President Okays Jet Transports For His Own Use

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower approved Wednesday the purchase of three high-speed jet transport planes for use by himself and other top government officials, perhaps by the end of the year.
The planes, which will cost five million dollars each, are Boeing 707 types. The White House said no such models have been produced as yet for commercial or government use.
James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said the Boeing Co. has promised delivery no later than early 1959, but may be able to make the planes available late this year.
In the case of travel by Eisenhower, the big jet transports would be used only on long flights — across country or intercontinental — to airports capable of handling such craft, which require long runways.
Eisenhower's current plane, Columbine III, is a propeller driven aircraft which he would continue to use on many trips.
Eisenhower's pilot, Col. William G. Draper, has just completed several weeks of jet transport training at Castle Air Force Base in California.

Boone succeeds Paul McKee, Portland, who resigned.

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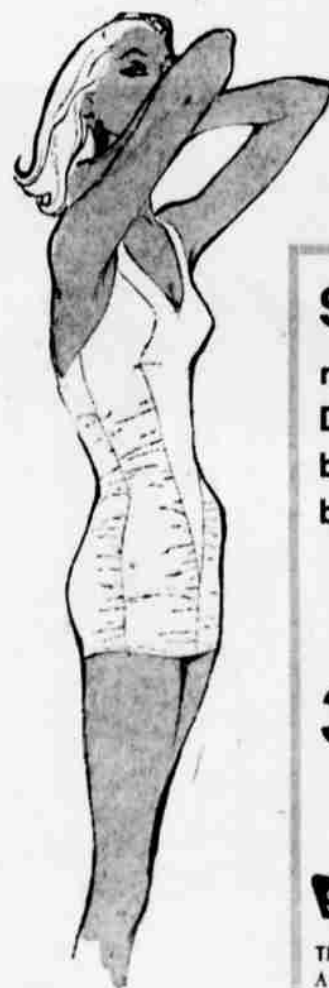
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
