Library Assn. To Support Improve Library Program

During the Oregon Library Assn. business session, Friday it was voted to appoint a library development committee to support the program of the Oregon State Library for improved library service in the state.

The OLA, at the 1958 session of the Oregon Legislature, will recommend an act to appropriate funds for the 1959-61 biennial budget to meet requirements for matching funds as stated under the Library Services Act of the 85th Congress, or support an act to secure funds to continue the development of library service in the state, if the Library Services Act is not passed.

It was recommended the OLA employ a lobbyist for the 1959 session of the state Legislature, and the OLA voted to give financial support to the legislation program.

Entertainment Provided
Luncheon entertainment was provided by Helen Casey and Alice Ueland of the Retired Teachers Assn., who presented two humorous songs.

Muriel Mitchell, assistant librarian of Douglas County Library, and Mrs. Hal Schiltz, secretary, Douglas County Library Board, gave a humorous skit on how the county library came into being.

Helen Bliss, chairman president's special committee on personnel and training for librarianship, presided over the afternoon session on "Our Crisis in Personnel, A Proposed Solution." She stated that many libraries had cut service to various communities due to lack of trained help.

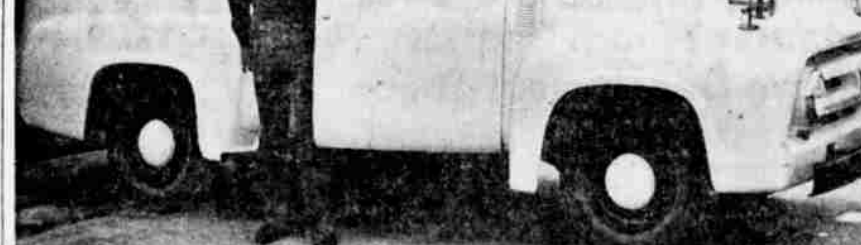
Speakers on that topic were Marjorie Chester, supervisor of instructional materials, Salem public schools, who stated that trained help could come from the teaching field. She said the need for trained librarians is great, especially in elementary schools.

Small Libraries Topic
Mrs. A. T. Fox, state library trustee, spoke on the problems of a small library. By making emergency training available to in-

terested women with spare time and having speakers at high school career day celebrations to interest students in library work as a career were two suggestions she gave to ease the shortage of trained personnel.

Mrs. Elsie Lundborg, librarian, Pacific University, also spoke of the use of non-professional help, with library experience, to alleviate the shortage of professional help. She said there is not enough time to train students in small library techniques.

Speaking on problems of larger public libraries, Katherine Anderson, Portland Public Library librarian, stated they cannot fill the number of vacancies available with professional people. "Oregon is not contributing enough young people to librarianship, so we must fill in with non-professionals." She reported on the cadet training program of the Portland Library where non-professionals get definite training in basic library techniques. This program also helps recruit people for full professional training.

WASHINGTON — A. W. Lafferty, 82-year-old former Oregon congressman, said Friday he is going to run for Congress again, this time as an independent.

He said he will make up his mind as to the district in which to seek election after the Oregon primary next week when he will go to the state to place his name on the November ballot by petition.

He said he won't run, however, in the 3rd District (Multnomah County).

Jewish Graves Reported Desecrated In Poland
LODZ, Poland — Sixty-eight Jewish graves were reported desecrated Thursday in Poland's worst outbreak of anti-semitism in more than a year. Vandals overturned memorial stones and chalked slogans on others in the main Jewish cemetery of Lodz.

The desecration came just after the ashes of several hundred Jews had been brought to the cemetery for reburial. They had died in Stuttgart, a World War II labor camp run by the Germans at Lublin, in eastern Poland.

East Bank Freeway For Portland Gets Commission's Okay

PORTLAND — The proposed \$3-million-dollar East Bank Freeway through Portland won approval of the state Highway Commission Thursday.

The freeway will carry north-south traffic through the heart of Portland.

The commission's action, following a public hearing held last week, will allow the state to begin buying right of way along the east bank of the Willamette River, opposite the West Side business section of Portland. The east bank is largely an industrial area.

W. C. Williams, state highway engineer, said first construction contracts probably could be awarded late next year and the freeway completed in three years.

The proposal calls for construction of a new bridge over the Willamette, to be located between the Hawthorne and Ross Island bridges, to connect the East Bank with the Baldock freeway.

Williams said the contract for the bridge, to be called the Marquam Bridge, would be awarded late next year.

Strike Not Hurting
Williams said the current strike of union laborers, which has halted a number of heavy construction jobs in the state, would have little effect on road jobs unless the strike is prolonged.

"If there is any material delay, say of 30 days, it will mean that grading work will be hampered and some projects scheduled for paving this summer will not be paved," he said.

The commission opened bids on a number of jobs. The low bidders and the jobs included:

Lane and Douglas—Oil 44.43 miles of Willamette, McKenzie, Richardson, Eugene, Siuslaw, Springfield-Creswell and Coast highways and a camp road in Honeyman State Park; J. C. Compton, McMinnville, \$51,428.

Farmer Groups Oppose Proposal On Women Help
SALEM — Farmers and farm organizations oppose a proposal that women farm workers be prohibited from lifting weights of more than 30 pounds.

They told the state Wage and Hour Commission Thursday that the weight restriction would make it harder to get women to harvest fruits and vegetables, would upset piece rate schedules which are based on size of containers, and would confuse the family unit plan of harvesting.

They said that the women normally pick more than 40 pounds before taking the produce in for weighing.

W. V. Chamberlin, Turner, Oregon Bean Growers Assn., said bean sacks should not contain more than 50 pounds to avoid bruising the beans, but that most workers would be able to hold more than that.

Gerald W. Detering, Harrisburg, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, said farm workers generally pick from 30 to 80 pounds.

Then C. S. Kinney, Medford, representing the Fruit Growers League, pointed out that women would be permitted, under the proposed regulation, to move 42-pound ladders in orchards.

Henry S. Howard, Eugene, chairman of the Wage and Hour Commission, said the commission would rule soon on the proposed regulation.

Robber Of Bank Robbers Starts Serving Term
HOUSTON, Tex. — A former Harris County deputy sheriff surrendered Friday to begin an eight-year prison sentence for robbing an Oregon bank robber.

"It's an oddity when a man gets convicted for robbing a bank robber," said Jack W. Lyles, 34, after being placed in a cell at the U.S. marshal's office.

Lyles was convicted last May of transporting stolen bank money across a state line.

Testimony showed he followed to New Orleans one of two men who took \$57,000 from a bank at Umatilla, Ore., in 1955, and stole \$22,000 from the man's hotel room and brought it to Houston. Lyles was arrested here by FBI agents.

An appeal was denied last week by the 5th Circuit Court at New Orleans.

Uranium Heiress Seeks Divorce From Spouse
SPOKANE — Mrs. Lucille Boyd Gallegos, Spokane's uranium heiress, filed suit for divorce this week, contending she lived with her husband for only two weeks after their marriage in 1946.

She also asked that all of her uranium holdings on the Spokane Indian Reservation, now held in guardianship, be declared her separate property.

In the divorce action, she said she and her husband, John, hadn't been together in five years.

Another Milestone Reached In Rapid Communication; Installation Being Made

Another milestone in rapid communication soon will be in use in Roseburg and other southern Oregon communities.

Several Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. employees from the area currently are taking a four-week course of training in Portland to learn installation and maintenance of a new phone system developed especially for small businesses.

The new equipment features semi-automatic handling of inward calls to a busy extension; self dialing of outward calls and inter-office calls; and handling of night calls without an attendant.

It is also possible to dictate by telephone to a central location and automatic dial paging, according to company reports.

The News-Review will be the first business in southern Oregon to have one of the systems. It is now being installed.

Roseburg men taking the training course at the plant school in Portland are PBX installers Jack Mason, 3141 NE Johnson, and John Elliott, 1624 W. Ann Ave.

Speeding calls and at the same time reducing the number of calls handled by a receptionist, the new equipment reportedly will eliminate about 40 per cent of the telephone chores around an office.

The miniature equipment allows packaging in three containers requiring only about 12 square feet of space.
