

Nuclear Submarine Sneaks Past Craft Sent To Detect It

SAN DIEGO, Calif. — The atomic-powered submarine Nautilus sneaked past a squadron of destroyers, helicopters, patrol planes and other submarines sent out to track it down Monday and reached San Diego Harbor undetected.

Mission of the Nautilus was to enter a patrolled area 100 miles southwest of San Diego and arrive at the harbor entrance without being detected and "sunk" by defending forces.

Cmdr. W.R. Anderson, the sub's skipper, told newsmen aboard that the mission was "highly successful." He said he was confident the boat slipped through the anti-submarine gauntlet undetected and unseen.

The operation was witnessed first-hand by a party of 25 observers, headed by Rear Adm. M.E. Hubbard, commander of Cruiser Division 3.

The Nautilus employed the same tricks that an enemy sub would use in an attempt to sneak within missile-launching range of defense targets in the San Diego area.

Observers said that by the time the Nautilus surfaced about eight miles off the harbor entrance, it had proved its ability to cruise underwater so fast, dive to such great depths and maneuver with such agility that anti-submarine forces will have to improve considerably to cope with an atomic-powered foe beneath the sea.

The Nautilus, which came here from the East Coast, will visit other West Coast ports before leaving about the middle of June for Groton, Conn.

Legion Pledges Support Of Defense Proposal

ST. LOUIS — The American Legion's support of President Eisenhower's Pentagon reorganization plan was pledged Saturday by the organization's national commander. But he said more men and arms are needed to insure the nation's security.

John S. Gleason Jr. of Chicago said at an American Legion Founder's Day celebration there is "compelling cause to be concerned about national security."

"If Russia is now denied and can be prevented from attaining superior nuclear, missile and air strength," Gleason said, "it certainly commands unchallenged supremacy in conventional military arms."

Brucellosis Testing Law To Be Tested In Court

CONCON — The state law on testing cattle for brucellosis will be taken to the Oregon Supreme Court, Gilliam County rancher John Murtha said Monday.

The law, passed by the last Legislature, gives the state the right to test all cattle to eliminate the disease, also known as Bangs disease.

The law was upheld in a Marion County circuit court recently. The Marion County decision will be appealed to the higher court soon, Murtha said.

He said that stockmen opposing the law are willing to vaccinate their cattle, but consider compulsory testing of the animals on the open range as impractical.

Wool Growers Are Told To Consider World Wool Price

Local wool growers are being advised to take into consideration world wool prices as well as domestic price levels when marketing their products this year.

J. F. Bonebrake, chairman of the Douglas County Agricultural and Conservation Committee, said today free selling early in the marketing year under conditions of uncertainty in the wool textile industry could result in a low national average price which would unnecessarily increase payments and the cost of the incentive program.

"While market prices differ greatly for the wide range of grades and classes of wool produced," Bonebrake said, "each individual grower should market to get the best possible price for his quality of wool."

The agent advises selling wool when market prices are highest in order to receive more money at sale time and larger payments under the incentive program.

Lower Than Usual

"During the period of wool price decline in recent months, wool prices in the U.S. have become lower than usual in relation to reported prices in the world market. Prices being offered growers for their wool may be reflecting a situation comparable to that which existed in late 1955 and early 1956," Bonebrake said.

"At this time prices in the domestic market were lower than usual relative to reported world wool prices."

The chairman said it is impossible at this time to predict precisely the rate of incentive payment to be made in the summer of 1959 on wool sold during the current marketing year. The rate will be figured on the basis of a national average price received by all producers who sell during the 12-month period.

"This national average is a 'weighted' average, and will depend on the course of wool prices from now through next March and the volume of wool sold each month," he explained.

Growers, in selling their wool during the marketing year, will determine the national average price for the year," Bonebrake said.

Hopes For Strike Settlement Seen

PORTLAND — Hope of an early settlement of the strike of laborers which has shut down most major heavy construction projects in Oregon, rested Tuesday in the Federal Mediation Service.

Union and Associated General Contractors representatives are to meet with a mediation commissioner Wednesday morning, and a union spokesman said he would call for arbitration if settlement is not reached.

Talks Monday before the executive board of the Portland Labor Council were fruitless. Glenn Blake, council president, said Monday night that the council had proposed help toward a settlement and if one is not reached by Wednesday he will call for arbitration.

Laborers struck at the start of last week at some jobs and contractors closed others. At issue, principally, was when a wage increase would be effective.

Contractors proposed the increase at the time of contract signing. The Union demanded it be retroactive to Jan. 1.
