It took almost four hours to play 12 innings of baseball at Finlay Field Tuesday, and when the firing had ceased, the Roseburg Indians had split a pair of games with the Cottage Grove Lions, 8-0 for the Indians and 12-6 for the Groves.

The Tribe won the first game behind lefty Ron Beamer, whose record now is 7-0. Right-hander Dick Meredith was saddled with the loss in the second game, his third of the year.

It was the nightcap which saw four pitchers go to the mound for the Tribe in the third frame as the Groves brought across eight runs. Meredith, Jerry Holladay, Arbie Gillespie, Walt Edmonds and

once again Meredith all took shots at the Groves in the inning before the tide of runs was checked. Highlighting the first game was Don Wells' two-run homer in the third with none away. It was a four-run outburst which gave the Tribe its early lead. After Wells' blow, Beamer lined a double to left. Meredith then singled to right scoring Beamer and it was a 3-0 ball game.

Errors Help Tribe

Two errors and a walk gave the Indians their final run of the frame. Meredith scored on catcher Bill Roe's throwing error.

In the fourth inning, Chuck Hiney singled and was sacrificed to second by Jim Richardson. After two outs, Beamer uncorked a mile-high fly to shallow center which dropped in for a double, scoring Hiney. Another run came along in the fifth as Meredith worked southpaw Marty Vogler for a walk. With two away, Leroy Roberts asked to right where Terry Van Northwick bobbled the ball. Meredith scored on the boot.

The final Indian scoring in the tilt was in the sixth when Richardson picked up his second single of the game. He was followed by Wells with a ground ball to the first baseman which was dropped. With two outs, Mike Hatfield belted a double to left scoring Wells with run number seven for the Tribe. Hatfield advanced to third on a balk by Vogler and scored on a wild pitch.

Beamer Whiffs 10

Beamer kept the Groves under control for two innings before giving up a single to Jim Perkins in the third. A double in the sixth by Clark Peterson was the other base blow by the Cottage Grove nine. Beamer whiffed 10 batters and walked one.

In the second game, the Indians were down 12 runs going into their half of the third. They came up with three runs in the third, and three more in the fourth before running out of hits.

The Groves jumped to a 4-0 lead with one run in the first and three more in second. Two Tribe misuses accounted for the one in the first. It was two singles, a walk and another Tribe error which allowed the three more tallies in the second.

Then came the third chapter, and the roof fell in.

The first two men drew walks from Meredith, and Bill Harper

quickly removed the tiring chucker.

Then to the mound in rapid order came: Holladay, who gave up two hits and two runs; Gillespie, who was tagged for a run and a single; and Edmonds, who was not treated much better. With the bases loaded and one out, Perkins went for the 0-1 pitch from Edmonds, and rifled it out to deep left for a grand-slam homer.

Meredith Retires Side

At this point, Meredith returned to the mound, following a rest in right field, and retired the side without any further scoring.

With the Groves leading 12-0, the Indians began their fight back with Wells and Bob Scott both tapping out singles and Hatfield finding the range for a triple. Beamer and Meredith drew walks in the inning to account for the scoring in the third.

In the fourth, it was Beamer's third double of the afternoon and Richardson's third single along with an error, two walks and a wild pitch which gave the Tribe three more tallies.

two errors and a single by Luis Marquez.

Spokane got both of its runs in the eighth on Norm Sherry's single and Jim Baxes' pinch hit homer.

Jack Bloomfield was Seattle's secret weapon against the faltering Mounties. He drove in one run in the first inning and another in the third, then scored once himself in the sixth. Phil Shartzer got the first Seattle homer of the season in the seventh with the bases empty.
