The Indians ask either the proceeds from the finished lumber made from the timber, or treble the market value of the timber cut from the land, whichever is greater. In any case, they say, damages should be not less than \$600,000.

The Indian plaintiffs are Elta A. Duke, Robert Frank and Ora Summers, and their wives.

School Time Gap For Religion Due For Court Test

SPOKANE — Superior Judge Raymond F. Kelly issued a final order Monday upholding Spokane's "released time" program for religious education of public school pupils. This opened the way for a Supreme Court appeal.

The judge held earlier that the program is not constitutional, that there is no coercion or influence on the schools, and that public money is not used directly or indirectly to support it.

Four men who brought suit against the school district in an attempt to stop the program have indicated they will appeal to the state Supreme Court.

The program has been going on here nearly 20 years under an arrangement worked out with the school district by the Spokane Council of Churches.

With parental permission, grade school pupils are released one hour once a week to attend religious instruction classes at churches of their choice. The churches arrange the transportation and provide the instructors.

3,098 Farmers Qualify For Columbia Water

EPHRATA, Wash. — The Bureau of Reclamation said Monday 3,098 farmers on the Columbia Basin Irrigation Project have qualified to receive water for their crops this season.

Another 107 have filed applications but these haven't been approved for a variety of reasons, including insufficient proof of ownership and improperly completed forms. No applications have been rejected outright.

The bureau said out of 4,669 applications which must be returned and approved before irrigation water can be delivered to the farm units.

'Y' Youth Legislature Rejects Sales Tax Plan

SALEM — The YMCA Youth Legislature wound up its annual meeting here over the weekend after rejecting a proposed two per cent sales tax.

Measures ranging from highway billboards to the death penalty were debated in the Senate and House chambers by the young delegates.

They voted for a ban on billboards, but rejected a bill providing for a vote of the people on abolishing the death penalty.
