Stan (The Man) Musial is still shy two hits of becoming the eighth player in major league history to reach the 3,000-hit pinnacle but anyone who says he isn't the greatest star ever spawned by the

National League is certain to get an argument.
The brilliant St. Louis Cardinal first baseman almost made it Sunday. He rapped five hits as the Redbirds came from behind with ninth-inning rallies to overcome the Chicago Cubs twice 8-7 and 6-5 for a sweep of the four-game series. One of his hits was his fifth home run of the campaign.

Stan needed a perfect five for five in the nightcap for his 3,000 hits. He singled his first three times at bat. But in his final two appearances, the 37-year-old batting specialist struck out and grounded out, and he had to settle for a mere .494 season average, exactly 107 points higher than his nearest competitor.

Record Outstanding
Musial ranks first in the league in lifetime total bases (5,106), first in long hits (1,171), second in extra bases (2,108), second in runs batted in (1,389), second in home runs (396), second in doubles (620), fifth in runs scored (1,677) and fourth in hits.

Milwaukee ran its winning streak to seven straight with a 7-6 triumph over Cincinnati. Pittsburgh moved into a second place tie with San Francisco, one game behind the Braves, sweeping a twin bill from Philadelphia 10-4 and 1-0 in 11 innings. Rain forced postponement of the Giants' Los Angeles game in San Francisco.

American League managers learned Sunday they no longer can rely on pitchers' previous performances against a particular team. Those who were supposed to win were beaten and those who figured to lose were successful.

The most pronounced examples were Arnold Portocarrero, Camilo Pascual, Jack Urban, Jim Wilson, Bobby Shantz and Billy Pierce.

Oracles Sweep Sox
Portocarrero, making his first start since Baltimore obtained him from Kansas City, combined with George Zuverink to shut out Boston as the Orioles swept a doubleheader from the Red Sox 3-2 and 4-0. The big right-hander had never beaten the Red Sox.

Pascual, with only one previous victory over New York in 12 decisions, shut out the Yankees 4-0 after the American League leaders had beaten Washington 4-3 in the first game of the doubleheader. Bobby Shantz beat the Senators, to whom he had bowed 12 previous times in 22 decisions.

Detroit handed Kansas City its sixth straight defeat, 10-3, clubbing Urban for eight runs before they shelled him out in the eighth. The Athletics' right-hander had never before been beaten by the Tigers.

Jim Wilson pitched the Chicago White Sox to a 3-2 triumph over Cleveland after the Indians had won the first game 4-2. Wilson had a 4-9 lifetime record against the Tribe. On the other hand Billy Pierce, whom the Indians whipped in the opener, for his third loss without a victory this season, has beaten Cleveland 27 times.

Card Streak Now Four

Irv Noren and Hobie Landrith delivered game-winning ninth-inning hits as the Cards won their third and fourth in a row after seven straight losses. Noren's drive off the right field screen scored Curt Flood after Del Ennis had singled in the tying run in the opener. Landrith drove in two with a bases loaded single and a third run, the winning tally, crossed the plate when Bobby Thomson fumbled the ball in center.

Bob Porterfield, a waiver purchase from Boston, pitched a brilliant 11-inning shutout in a duel with Philadelphia's Curt Simmons as the Pirates swept a four-game series with the Phillies. The 33-year-old right-hander allowed eight hits for his first victory of the year. R. C. Stevens, thrice a strikeout victim of Simmons, singled in the winning run, after Dick Groat opened the 11th with a single and advanced to second on a sacrifice.

Del Crandall's three-run double in the eighth overcame a 5-4 Cincinnati lead and gave the Braves their fourth victory in five games with the Reds.

San Francisco Giants Popular

SAN FRANCISCO — The San Francisco Giants hit the road today after cutting a wide swath—both on the field and at the box office—in their first stand in new home territory.

On the field, their 15-9 won-loss record puts them just a game behind first place Milwaukee. Attendance for the first 20 home dates totals 304,257, an average of 15,213. The New York Polo Grounds total for the same period last season was 182,285.

Vice president Chub Zeeny said 21,000 seats were sold for yesterday's rained out series finale with Los Angeles. It was the first major league postponement on the West Coast.

The Giants, victors over the Dodgers six of eight times, head back to Los Angeles on the start of a three-week trip. The two teams played a three-game series in Dodgerland the first week of the season.

Manager Bill Rigney, who hopes to make it five in a row tonight for the Giants, is pitching right-hander Ruben Gomez, 2-2. Walt Alston will try to break a three-game Dodger losing streak with right-hander Don Drysdale, 1-5.

After two games in the Coliseum, the Giants go to St. Louis, Chicago, Cincinnati, Milwaukee, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and back to St. Louis before returning to play the Milwaukee June 3.

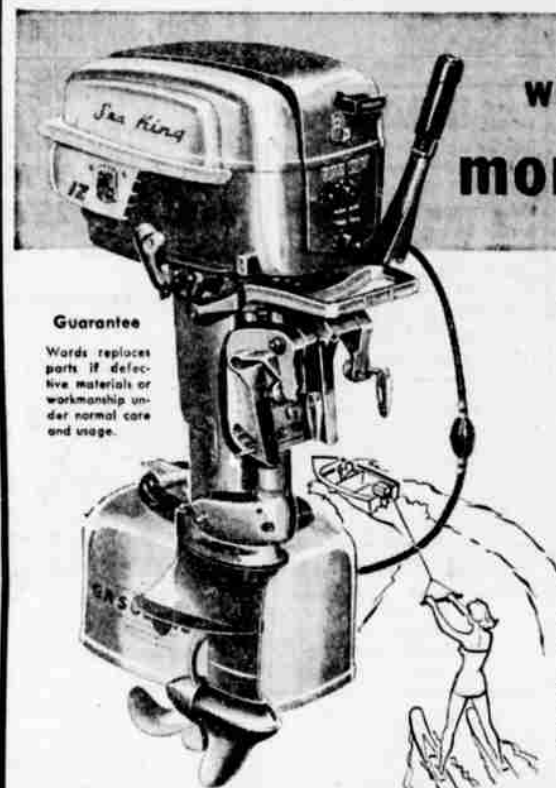
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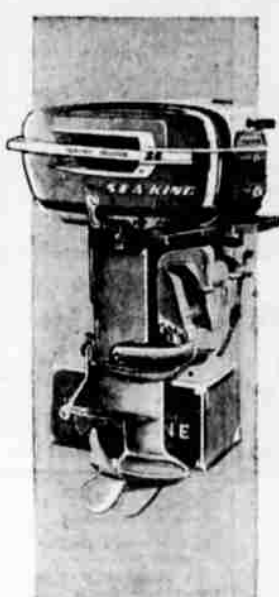
