Shakespearean Festival Awards 21 Scholarships

ASHLAND (AP)—The Oregon Shakespearean Festival Company at Ashland Saturday announced it has awarded 21 scholarships for the 1958 festival.

Fifteen acting scholarships, three costume, and three technical grants have been announced. The winners represent 11 states. None is from Oregon.

The festival will open July 28. The four plays to be presented this year are "Much Ado About Nothing," "King Lear," the "Merchant of Venice" and "Troilus and Cressida."

They said they intended to set up "a fund to be used for religious, educational, vocational and social guidance of the boys when they are released."

Oh's father, Oh Ki Byung, owns an underwear factory in Pusan. The family is Presbyterians.

"We hope you can spare a piece of land in your country and bury our boy there, for your land is part of the homeland of Christians and people of democratic society," the petition said.

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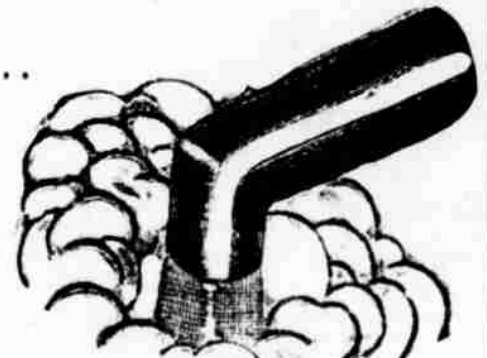


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
