European Hoop Tour Unlikely

SEATTLE — Dr. Sam Mossafer was just about ready Thursday to abandon his proposed tour of Europe this summer with a collection of America's brightest collegiate basketball players. The roof caved in on the Seattle psychologist Wednesday when the AAU indicated it would veto the project.

"I'll wait for official word from the AAU," said Sam, "but it sounds final." He was referring to a report by AAU secretary-treasurer Jim Simms that the red tape of obtaining approval would wrap Sam up so tightly he would never get clear in time for a summer trip.

Simms said he had not received Sam's letter asking the AAU's blessing. Sam said he had addressed it to Daniel J. Ferris, Simms' retired predecessor. Chucky Sam still was a bristle over a report out of Lawrence, Kan., that his proposed tour was a professional venture. A story in the Lawrence Journal-World said Wilt Chamberlain of Kansas had been offered \$40,000 to turn pro. "I," said Sam, "haven't got a dime."

He had lined up 12 of the nation's great college players for the tour, including Chamberlain, Elgin Baylor of Seattle, Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati and Don Hannon of Pitt from the All America quintet. Robertson later decided not to go. Sam still was seeking a sponsor to underwrite the jaunt when the AAU report came in.

"This was absolutely an amateur venture," he said. "The players would have received only expenses. They were all pleased at the prospect of the trip and happy for the chance to play with their contemporary stars against the best teams in Europe."

Top-Level Space Agency Runs Into Heavy Criticism

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's proposal for a new top-level space agency under civilian control ran into bipartisan criticism Wednesday before the Senate Space Committee.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall (R-Mass.) said one section of the administration bill would permit the President to transfer whole government agencies or parts of them without congressional knowledge or agreement.

Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, head of the new space group, promptly asked both Saltonstall and government lawyers to draft language that would prevent this.

Sen. Styles Bridges (R-NH), senior GOP senator, said the bill "falls over backwards" to install civilian controls over the military.

Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald A. Quarles, testifying in support of the bill he helped write, told Bridges that at present and for some time ahead the military must take the leadership in space research and development.

Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-NM), veteran of atomic affairs, asked about possible transfer of nuclear projects related to space exploration from the Atomic Energy Commission.

He said he will insist on drastic revisions of the bill.

Stars Don't Twinkle At 40,000 Feet, Says Astronomer Balloonist

MINNEAPOLIS — An astronomer and a veteran Navy balloonist, tired and hungry after a 12-hour ascent to 40,000 feet, said Wednesday they found a place near their maximum altitude where the stars didn't twinkle.

Cmdr. Malcolm D. Ross, long-time Navy aeronaut and astronomer Alfred H. Mikesell, were flown here after their landing in a clover field near Dubuque, Iowa.

"We're a little tired, but very happy," both men said.

Ross and Mikesell said the balloon was around 40,000 feet when they observed the stars were not twinkling.

Cmdr. Ross said the landing was a "textbook landing." Delicate equipment aboard was undamaged. Asked whether they considered the ascent successful, both Ross and Mikesell answered, "certainly."

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
