Roseburg Girl Takes Project Of Pilot Camp

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—JaAnn Busenbark of Roseburg, a sophomore this year at Oregon State College, will be one of 22 college students assisting May 12 to 16 with a special school camping pilot study in Central Oregon.

School camping is a regular part of public school work in many parts of the nation and is being studied now by some Oregon school districts.

The May 12 to 16 program will see a sixth-grade class from Prineville camp out and do classroom work for a week at Camp Tamarack, located near Sisters in the Deschutes National Forest. Nature studies and outdoor experiences will be used as supplements in teaching of regular classroom subjects and a variety of other special outdoor educational activities are planned.

The pilot study project is being sponsored by Crook County school district and Oregon State College. The regular classroom teacher will be in charge of the training with advanced students in camping education from OSC helping direct some of the work and special activities.

Roseburg High School's transcription students have been placed in jobs in firms and business associations throughout the city.
