Inland Empire Waterways Asks Additional Moneys For Dams, Harbor Work

WASHINGTON — A \$1,972,000 increase in the administration's \$76,323,000 budget requested for multipurpose dams on the Columbia and Lower Snake Rivers was asked Wednesday by the Inland Empire Waterways Assn.

A major item in the increase, asked by executive secretary Herbert G. West, would boost the \$550,000 asked for planning on Lower Monumental Dam by \$1,450,000 to permit construction to get under way on the Snake River project.

In a statement prepared for a House Appropriations subcommittee, West also asked Congress to make available \$250,000 each for planning on Little Goose and Lower Granite dams, \$19,000 for preconstruction planning on the Coos-Millcoma Rivers navigation channel and \$3,000 for the Charleston-South Slough, both in the Coos Bay, Ore., area.

Amounts Essential
West said the unbudgeted amounts he sought "are essential and vital to keep our program of power generation forging ahead

and to secure extension of navigation into Lewiston, Idaho, on the Snake River at the earliest possible time."

West, of Walla Walla, Wash., said the two million dollars proposed for Lower Monumental Dam would permit pre-construction planning and determination of an exact location, and allow for preparation of access roads and the engineers' town in anticipation of a full-fledged construction schedule the following year.

Planning on Lower Granite — most upstream of the four dams proposed for the Lower Snake River — "is imperative at this time," he said, to permit location of the Lewis and Clark Highway. Money for the highway, to run from Missoula, Mont., to Lewiston, Idaho, and Clarkston, Wash., is included in the highway appropriation bill pending in Congress.

Absolute Minimum
In supporting the administration's \$76,323,000 water project request, West described the proposals as "an absolute minimum" for the Columbia and Snake River systems.

Major items in the amount include \$2 1/2 million for Ice Harbor Dam, 13 1/2 million for The Dalles Dam, 13 million for Hills Creek Dam and 8 million for John Day Dam.

West said the addition to existing capacity of eight million kilowatts of generating capacity to be made available at dams now under construction by private, local public, and federal interests would assure the Pacific Northwest of sufficient generating capacity under adverse water conditions to meet anticipated demands until 1963-1964.

He emphasized, however, that other projects must be started now "to meet an expected doubling of the present power load by 1968 and 1969."

Yoncalla Council To Investigate Light Installation

Yoncalla City Council recently decided to contact Douglas Electric Co-op about the cost of installing a street light on the Rice Valley Road between the present light on Timmons corner and the city limits.

V. Duncan, Norman Stapleman and Noble Snider were appointed as a committee to see about building an equipment shed to house the city pick-up, grader and gravel truck.

Mayor Dickey reported the Public Health Department had sprayed all open ditches to combat mosquitoes.

Three Yoncalla streets were named. The road north of town starting at Schieman's corner north to the Pontius property will be called Oak St.; the road leading to the cemetery will be known as Pine Ave., and the road to Hayhurst Valley as Hayhurst Road.

All bills were ordered paid, reports correspondent Mrs. George Edes.

The youths, all students at Cottage Grove High School, will appear in Municipal Court Wednesday morning.

Jones, who is attending a police convention in Roseburg, said he isn't certain what the charge against the youths will be.

He said they admitted planting the explosive charge from a roman candle in a newspaper box at the teachers' residence.

The device exploded with a roar and ripped the paper box off the porch.

Bids To Be Opened On State Hospital At Wilsonville

SALEM — Bids will be opened June 17 on the 6 million dollar first unit of the F. H. Dam-masch State Hospital at Wilsonville, the state Board of Control decided Tuesday.

The new hospital eventually will cost more than 15 million dollars. The first unit will have 470 beds. The state has \$5,300,000 appropriated by the Legislature for the first unit, and hopes to get at least \$700,000 from the federal government.

The board announced it would begin charging the counties for court-ordered psychiatric examinations of persons charged with crimes. The charge will be \$8.07 per day at the state hospital, and \$6.67 per day at the Eastern Oregon State Hospital at Pendleton.

The examinations generally run for 30 days.

Mrs. Florence Reed Cook, Eugene, who said she had spent six years studying the Oregon State Penitentiary, asked the board to permit her to form a group to help rehabilitate prisoners while they are still in the institution.

The board appeared cool toward her idea, with Secretary of State Mark Hatfield asserting that outside groups might interfere with the prison program.

Mrs. Cook, describing her plan as similar to that of Alcoholics Anonymous, said the prison needs a better program to prepare convicts for release.

She attacked the prison's "questionable policies and practices," and added that the prison officers are chosen from low intelligence groups.

She said group counseling is needed for the inmates, and that there should be more emphasis on treatment.

She said she is starting an "honor club" in Lane County to provide recreational, library and social facilities for ex-convicts.

Cattlemen's Assn. Asks For State Sales Tax

ONTARIO, Ore. — The Oregon Cattlemen's Assn., holding its annual meeting here, called Tuesday for the next Legislature to pass a sales tax.

The money from this should be used to reduce income and property taxes, the resolution said.

Other resolutions urged stricter enforcement of hunting regulations.

Delegates called for the state to revoke the hunting license of anyone convicted of deliberately destroying or injuring livestock.

They also called for a law to ban carrying a loaded gun in an automobile. They want hunting licenses to be lifted from three years to life for careless use of firearms and from one to two years for trespassing.
