

### Canyonville Committee Plans Centennial Dowager Queen

A "Dowager Queen" contest to be held during June to determine the queen and court of the Canyonville Centennial August 9 and 10, was one of the main items of business decided upon at the April meeting of the centennial committee.

**Details Announced Later**  
Full details of the contest will be announced within ten days, according to Carl Hill, general chairman. The committee did agree that the prime qualification of a candidate is that she is a resident of the Canyonville area, born here before 1890 and raised in the area. The committee read and approved letters sent to all businesses and organizations in the area inviting them to participate in the parade, August 9, and in booths and displays. Prizes for parade entries and the various contests were tentatively agreed upon. Bumper strips, vests and lapel buttons to advertise the centennial were selected and will be on sale by May 15, Hill said.

In a letter sent to organizations and businesses inviting them to participate in the booths and displays to be erected on Main street in Canyonville, he said there would be three types of entrants: Advertising, commercial and civic. He said there would be a nominal charge for the advertising booth; a percentage of the net profit of a commercial booth charged; and no charge levied for

a civic display or exhibit. He mentioned that all who wish to participate contact him to pick their space and to secure what help is needed in building the booth.

**Invitations Sent**  
The invitation to participate in the parade was sent by the Canyonville Volunteer Fire Department who is in charge of this part of the celebration. Two divisions are planned: Civic and commercial.

For the latter there will be a nominal entry fee. Judges will make awards and give prizes in the staging area before the parade so these awards may be displayed in the parade. The committee requested that all entries be registered with Norman Hanson, chairman of the parade committee and fire chief, for approval. Hanson announced too, that there is various float equipment available to entrants such as wagons, buggies, etc., which can be secured through him.

Other activities planned by the Grace Lutheran Church in Eugene include a get acquainted coffee hour, a banquet featuring Philippine entertainment and decorations, tour of the University of Oregon and two noon luncheons.

### Snooping Agencies Said Menacing U. S. Freedom

NEW YORK — Snooping agencies are putting freedom in the United States in jeopardy, says Cyrus S. Eaton, Cleveland industrialist.

Adolf Hitler, at the height of his power, "never had such spy organizations as we have in this country today," Eaton said here. The Canadian-born financier said there are no Communists in the United States "to speak of, except in the mind of those on the payroll of the FBI."

He said the FBI's importance is enormously exaggerated. "The make no contribution to the upbuilding of this country and its respect abroad," he said. The FBI, he said, is just one of scores of agencies in the United States investigating citizens.

He said he thought the United States has less confidence in its own people "maybe than any nation that I know of on earth."

### Reciprocal Trade Program Receives Boost From Ike

STRATFORD, Va. — President Eisenhower drove here Sunday to visit the boyhood home of Gen. Robert E. Lee, and used the contrast to plug for more foreign trade.

Eisenhower, in an obvious boost for the reciprocal trade program, said 4 1/2 million Americans are engaged in building items that are sold abroad.

"There is not a person in the United States," he said, "that is not affected every single day by what happens in Africa, in far Asia, in Europe and all of South America. We are no longer independent economic units."

Eisenhower has recommended a five-year extension of the reciprocal trade program, which otherwise will expire June 30. He has also asked authority to cut tariffs as much as 25 per cent over the five-year span. The proposed legislation is now before the House Ways and Means Committee.

Secretary of Commerce Weeks, who also spoke, said "the best is yet to be" for America and forecast a growth in goods and services from last year's total of \$24 billion dollars to a 1967 total of \$80 billion.

Weeks predicted a 10-year rise in personal income to 460 billion from the present 343 billion.

### CBA Instructor Signs Contract For Missouri

Paul Malm, social studies instructor at Canyonville Bible Academy for the past three years, received word this week that his Master's thesis, "Church and State Relations in American Education," had been accepted at the Claremont School, Claremont, Calif.

Malm will appear for his oral examination May 24. He is majoring in American history.

He has signed a contract to teach history next year at Evangel College at Springfield, Mo., the Assembly of God Church liberal arts college, reports correspondent Virginia Proctor.

### Korean Election Victory For Rhee

SEOUL — President Syngman Rhee's Liberals have retained control of South Korea's National Assembly but with much less than the two-thirds majority they hoped for.

With only four races undecided after the national election Friday, the Liberals had won 123 places in the 233-seat Legislature. This was only 6 more than the 117 required for control and far short of the 156 (two thirds) they need to block Vice President Chang Myun's right to succession in case of Rhee's death.

The results were not expected to have any effect on Korean foreign policy. Both parties are conservative and anti-Communist. They differ mainly over methods of unifying the divided peninsula and on the presidential succession.

The constitution now provides for the vice president to succeed. Rhee's term has two years to run.

### Umpqua Hotel Places Two In State Offices

The Umpqua Hotel, Roseburg, has placed two men as officers of the Oregon State Hotel Assn. which convened in Portland last week.

Emil Ramberg, manager of the hotel, was elected first vice president, and Asa I. Arnsberg, of Portland, the owner, was named a director of the American Hotel Assn.
