EAST HAMPTON, N.Y. — Samuel Seabury, the driving force in a corruption investigation which

led to the resignation of deonair James J. Walker as mayor of New York City, died today. He was 85. Seabury had been an invalid at Hand's Nursing Home here for several years. As onetime judge of the New York State Court of Appeals, Seabury brought considerable prestige to his job as counsel for a legislative committee set up April 30, 1931, to investigate the affairs of Democratic New York City.
