

Entry Of Silky Into Derby Put Color In Classic Race

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Derby fever, keenly sharpened by one of the most colorful horses in American racing history, gripped Louisville today.

Although 16 of the nation's best 3-year-olds were entered for tomorrow's race, not more than 14 or 15 were expected to start.

The race will be televised and broadcast by CBS from 4:15 to 4:45 p.m., EST.

On the basis of 16 starters the 1 1/2-mile race before an expected crowd of some 100,000 will gross \$183,000. A net of \$118,000 goes to the winner. Scratches will reduce the purses by \$1,250 for each withdrawal.

Until a few weeks ago this Derby figured to be a mediocre race. Then along came Silky Sullivan, who tugged at the hearts and imagination of racing fans.

The flaming California chestnut is owned by Tom Ross, a lumberman, and Phil Klipstein, a retired cattleman, of San Francisco.

With his come-from-behind style the son of the little known import Irish stallion Sidiwan never lets his followers down as far as thrills go.

He doesn't always win. In fact, he lost his last two starts at a mile and 7 furlongs.

But at the end he was rolling over most of his opposition after shifting into high about a quarter-mile from the finish line.

Silky probably won't be the favorite tomorrow.

That honor is expected to go to Tim Tam, a son of the great Tom Fool, from Calumet Farm.

The early line quoted Tim Tam, victorious in 8 of his 10 starts this year after racing only once as a 2-year-old, at 2-1.

Silky was held at 5-2 and the

powerful Main Chance farm three-horse entry, headed by Jewel's Reward, at 7-2. Others were only lightly regarded.

Silky ended his serious training yesterday, working a mile under Willie Shoemaker's guidance in 1:48 2/5. As usual, he let a running mate take the lead and then poured it on at the end. Shoemaker also rides the California flash tomorrow.

Oregon Raps WSC For Fourth In Row

EUGENE, Ore. — Oregon scored four runs in the sixth after a 1-1 fifth-inning tie to beat Washington State 8-1 in a Northern Division baseball game here Thursday that gave the Ducks a 4-0 Pacific Coast Conference record.

Four hits, including a two-run double by Larry Hughes, a walk and two errors accounted for the Webfoots' runs in the sixth and George Simpson slammed another double in the eighth frame to drive in two more.

WSC, now 3-3, got its lone run in the fifth when Dave Jones singled, hopped to third on a single by Gary Whiting and then skidded home on a sacrifice fly by Arnie Pleasant.

Pirates Keep Coliseum Screen In Range; Even The Pitcher Homered In 8-3 Victory

for the Dodgers, the Pittsburgh Pirates are having a ball there, with even pitchers clearing the left field screen as the Bucs close in on the National League lead with a six-game winning streak.

The Pirates made it three in a row, 8-3, at the Coliseum last night. Frank Thomas belted two home runs—for a total of four in the three games. Pitcher Vern Law popped a three-run homer into the left field seats.

Law, winning his second in the streak, used his fifth major league homer to cap a five-run sixth that bagged it. He hadn't homered since 1956, when he tagged one against the Dodgers in Brooklyn.

The six straight, matching the longest streak in the majors (the New York Yankees did it in the American League) hoisted the Pirates into second, half a game

behind Chicago. The Cubs took over the top rung by defeating Milwaukee 3-2 as Philadelphia dumped San Francisco to third by beating the Giants 7-0 in the only other game scheduled.

The Pirates have hit five home runs at the Coliseum, the Cubs and Giants seven each and the Cards three. That's a total of 22 opposition homers in 12 games.

The Dodgers, with only two in the last five games, have counted but 12 in that span.

Johnny Goryl homered in the ninth for the Cubs off reliever Bob Trowbridge as Moe Drabowsky won with a perfect relief inning in his first appearance since completing a hitch in the service. Lew Burdette was the Milwaukee starter, giving up four hits and two runs in his six innings. One was a homer by Lee Walls, his ninth.

Right-hander Ray Sempoch won his first as a starter for the Phils, handing the Giants their first shutout by allowing only seven singles—two each by Willie Mays and Daryl Spencer. Ruben Gomez lost his first.

In the American League, Ray Narleski, cast off from the New York Yankees, gained his second consecutive complete game victory for Cleveland, beating Washington 9-1 with a five-hitter.

The 29-year-old right-hander, converted into a starter when injuries crippled Cleveland's pitching staff last season, gave the Senators nothing but singles. Three of those were by LFI Albie Pearson, as Narleski blanked the Nats over the last eight innings.

The loss kept the Senators from moving into second place ahead of the Kansas City Athletics, who were beaten 7-6 at Boston and now trail the Yanks by one game.

The Chicago White Sox called on southpaw Billy Pierce in relief for a 4-3 decision at Baltimore in the only other game scheduled.

Aided by five Lewiston misuses, the Yakima Bears napped their six game losing streak by clawing the Broncs, 6-1, for a Northwest League baseball victory Thursday night at Lewiston.

Tri-City whipped Eugene, 3-2, at Kennewick and Wenatchee squeaked by Salem, 4-3, at Wenatchee.

Yakima's win was its first this season. The Chiefs had lost all their previous games to the Broncs.

The victory over Eugene's Emeralds earned the Tri-City Braves a tie for first place with Lewiston. Each has a 6-1 record.

A wild throw by Eugene pitcher Bud Meacham let two Tri-City runners race home in the seventh inning to knot the score at 2-2. The Braves then won it in the eighth on a double by Bob Kotki, an error and a sacrifice fly.

That wild toss by Meacham would not have happened last year. An out of bounds barrier behind first base, which would have stopped the throw, was removed this year before the NWL season started.

Jim Vogelgesang started the game for Tri-City and held the Emeralds to two hits before he was pulled for a pinch hitter in the seventh. Rudy Trovitch took over in the eighth and earned the win, his second this season.

Wenatchee's 4-3 win over Salem's Senators came after the Chiefs scored one run in both the eighth and ninth innings. Salem had led 3-2 until the eighth.
