MUST Starkweather 18

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP)—The father of mass killer Charles Starkweather testified Friday he does not believe his son was or is insane.

Defense attorneys have staked on the insanity plea their efforts to save the 19-year-old murder defendant from Nebraska's electric chair.

The father, Guy Starkweather, was called by the defense under subpoena.

"Do you think your son is crazy?" asked defense attorney T. Gaughan.

"He never done anything to act crazy to me," the stocky, mustachioed father replied. "He gave me no indication he was insane; no."

Asked whether the son exercised his knowledge of right and wrong during his murder tour, the father replied: "I don't think he used good judgment."

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Injured Officer Tells Of Fight

OAKBRIDGE, Ore. (AP)—A policeman lost his left leg under a train early Friday and he said a man he was chasing suddenly turned and forced him back onto the track.

The victim was William L. Riddle, 48, and had been on the force only a month and a half.

His leg was crushed under a car in the Southern Pacific yards and it was amputated, below the knee, at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

While still in shock, he told Police Chief Tom Garcia that he had been following a suspect through the yard when the man turned and fought with him.

Four shots were fired from Riddle's pistol, apparently in a call for help after he had dragged himself a block and a half from the accident scene.

Riddle's hometown is Canyonville.

Stan Terry Regains 91 Confiscated Pinballs

PORTLAND (AP)—Stan Terry, Portland, has regained 91 pinball machines taken from him in a raid last summer, police said Wednesday.

They say they had been unable to get a court order for destruction of the devices.

Terry's attorneys contended that Portland's anti-pinball ordinance does not provide for their destruction. A judge agreed.

Police said the machines were taken by truck to Vancouver, Wash.

Glendale Scouts Receive Awards, Present Program

Florence Johnson, Glendale school librarian, gave a report at the Glendale School Board meeting on how the library has been built up, its uses, and the various types of reading material and audio-visual aids included.

The board approved the purchase of a second-hand tractor for use in school ground maintenance, mainly for the pulling of a mower.

Teacher Hired
Duane Payne, of Astoria, was hired to serve as mathematics and driver training teacher and to act as head baseball coach and assistant basketball coach for 1958-59.

After some discussion, the board decided to write an educational philosophy for the Glendale public schools and also an athletic policy. The football and basketball games will be played on Friday and Saturday next year, and all other athletic contests are to be played on the same days if possible. There is not to be over two contests in any one sport in any given week.

Baseball will be confined to about 22 players, and the JV and varsity squads will be picked from these. Wrestling and track will continue to be included in the sports program.

Local bills were paid. The water easement papers for elementary school drainage across the Ed Johnson property were approved and signed by the board.

The next meeting will be May 21, at which time the bids on the school-owned Willis Street property will be opened. Bidders are cautioned to read the posted notices on this matter, according to correspondent Mrs. Gerald Fox.

Athletic Plan Proposed
Lawrence Gibson gave a proposed plan for a summer athletic program for boys of the community. He explained that the high school fields and the gym would be used, with the program to be worked out, according to the schedule in watering the fields. Present plans call for fifth and sixth graders to use the facilities in the morning for two hours before lunch, and for seventh and eighth grade students to use them for a couple of hours after lunch. The plan would apply to the students who are in those grades this year. The program will be for all boys, and there will be no team sports as such. Gibson is to have charge of the program.

COACH LOSES LEG
BANNING, Calif. (AP)—A high school football coach has lost the leg that was shattered by the blast of a shotgun in the hands of a student.
