Southpaw Billy Pierce still hasn't won a game this season and the Chicago White Sox are still last in the American League. The White Sox have won but four so far and only two of their last 11.

Pierce (0-2), only member of the Sox staff with a complete game, escaped defeat yesterday, but he didn't last two innings in a 7-5 defeat at Boston.

Pierce gave up consecutive home runs by Dick Gernert and Frank Malone in a three-run Boston first. Then he walked the first man in the second and gave way to Ray Moore, who was shackled with the defeat when the Red Sox cracked

him for three in the fourth after Chicago had tied it 4-3.

Mike McCormick, the kid southpaw almost every major league club wanted when he was an American Legion whiz in Los Angeles, finally has come into his own with the San Francisco Giants.

The big teen-ager was signed for \$65,000 in 1956.

Tuesday night he gave up just three infield singles for his first major league shutout, a 7-0 job that tripped Pittsburgh out of a share of the National League lead.

The Chicago Cubs gained a full share of first as Glen Hobbie pitched his first shutout in pro ball, a four-hitter that beat Cincinnati 4-0. Milwaukee took second with a 12-8 fling at St. Louis. Los Angeles moved past Philadelphia into sixth with a 7-6 victory over the Phils in 14 innings.

A two-out single off the left field screen gave the Dodgers the edge at Los Angeles with Don Drysdale, the expected ace who lost his first five decisions, finally winning one in relief. Charlie Neal walked after catcher Stan Lopata had dropped his pop foul, and scooted home from first with the winning, unearned run. Dick Farrell was the loser.

The Braves beat most of a 7-0 lead built in the first two innings, but after the Cardinals had closed to 7-6 in the eighth, Milwaukee cashed five in the ninth. Bob Buhl, backed by three-RBI performances from Bob Hazle and Frank Torre, won his fourth with relief help.

Idaho Resort Golfer Nabs Lead In Oregon Open Meet

PORTLAND — Bud Hofmeister, Hayden Lake, Idaho, golfer, held a one-stroke lead Wednesday as play started in the last half of the Oregon Open.

The 42-year-old pro fired his second straight 68 Tuesday. Right behind him one stroke down was Portland amateur Dick Yost, who shot a six-under-par 66 Tuesday to give him a two-day total of 137.

Sid Harman of Yakima, who held a first-round lead with a 66, slipped to a two-over 74 for a two-day total of 140 and a tie with Chuck Congdon, Tacoma. Congdon fired a 71 Tuesday and a 69 in the first round.

Bob Duden, Oswego, Ore., had a 142 and Ralph Dichter, Astoria, Ore., finished the second day with a 144.

Scotlanders Are Blamed For Threat To Queen

KIRCALDY, Scotland — Scottish nationalists are blamed for a threat to bomb Queen Elizabeth II and her husband when they visit here next month. The unknown person or persons mailed in a token explosive to dramatize the threat.

The homemade bomb—not connected for firing—was delivered to the home of journalist Alan Mackay. He called the police, who began investigating.

The parcel contained a note saying the bomb "we are contemplating using in Fifehire on June 30 would not be so safe." Elizabeth and Philip are due in Fife that day.

"The second bomb would wipe out the insults of June, 1953," the note said. That's the month the Queen was crowned "Elizabeth the Second." The nationalists do not recognize the first Elizabeth as ruler over Scotland more than 300 years ago. They claim Mary Stuart was their rightful monarch.

Log Market Activity Slow, Prices Unchanged

CORVALLIS — Activity continued slow and prices mostly unchanged in the Oregon log market last week.

The weekly report of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Oregon State College said Tuesday:

Prices for No. 1, 2 and 3 Douglas fir peelers ranged from a high of \$100 a thousand board feet in Lincoln County to a low of \$50 in the Coos Bay area.

Second growth sawlogs brought from \$31 to \$45, while old growth sawlogs sold from \$25 to \$63.

Camp run sawlogs ranged from \$25 to \$50, and camp run hemlock and white fir ranged from \$25 to \$41.

There was a good demand in the Eugene area for dry cascara bark at 16 cents a pound.

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
