MONROE, N. C. — An insurance company, noting racial unrest in Union County, has canceled automobile insurance of a Negro leader.

The Nationwide Insurance Co. dropped inachist Robert F. Williams' collision and comprehensive coverage, effective today.

Williams, as president of the county chapter of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People, has been a figure in several controversies in the area, 20 miles southeast of Charlotte.

The firm first canceled all of Williams' automobile insurance, but decided to reinstate his liability and medical payments coverage, enough for Williams to retain his car license.

Violent Storms Continue To Lash Areas Of Texas

More violent storms pounded sections of weather-weary Texas today, with tornado winds, hail and heavy downpours.

Tornado funnels were reported in the Texas plains, several in the area near Lubbock, a city of 140,000. Severe thunderstorms broke out late last night in west central Texas, with gusty winds, hail and rain. Winds up to 75 m.p.h. lashed Plainview in a severe thunderstorm. Hail stones as big as baseballs pelted New Deal, near Lubbock. No casualties were reported.

Need Of More County Library Service Cited

Officials have signed requests for service.

Public Law 597 has brought Oregon \$116,947 and, as of June 30, 1958, the state has provided \$77,259 to give new stimulus to Oregon libraries, under laws passed in 1957.

Accomplishments since funds received in May last year included: Extension librarians from State Library have visited 32 counties; exhibit bookmobile has been displayed in 13 counties; three demonstration bookmobiles have been placed on loan-lease, one in Eastern Oregon and two in Western Oregon; five projects have received 6,461 new books from purchases made at the State Library; grants-in-aid to participating counties total \$97,180.

It was pointed out at the meeting here that interest is high but funds are limited. It is not possible to begin to investigate what they can do, since local funds must finance enlarged programs ultimately.

"Federal financing is scheduled to end in 1961, then what?" was also a discussion topic. The question was answered in that priority will be given project plans which give evidence of willingness of libraries to combine into larger units and ability of service to succeed after grants-in-aid cease.

Legal framework of financing libraries was explained in the following ways: Oregon's county and regional library law makes provision for the County Court to establish a library in several different ways: The County Court may levy a library tax to establish a county library; contract with another county to provide a regional library service under the law outlined above; and contract with an existing city library for rural library service.

Since the Oregon law is permissive, petitions are not essential, unless the County Court refuses to take action, feeling need of an expression of public opinion via the ballot.

Planning Procedure Needed

Local planning process includes getting acquainted with Oregon law. Planners should determine if the library and the library board at the county seat favor co-operation. Their approval is desirable. Secure financial data regarding county's ability to support libraries and prepare a plan which is intelligent and feasible. Next, sell the idea to some sponsor, getting some group to sponsor a petition requesting the County Court to put the library budget on the ballot so all people may have better reading opportunities.

Proceeding the morning meeting was a breakfast at the Swedish Dining Room with Miss Gloria Coffey of New Delhi, India, now working in the Eugene Public Library, as guest speaker. Born in Calcutta, she attended English schools which required five courses as compulsory, preferably nine, including algebra, languages, and literature.

Miss Coffey reported libraries are a small group in New Delhi, with only six universities giving library courses. There are over 500 languages, 12 major ones, which create a big problem in publishing books. She also stated that more than five per cent of India's population is illiterate.

The conference closed with a luncheon at the Country Club, with Helen Bliss giving her inaugural address as next president of OLA.

She stressed the need for recruitment in the librarianship profession, stating that an all out recruit program is now in progress from the national ALA office, involving an in-service staff training program, especially for larger libraries.

Last year's president, Bernard Van Horne, stated, "the trustees are the bridge for libraries with governmental bodies and citizens."

He said, "a trustee program should be undertaken to keep them well informed, and the OLA should work intensively on trustee education."

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Strikers Watch Train Operated By Other Hands

MONTREAL — Striking firemen on the Canadian Pacific Railway watched the resumption of full-scale weekday schedules today to gauge the effectiveness of their nationwide walkout.

The CPR, one of Canada's two transcontinental lines, ran the majority of its scheduled Sunday trains with crews of company supervisory personnel and members of other railroad unions who walked through the firemen's picket lines.

The 3,000-member Brotherhood of Firemen and Enginemen began the strike at 6 a.m. yesterday, the time the CPR planned to start its program for gradually abolishing firemen on freight and yard diesel engines.

The dispute, which provoked a CPR strike 16 months ago, also confronts the many U. S. lines and Canada's other cross-country railroad, the Canadian National. All have switched to oil-burning diesels and claim they no longer need firemen to shovel coal.

Diesel units do more than 70 per cent of the work on CPR's 17,000 miles of track.

Government-sponsored efforts to end the strike continued in Montreal.

Nixon leaves tomorrow for Caracas, Venezuela, where dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez was recently ousted.

Ontario city patrolman Lloyd Leach suffered a wound above the right kidney when he tried to stop a fight between two persons at an Ontario dance hall. Two Mexican farm workers—John Correa, 18, and Palmo Sanchez, 20—were taken into custody and held for questioning.

Theodore McKillip, 30, suffered stab wounds in the chest, abdomen and arms while he was in a taxi at St. Paul. He said that a farm laborer attacked him without provocation.
