Nursing Homes Group Hits At Government Aid

Convening members of Oregon Licensed Nursing Homes, Inc., last night voiced opposition to further use of federal funds for aging citizens without first giving private enterprise a chance to meet current needs.

Adopted by delegates representing 109 private nursing homes over the state was a resolution condemning the "encroachment" in the field of aged care of federal subsidies for building and enlarging facilities of non-profit organizations.

It said, in part: "The OLNH feels its members 'are, by experience and qualification, best able to administer to the problems of our elderly citizens and provide the personal attention, care and devotion necessary for a more abundant life."

Selby Receives Official Notice On Appointment

Douglas County Civil Director Arthur Selby has received his official notification of selection to the U. S. Civil Defense Council's Public Education Committee.

The notification came in the form of a letter from Walter P. Halstead, president of the national council. As a member, Selby will attend the 1958 council conference in New York City in the fall.

"I cannot place too much emphasis on the importance of public education for we all realize that one of our greatest problems in Civil Defense is the lack of understanding on the part of the people as to what Civil Defense must do and how it is accomplishing the task," said Halstead.

He cited the work of the committee as two-fold: (1) to compare and recommend programs for CD directors on the local level in the various activities having to do with public education and (2) to bring to the council a recommended program of public education and other recommendations that can in turn be passed on to FCDA and the administration for the betterment of Civil Defense in our nation.

Sutherland Woman Held On Bad Check Charge

Bound over to the grand jury by District Judge Warren A. Vonderbrugg this morning was Shirley Fiedler, 25, Sutherland, charged with obtaining money by false pretenses.

The defendant was arrested under the name of Shirley Reed. Her true name later was found to be Fiedler. She waived preliminary hearing in the district court arraignment this morning.

She is accused of cashing a bad check for \$15.25 at Central Market, Sutherland, on April 23. She is held in county jail on \$1,000 bail following her arrest in Couss Bay Monday.

Nixon Stoned; Cancels Visit To University

LIMA, Peru — A shower of rocks greeted Vice President Nixon Thursday as he sought to visit San Marcos University's rector and talk to students. One rock grazed the touring Vice President's neck and another chipped the tooth of a member of Nixon's party, Jack Sherwood.

Nixon then canceled his visit, saying it was obvious someone would be badly hurt if he persisted. He then paid a call on nearby Catholic University to talk to student groups there.

Two thousand students were assembled as Nixon approached 400-year-old San Marcos. The University Student Federation adopted a resolution early Thursday saying Nixon was unwelcome in Peru because "he represents the plutocratic and imperialist interests of the North American government."

The federation denied his visit any student sponsorship. The local press identified the main backers of the resolution as Communist sympathizers.

The U.S. Vice President had waited until the last moment before deciding to go to San Marcos because of the threats of violence.

Contractors Ready To Reopen Talks On Union Demands

PORTLAND — The Associated General Contractors are ready to reopen negotiations with the striking laborers' union in Oregon.

The management group notified the Federal Mediation Service of its decision after a meeting Wednesday.

Representatives of the striking union said earlier that they were willing to sit down to try to work out a settlement of the dispute which has tied up millions of dollars worth of heavy construction projects in Oregon since last Monday.

The contractors said after their meeting they were standing by their earlier statement that the union's demands were "unreasonable, unrealistic and damaging to the public interest."

They also said they were standing by their latest wage offer of a 20 to 25 cent hourly increase.

91,249 Feet Altitude Hit By Jet Plane

WASHINGTON — The Air Force officially claimed Thursday recapture of the world altitude record with a climb to 91,249 feet by an F104A Starfighter.

The Air Force said the altitude mark, achieved Wednesday over Palmdale, Calif., exceeded by more than two miles the level of 80,190 feet registered only last week by a French experimental Trident Isere-06.

The Starfighter, described by Gen. Nathan Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, as "the most advanced plane of its type ever developed," was piloted by Maj. Howard C. Johnson, 37, of Novato, Calif., and Knoxville, Tenn.

The 17-mile climb by the Starfighter, designed to exceed the speed of sound in straight upward flight, was started at 8:40 a.m. (PST) and completed 27 minutes later.

The results of the flight over the Mojave Desert were confirmed by officials of the National Aeronautics Assn., a Lockheed announcement said.

Walled In Minister Hauls Food Into Room Through Open Window

FONDI, Italy — A Protestant minister, walled off in a barnyard place by a Roman Catholic landlady, hauled food in through the window Thursday for a long time.

It was the Rev. Umberto Righter, second day behind the bricked off door of his church rooms. He told a handful of his church followers gathered in the courtyard below his only window:

"The captain does not abandon his ship. The shepherd does not abandon his flock. The soldier does not quit the battlefield. And I will not abandon my church."

With a 20-foot rope and a bucket, he hauled up a plate of spaghetti, pasta and a bundle of groceries his followers bought for him.

The strange case of the Protestant church with the Catholic door began when the 33-year-old evangelist of the First Church of Christ rented two upstairs rooms in the old palace. His little flock of 350 began to hold services there.

The only entrance to the church rooms was through a door owned by a ground floor tenant, Mrs. Gemma Basile, a Catholic.

She would not stand for Protestants trooping in and out her door and got a court order permitting her to brick up the church entrance.

Umpqua Ply Sets Closure

Production at the Roseburg plant of Umpqua Plywood Corp. will shut down Friday night because of adverse plywood market, Gerold S. McCarthy, general manager, said today.

The closure will affect the jobs of 225 men.

McCarthy, in a statement, said that the closure is due to the price slump in plywood to \$64 a thousand. He said he doesn't know when the plant will resume operation.

Other mills in the area were reported to be running at about 75 per cent production and won't close because of back orders.

Work Of The Devil, Says Mrs. H. Holt Of Doctor Critic

CRESWELL, Ore. — Mrs. Harry Holt said Wednesday that criticism of her husband's Korean orphan baby list program is inspired by the Devil.

"The Devil wants to stop this program and he will do everything that he can to do so," the wealthy farmer's wife said. "But you know the Lord wants to continue the program and we have no fear that it will be stopped," she said.

Her statement was prompted by criticism of the babylist by Dr. W. W. Bradshaw, city health director at Fort Worth, Tex. He said that an ailing Korean orphan had been brought to this country by Holt, placed in a home not approved by a licensed adoption agency and that the child had died.

Some 800 Korean children have been brought to new homes in this country by Holt and the program has the sanction of the federal government, Mrs. Holt said.

And as for the children not getting proper care here, she said: "any home in America is better for the Korean waif than a life in Korea."

Days Creek Rancher County Dad Of Year

Vaughn Bennett, Days Creek sheep rancher and school bus driver, has been named candidate from Douglas County for Oregon's Father of the Year.

Frank von Borstel, 4-H club agent, said today Bennett was selected from a list of fathers recommended for the honorary post by youth organizations from throughout the county. His name was picked by several well-known county citizens who reviewed the records of local candidates.

Each Oregon county is represented in the state contest. The winner is to be announced later this month at the Oregon State Cattlemen's Association convention in Ontario, and his name will be considered in the 1958 national contest.

Bennett, father of three children, operates the two Days Creek School District buses. He has been engaged in 4-H work for several years and has been 4-H leader for the Days Creek Junior Stockman Club. Von Borstel said the Douglas County candidate also is active in local school and community affairs.

Winston To Vote On City Budget

Winston residents will go to the polls May 19 to vote on a city budget which calls for \$28,698.25 to be raised by taxation, H. J. Kieve, city recorder, said.

The city has no tax base. Total estimated expenditures are \$83,180. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the city offices.

The levy is up slightly from last year because of new street lighting and other additional services, Kieve said. Last year, Winston had the second lowest millage rate of any city in Douglas County. The millage figure was 21.1.

Millage for the new budget is expected to be up approximately two mills, the recorder said. The proposed budget was submitted and accepted by the city council early this week.

Members of the Budget Committee were Russell Turner, Frank Turner, Arthur Hill, Charles Keeley and L. M. Shigley, chairman.

Eisenhower Stands Pat On Reciprocal Trade

WASHINGTON — Rebuffing Democratic appeals for concessions, the Eisenhower administration refused to budge today on the President's embattled reciprocal trade program.

The administration's firm stand against modifying the trade plan raised serious doubts about its fate in Congress. However, talk persisted of a possible compromise.

Los Angeles Workers Call Off Strike

Violence Reported In Marietta Plant Of Lockheed Bombers

Southern California's big aircraft industry barely escaped a strike Thursday but a walkout hit a Lockheed plant at Marietta, Ga. Nearly 100,000 aircraft workers who make some of the nation's most important missiles and bombers stood on the brink of a strike. At the last hour, their leaders called back handbills and picket signs prepared for Wednesday midnight.

The first of some 8,000 workers in the big Lockheed bomber plant at Marietta walked off the job when their midnight deadline ran out and organized picket lines.

In mid-day both company and union spokesmen reported disorders at the plant gates.

Union spokesmen claimed a company supervisor's car ran over a picket, breaking his leg. Company sources reported cars of workers entering the plant were shaken up, some tires cut and cars scratched with nails.

Last Hour Decision

At Los Angeles a last-hour decision before the midnight deadline postponed a strike while negotiations were resumed.

International Assn. of Machinists and United Auto Workers were poised to strike against Convair, Douglas Aircraft Co. and North American Aviation, Inc., when the agreement to talk some more was reached. These companies employ 98,300 union members.

At the nation's missile test center at Cape Canaveral, workers also set up picket lines, but were called back minutes later by word from Los Angeles that the strike had been postponed.

Workers at plants in Texas, Ohio, Oklahoma, North Carolina and Arizona would also have been affected.

Officials of the International Assn. of Machinists and the United Auto Workers held to their strike threat, despite the economic recession that has produced

President Orders Little Rock Troops Withdrawal May 29

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower issued an order Thursday for the withdrawal May 29 of all federal troops enforcing school integration at Little Rock, Ark.

The President said in a statement that he hopes it will be unnecessary to return the troops at the start of the school year next September.

Eisenhower's orders on withdrawal were relayed by Secretary of the Army Brucker to Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, commander of the troops which have been enforcing a court order for integration at Little Rock's Central High School since last September.

Eisenhower's statement said in part:

"Since the summer recess starts at the Central High School on May 28 and there will be no further present need for the guardsmen, I have directed they be released May 29."

"Following that date I trust that state and local officials and citizens will assume their full responsibility and duty for seeing that the orders of the federal court are not obstructed."

Stanton Recuperation Reported Continuing

Charles V. Stanton, 63, editor and manager of The News-Review, was taken off the critical list at Sacred Heart Hospital, Eugene, today and now is listed as being in "fair condition."

Stanton was stricken April 29 with a cerebral hemorrhage. His improvement in the last 24 hours was described by Mrs. Stanton, who said she had read "get well" cards to him Wednesday and he had recognized the names of the senders.

However, he still is unable to receive visitors.

Suffers Severe Burns

PORTLAND — Curtis Davis, 44, suffered burns over 50 per cent of his body when a bonfire flared up as he dumped rubbish on it May 1.

Davis, an employee of an auto wrecking firm, succumbed to the burns at a hospital here Wednesday.
