Blind Man Aided In Finding Place To Sleep In City

A 60-year-old blind transient found a place to sleep early Wednesday, thanks to the generosity of a railroad conductor and a helping hand by Roseburg police.

An officer answered a call for assistance from a downtown cafe. Upon his arrival, he was asked by the sightless man if he knew where he could sleep. The man, who said his name was Alphonzo Dinnies Robertson, said he wanted to sleep and then to make his way to the highway.

He told the officer that he desired to return to his home state of Texas.

Robertson mentioned that he had been a Southern Pacific employee in Spokane for some 28 years. The officer took him to the Roseburg railroad depot in hopes Robertson could sleep there.

The pair met the conductor in the depot. The latter gave Robertson money for use in obtaining his bed.

The policeman escorted Robertson to a hotel room and the man at last had found his place to sleep.

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Portland Can Get Federal Funds If Voters Okay Job

WASHINGTON (U.P.) — Portland can get an advance of more than 11 million dollars in federal funds for a big urban renewal project if its voters act favorably Friday on a ballot measure.

In making the announcement Wednesday, the government said that to qualify for the money, the city must put up one million dollars for the project in the southwest district of Portland.

The ballot measure calls for a five-year tax levy to raise \$400,000 annually for the urban renewal project.

R. L. Steiner, Urban Rural Administration commissioner, said Portland would get an outright grant of \$2,115,000 and the other \$9,450,000 would be a loan.

Terry Schunk, Portland mayor, estimated that some six million dollars could be realized by resale of land in the 83-acre project. This would be used to repay in part the federal loan.

Schunk said that under the plan, all substandard buildings would be torn down to provide space for new industry, business and apartment buildings. He estimated that such a project would attract 30 million dollars in new investments and create 10,000 new jobs.

The mayor said that if Portland doesn't accept the money some other city will, and added: "There are many requests for such money, and there's not enough available for all."

Father And Son Holdup Team Pleads Guilty

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (U.P.) — The father and son bank holdup team of Guy and Jerry Sheldy pleaded guilty in federal court Wednesday to charges of robbing three California banks.

Judge Sherrill Halbert set May 28 for sentencing.

Sheldy, 41, and his 18-year-old son were arrested Monday only 11 minutes after an \$18,000 robbery of the Fairfield, Calif., branch of the Bank of America. Police said they also admitted four other robberies—two in California and two in Utah.

Ysa Ysa Maintains She Was Slandered By Representative

WASHINGTON (U.P.) — Ysa Ysa Gabor says she'll sue Rep. Wayne Hays (D-Ohio) for slander if he repeats outside of Congress his remark that she "apparently is the most expensive courtesan since Madame De Pompadour."

Hays made the remark Wednesday during House debate on the foreign aid bill. He was referring to expensive gifts given to Miss Gabor by Lt. Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr., son of the Dominican Republic's strong man.

Speaking through a public relations firm, Miss Gabor a few hours later challenged Hays "to come out from behind the congressional walls of immunity and repeat his statement about me."

"Let him come out into the open, and I will sue him for his slanderous statements," she said. Miss Gabor is here to fill a night club engagement.

Declines Comment

There was no immediate comment from Hays.

The 29-year-old Trujillo, who is married and has six children, has given Miss Gabor a \$17,000 chinchilla coat and a car. Trujillo, in this country as a military student, also has given a car to actress Kim Novak.

Madame De Pompadour was a mistress to King Louis XV of France.

At another point, Hays said "I of course do not know what the quid pro quo (something in return) was for the \$17,000 coat or the \$8,000 automobile."

A dispatch from the Dominican Republic said newspapers there have printed nothing about young Trujillo and his Gabor-Novak gifts. The Dominican newspapers are under government control.

Jewish Congress Hits Appeasing President Nasser

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (U.P.) — The president of the American Jewish Congress said Thursday that what he termed kid-glove handling of President Nasser of Egypt may have prompted Egypt to foment rebellion and anti-American riots in Lebanon.

Dr. Israel Goldstein of New York said in a report to the AJC national convention that "Nasser's expansionist ambition, powered by a policy of playing off the East against the West," is the chief danger in the troubled Middle East.

"Once again," he said, "it becomes necessary to caution our State Department that the fruit of appeasement is usually bitter humiliation."

Switching to the home front, Goldstein accused Atty. Gen. Rogers of ignoring "recent outbreaks of violence and terrorism perpetrated upon Jewish houses of worship and community centers in several Southern states."

He called on Rogers to order an FBI investigation to determine whether bombings have broken federal laws and to prosecute any violators.

The report was a continuation of protests by the AJC convention against administration civil rights and Middle Eastern policies.
