Huskies Eye Henley Race

Washington's powerful huskies open their campaign today for a trip to the Royal Henley Regatta in England while the eastern powers, headed by unbeaten Yale and Harvard, get their final tuneups for the eastern sprint championships a week later.

Barred from the intercollegiate flower, Assa championship because of an NCAA ban, the tall, veteran Washington oarsmen have been promised a journey to London for the storied regatta on the Thames in July if they have an all-winning season.

This would give them a crack at one and maybe more eastern crews as well as foreign eight in the ancient regatta.

Open Against California

Coach Al (Dutch) Ulbricksen will boat seven seniors and one sophomore in the three-mile opener against California on the Oakland estuary. The Huskies are big favorites. Two other regattas are on the schedule. They row against Stanford and British Columbia on Lake Washington May 24, and against British Columbia again at Lake Washington on May 31.

Crews from almost every other section of the country will match sweeps in five regattas in the East.

Yale, which has four of its Olympic champions of 1936 back for another season, faces two strong contenders in Cornell and Princeton in the Carnegie Cup regatta at Carnegie Lake, Princeton, N. J.

Harvard opposes Navy and Pennsylvania for the Adams Cup on the Charles at Cambridge, Mass. There will be plenty of action on the Charles. The river also will be the site for the competition matching Wisconsin, Columbia, Boston University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The biggest flotilla of the day will be based on the Schuylkill at Philadelphia for the annual Dad Vail regatta. Sixteen crews have been entered in the championship race.

West Coast Relays' Field Totals 1,608

FRESNO, Calif. — Clear skies, breezes and a lightning fast track were forecast for Saturday's 32nd annual West Coast Relays.

Quantity and quality were represented in a record-breaking field of 1,608 athletes.

A blazing pace is expected in the distance medley relay (440-880-1,320-mile) Saturday night, as the final baton pass will send some of the finest milers in the nation in pursuit of a new American record.

Set Record

Last year the Los Angeles striders set a U.S. record of 9:42 in the event with Jerome Walters beating California's Don Bowden in a blazing finish.

Bowden, the only native American who has run the mile in less than four minutes, is back. His 4:03.5 is the best mile in this country this year. He'll be striding against strong competition that includes Canadian Norman Lloyd of Stanford, Bob Shankland of Southern Cal, Gail Hodgson of Oklahoma and Ty Hadley of Occidental.

The Oklahoma Sooners should provide some of the sharpest uprisings. The Oklahomaans turned in fine performances at the Kansas Relays and, with attention focused on the promised duels among California entrants, could streak away with the distance relay crowns.

Sprinter Dee Givens captured the 100-yard dash in the Kansas Relays for the Sooners and he's expected to provide the big competition to San Jose State's Ray Norton. Norton has matched the 9.3 world record in last year's 100.

California's Willie White could surprise both of them.

Fresno State's top sprinter, Mike Agostini, will pass up the dash events to anchor the Bulldogs in the relay races. Mike finished third behind Bobby Morrow and Leamon King in last year's 100.

Agostini, a doubtful starter after he injured a leg last week, ripped off a blazing 330-yard sprint Thursday in 23.6.
