Slaying Of 2 Britons Revives Death Penalty

NICOSIA, Cyprus — British Gov. Sir Hugh Foot has made the death penalty mandatory again for carrying or discharging firearms. His action followed renewal of anti-British violence.

A gunman, presumably from the OKA underground, shot and killed two British servicemen in Famagusta's Greek sector Saturday. EOKA had threatened to tear up the truce it proclaimed 13 months ago unless the British stopped alleged mistreatment of political prisoners.

The gunman escaped.

U. S. Scientists Claim Some Headway Toward Harnessing Of H-Bomb In Laboratories

WASHINGTON — U.S. scientists indicate they are making some progress in the laboratory in efforts to tame the H-bomb reaction for industrial power.

But they say there still is no guarantee the quest will produce practical results.

This was reported by Atomic Energy Commission scientists as they told about three hitherto-secret approaches to the still faraway goal of wresting practical power from the fusion of hydrogen processes.

"So far, there is no real proof that a thermonuclear reactor producing net power can be built," said Dr. Arthur Ruark, chief of the AEC project to harness H-power for peaceful uses.

Ruark, speaking to reporters, during a meeting of the American Physical Society, indicated, however, that scientists are making progress toward achieving fusion power on a purely scientific basis.

—as distinguished from a practical one.

Progress Told

Ruark also noted AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss has emphasized that a practical power producer probably is many years in the future.

All three of the new techniques described Friday have the ultimate aim of heating heavy hydrogen gas—called deuterium—on the order of 200 million degrees Fahrenheit and confining it by magnetic means so the hydrogen atoms fuse and yield nuclear energy.

That's what happens in an uncontrolled way in the H-bomb, where the required heat is furnished by an A-bomb trigger.

Ruark said U.S. project scientists generally believe that the potential payoff temperature will be achieved within a few years.

But he added that this alone would not necessarily mean achievement of a "net power producing machine."

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Convict Killed During Gunfight

WACO, Tex. — A close-range gunfight beneath a small frame house early Saturday killed a convicted murderer who escaped Friday night from the county jail.

Franklin Perkins, 28, was shot to death by officers, making good

a boast to one of the men who killed him.

Texas Ranger Capt. Clint Peoples said some weeks ago, when Perkins had been discussing his chances of dying in the electric chair, he told the ranger:

"Rather than ride Old Sparky, I'll make some officer kill me."

"He kept his word," said Peoples, who said he fired three shots from a riot gun at Perkins.

Howard King, another convicted murderer sentenced to 99 years, was captured nearby earlier. He offered no resistance.

The pair used a smuggled knife to force their way out of the county jail.

Peoples said the officers were tipped on where the bandits were hiding.

Journalism Students Lose Yards Of Newsprint

SEATTLE — Journalism students at Queen Anne High School lost yards and yards of newsprint Friday. A clipping penalty was assessed against them for an article printed in their weekly newspaper.

The article, termed a "joke" by its writers, dealt with an opinion expressed by one of the teachers. It was deemed "objectionable" by principal George S. Farmer.

Hours later the offending piece lay on the clipping room floor in large quantities. The 2,300 copies of the paper were delivered with a large chunk scissored out of each issue.
