

Interim Highway Committee Meets Slated Next Week

A meeting of the Legislative Interim Highway Committee will be held in Salem Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday next week to gather opinions of proposed legislation, Rep. Al Flegel, chairman, said Thursday.

He said representatives of various organizations had been invited to submit their views to the committee on these subjects:

License plates for farm trucks, Monday, 9 a.m.

Licensing of fixed-load vehicles, Monday 1:30 p.m.

Public Utilities Commission control over log trucks, Tuesday, 1:30 p.m.

Tuesday morning, the committee will meet with representatives of the Highway Department to discuss problems relating to acquisition of real property for right of way, access control and other matters which came to the committee's attention at 23 hearings over the state in March and April.

Flegel said the Monday and Tuesday sessions with farm and industry organizations aren't in the nature of hearings. Each of the subjects up for discussion were on the committee's agenda at its hearing over the state.

The committee's purpose, he said, is to obtain view of various organizations and attempt to reach a common ground on any subject where minor differences of opinion may exist.

Following Tuesday afternoon's session with log haulers, the committee expects to go into executive session to review the extensive material gathered on a number of subjects at the statewide hearings, and to bring to form recommendations to be incorporated into a report to be made to the governor and 1959 Legislature.

It is expected the deliberations will continue through Wednesday morning.

Beirut Shaken Again By Blasts

BEIRUT, Lebanon (U.P.) — Beirut was shaken again Thursday by explosions, sniping from building tops and battles between police and anti-government rioters.

Seven bombs exploded during the night but calm generally prevailed until midmorning. Then rioters surged through the streets in demonstrations against the pro-Western government of President Camille Chamoun.

An explosion rocked the Place de Canon in the heart of the business district and several persons were killed. Police quickly cordoned off the area and rounded up more than 100 people.

Snipers on the roofs of buildings fired at people in the streets and hands of demonstrators fought to disrupt normal life in the city.

The United States is flying anti-riot weapons to Lebanon, where disturbances have been under way for six days.

Roseburg High School's May Fete Set Friday

The major event at Roseburg High School this week will be the annual May Fete.

The Friday evening program will include demonstrations of baton twirling, tennis, high jumping and tumbling.

One of the highlights of the evening will be the crowning of the fete king and queen. Only seniors taking physical education will be eligible to become the reigning monarchs over the fete. They will be selected as the result of votes in all physical education classes.

The queen will appoint two princesses from each class. The princesses, in turn, will name their own escorts.

The fete is scheduled to begin at 8.

Peeping Tom Routed By Shots From Gun

A peeping Tom reportedly was routed with several shots Wednesday night, according to the sheriff's office.

Mrs. Ed Hartz, 2485 Diamond Lake Blvd., told deputies that one of her tenants, Bobby Meyers, had fired two or three shots at a man who had been peeping in a bathroom window.

The incident is being investigated by a deputy.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. Monday in the Chapel of the Roses, Dr. Eugene A. Gerlitz of the First Baptist Church will officiate. Interment will follow in the Burt Cemetery at Roseburg.

Nixons Given Huge Welcome Upon Return

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Nixons in Peru and Venezuela will, in the end, strengthen inter-American ties, Eisenhower said it would have this result because the American nations in their common association resent any communist leadership against their unity and interest.

Eisenhower spoke of the anti-United States demonstration as "some unpleasant incidents" which on occasion has prevented real danger and risk of injury not only to the Vice President but to his wife, Pat.

In Eisenhower's audience were top Latin American diplomats headed by Ambassador Guillermo Savilla Sacasa of Nicaragua, dean of the diplomatic corps, and Ambassador Eduardo Garcia of Argentina, president of the Organization of American States.

Attributed to Minority

Nixon in a minority to Eisenhower, attributed the mob attacks to "a small minority who did not understand" the purposes of the United States.

He said the "great majority of the people in all walks of life are friendly to the United States today."

Nixon offered that as the principle observation of his eight-nation tour.

Eisenhower paid high personal tribute to Nixon and after Nixon wound up his response they climbed into an open top automobile and rode together into the city. Mrs. Nixon and the Nixon girls rode with them.

Four Boys Die When Trapped In Load Of Salt

DETROIT (U.P.) — Four schoolboys trying to ride a load of salt out the bottom of a railroad hopper car suffocated yesterday when they got stuck in the chute and buried in the avalanche.

Would-be rescuers, called by the victims' two playmates, dug with their bare hands, garbage can covers and other makeshift tools in a desperate attempt to free the trapped youngsters.

They were too late. Only one of the four was alive when freed and he died soon afterward.

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Bolivian Rebels Flee City They Captured Earlier

LA PAZ, Bolivia (U.P.) — Bolivian rebels have fled from the city of Santa Cruz in eastern Bolivia, President Hernan Siles Suazo announced Thursday.

The rebels were made up of members of the Bolivian Falange and Communists, the government reported Wednesday in proclaiming a nationwide state of siege, a modified form of martial law.

Siles Suazo ordered the air force to bomb rebel posts in Santa Cruz but the revolutionists fled before the planes got into action, the Santa Cruz army commander reported.

There was no mention in the government announcement of the situation at Camiri and Choreti, in Santa Cruz province, where the rebels moved against local garrisons Wednesday.

La Paz was quiet Thursday morning.

An official spokesman said the rebel army was to stir up a national revolt that would interfere with parliamentary elections in June and prevent the return of former President Victor Paz Estenssoro, who has been ambassador to London for two years. He heads the government MNR party, the National Revolutionary Movement.

Opinion Clarifies Law Covering Moved Voters

The law governing voting by registered voters who have moved within the state after registration closed has been clarified in an attorney general's opinion.

Wednesday, Charles Doerner, Douglas County clerk, received the opinion from the attorney general.

It states that if a registered voter changes residence within the state after the final day for registration, he may vote a full ballot in his new precinct if he obtains a certificate of registration from the county clerk in the county where he previously resided.

The attorney general holds that this voting right applies whether the voter has moved from one county to another or only from one precinct to another within the county.

Doerner has notified all election boards of the opinion and asked that they treat accordingly all persons voting in certificate of registration who are willing to sign an affidavit that they have moved within the 30-day period before election day.

Asks Sewer Easement

The city of Roseburg submitted a request asking that a sewer easement be granted to the city for use in minor respects. The city wants an easement through a portion of the track and football field at the high school. Under an agreement the city would agree to protect school property and leave the property in a condition equal or better than it is at the present time.

The board voted to ask city officials if it would be possible to go through the area with the sewer line without crossing the track.

Four bids for fencing school property next to the Veterans Administration Hospital were rejected. All of the bids were too high. Bidders were Umpqua Concrete Products, Colorado Fuel and Iron, Cyclone Fence Co. and San Jose Steel Co.

A total of \$750 was authorized for construction of a wire fence around the shop storage area next to Edenhower School on Garden Valley Boulevard. The fence will be eight feet high with a barb wire overhang. Purpose of the fence will be to protect equipment from vandalism, theft and breakage.

A recommendation that the district's string music program be expanded or eliminated was tabled until the Roseburg School Evaluation Steering Committee makes its report which is expected to be out mid-summer. The board's decision will be made on the basis of the evaluation report.

Approval was given to a recommendation calling for custodial personnel to attend a school on heat plant operation and maintenance, furniture repair and refinishing, interior and exterior painting. The school is scheduled to be held in Roseburg, July 9, 10 and 11.

In other business before the board, Deller read a letter from the County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg thanking the Roseburg School District for making the recent county school board annual spring meeting a success.

The meeting was held April 29 at Fullerton School. The Roseburg board served as host for the event.

More than an hour and a half was taken up with a discussion of \$1,379.48 due on student insurance at the high school. The board decided to pay the sum at the end of the school year, after money has been collected from several sources for that purpose.

Lightning-Fast Missile Fired At Test Center

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (U.P.) — A lightning-fast missile streaked away at 11:02 a.m. (EST) trailing a stream of orange flame. It hugged close to the Atlantic and was out of sight in less than five seconds.

Just before it disappeared, a tank dived away into the ocean. This probably was the missile's booster rocket.

The Air Force announced minutes later that a missile was launched but no details were released. Officials usually identify the weapon when announcing a test shot.

The Bull Goose, produced by Fairchild Corp., is one of the newest weapons in the U.S. arsenal designed to deceive the enemy by simulating the "return" or echo of an airplane on a radar screen.

The missile flashed off about a minute after two Air Force jets swept over the cape. The two planes probably were "chase" aircraft which follow a missile along its flight course.

Mother Child Electrocuted

DENISON, Tex. (U.P.) — Sixteen persons sat horrified and helpless in a wrecked intercity bus Thursday as they watched a baby die in the mud until she finally was touched by a broken power line and died. Her mother, rushing to aid her, was killed by the electricity.

Electricity charged the metal of the bus itself and passengers probably would have been instantly killed had they made contact with the wreckage.

The bus skidded off a rain-slick highway and knocked down a power pole.

The child, Melanie Jane Stith, about 1½ years, was thrown from the bus in the crash.

Her mother, Mrs. Shirley Stith, about 21, of Fort Worth, Tex., jumped from the bus to rescue her baby and died, apparently instantly.

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and 11 feet 9 inches high. That would be large enough to be seen from earth with the naked eye under proper lighting conditions.

The three U.S. satellites circle the globe in a narrower band that extends about half as far on either side of the equator. Two of them, Explorer I and III, are tube-shaped objects about 80 inches long and the third, Vanguard I, is a sphere 6.4 inches across.

President Nasser of the United Arab Republic, on a state visit to the Soviet Union, was among the first to learn of the launching.

Members of his party said Nasser was informed of the Soviet success just before he drove to Khabarsk Airfield outside Moscow for an inspection of the Soviet's latest war planes.

The Soviet people first heard of their new sputnik from Moscow Radio at noon Thursday. The Tass announcement was distributed at the same hour. A few minutes later the first sound of the new satellite's radio transmitter was broadcast by Moscow Radio.

The new satellite's radio signal as rebroadcast by Moscow Radio was a repetition of "dot dash dot dot" in a high musical tone.

The satellite's announcement did not indicate the latest space traveler's speed, as it had in announcing both previous launchings.

The satellite carries solar batteries—which last for long periods because they draw their power from the sun—in addition to chemical batteries.

Born in Boston, Mass., the son of a Unitarian clergyman came to Hawaii in 1899 when he was 22.

Military Rule Covers Most Of Algeria Today

ALGIERS (U.P.) — Military rule covered almost all of tinidbox Algeria Thursday amid signs that the army command is leaning more and more toward local right wingers and away from the new government in Paris.

Gen. Raoul Salan, French commander-in-chief in Algeria, appeared on the balcony of the government headquarters building Thursday surrounded by the local "Committee of Public Safety" which seized control in the North African capital Tuesday.

Salan, who is regarded in Paris as a Loyalist, shouted at a crowd of several thousand: "Long Live France! Long Live French Algeria! Long live Gen. De Gaulle!"

At Salan's side was paratroop Gen. Jacques Massu, chief of the local military-civilian Committee of Public Safety, which had demanded a strong-man government in Paris under De Gaulle, the wartime Free French leader.

De Gaulle has maintained a tight silence on his plans, if any. But in Paris De Gaulle's office announced he soon may take a stand in the crisis.

There are now about 130 local committees of public safety throughout Algeria. In most cases the local military commander is either a member or the nominal power behind the group.

The committees are charged to maintain contact between the army and the population—by-passing the civilian administration.

Communications between Algeria and France were still at a minimum. Some press calls were getting through but there were no civilian communications. No ships or planes, outside of those approved by the military, were getting through. The French government was holding in its Mediterranean ports the ships which normally would have been en route here.

Sutherlin Votes Friday On Levies

Three special levies will be on the Sutherlin city budget which will be voted on Friday. The budget calls for \$38,418.49 outside the 6 per cent limitation.

One of the special levies calls for \$3,500 to defray costs for flood control on Cooper and Sutherlin Creeks within the city limits, while the other levy totals \$1,800 to defray costs of a summer recreational program which would be administered by the City Park Commission.

The new budget, if approved, will cost the taxpayers about 28.6 mills, Herb Osaki, News-Review correspondent, reports. If the two special levies are passed it will add approximately two mills.

Yoncalla To Vote On Budget Figure

Yoncalla residents will go to the polls Friday to vote upon a budget calling for a levy of \$2,200.23 outside the 6 per cent limitation.

Total estimated expenditures are \$34,883 as compared with \$38,720 on the present operating budget. Total levy needed to balance the budget is \$9,800.

One special levy will be on the ballot. That levy calls for \$2,500 a year to be used as a sinking fund for a future sewer system. The levy would run for five years.

Members of the Budget Committee are Herschel Phillips, Lee Blickenstaff, Stewart Mathis, Lowell Anderson, Joel Farrell and city council members.

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
