

Norblad Doubles His Lead Over Opponent Hitchcock

Rep. Walter Norblad, faced with what appeared to be the fight of his political life, doubled the vote of Phil Hitchcock so fast in Friday night's counting that his victory was conceded by 10:30 p.m.

This stunning triumph of Oregon's only Republican member of Congress put him into the fall contest in the 1st District against Robert Y. Thornton, state's attorney general, who had no trouble at all in trimming Don Metheny, union farmer, more than 3 to 1.

The easy Thornton victory on the Democratic side was expected. Norblad's was not.

Hitchcock was a strong contender two years ago for the senatorial nomination, losing to Doug McKay in a strongly publicized contest. It was supposed he would give Norblad a tussle.

The 1st District was the one

with high interest, but the 3d District (Multnomah County) had a contest on the Republican side.

In a three-man race, the nod went to John Johnston who has met Edith Green before. She is the Democratic incumbent who was renominated without opposition.

The last time Johnston ran against her, however, he was a Democrat and he opposed her in the 1954 primary. Then he switched to Republican and Friday night's election was a far back.

In other congressional districts of the state there were no contests and the nominees are Rep. Al Ullman, Democrat, and Marion T. Weatherford, Republican, 2d District; Rep. Charles O. Porter, Democrat, and Paul Geddes, Republican, 4th District.

Roseburg Couple Suffers Injuries In Washington

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dunn of Garden Valley received word Friday their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kennedy, have been injured in a traffic accident in Washington.

Correspondent Addie Schneider reported that the Duns were contacted by Washington State Police. The mishap apparently occurred Friday morning near Tappanish. Extent of injuries suffered by the young couple was unknown. The Duns and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kennedy, Medford, parents of Kennedy, departed for Tappanish immediately.

The younger Kennedys reportedly plunged over a 36-foot embankment. They were en route to prepare for Kennedy's transfer from Oregon State College to Washington State College, where he planned to undertake training to become a veterinarian.

Tradition Remains Unbroken In Test

Mark Hatfield was chosen by Republicans Friday as the man they want to run for governor in the fall, and that continued an Oregon tradition that no state treasurer has ever advanced to the governorship.

Hatfield's astonishingly large margin over state Treasurer Sig Underwood—more than 3 to 2—kept alive the possibility that the secretary of state position sometimes leads to the governorship. The last man to do it was Earl Snell, who moved up in 1943.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes, in winning renomination, cut short any tradition-making on the Democratic side stemming from Gov. Charles Martin's day. Holmes is the state's first Democratic governor since Martin, and Martin was not able to win renomination in 1938 after his first term.

Holmes' 2 to 1 margin over Lew Wallace was a surprise in view of their close race two years ago when fewer than 4,000 votes separated them out of 220,000. Warren Gill, who ran third on the Republican side, was the only candidate to advocate a sales tax. He said early Saturday he doubted the vote indicated the people's views on the tax. He believes still, he said, that the state will have to accept it some day.

Zonta Plans Initial Golden Age Meeting

Mike Vasey, student Lions representative who will be graduating with the Roseburg High senior class this year, was accorded special recognition. Vic Bakala, expressing the sentiment of club members, said Vasey had proved one of the best student representatives the club has had in making his weekly reports on school activities.

Redstone Missile Firing Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The first attempt by a crew of GI missilemen to launch the Army's potent Redstone medium range ballistic weapon apparently was a success.

Indications were that the Redstone swept in on target without a hitch after it blasted into space at dusk Friday night.

The launching was conducted from start to finish for the first time by men from the Army's first operational ballistic missile outfit, the 40th Field Artillery Missile Group.

For the unit, this shoot was the climax of a year's training with the missile at Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, Ala.

It was reported unofficially that a Redstone unit may be based overseas before the end of July. The 63-foot Redstone, capable of carrying a nuclear warhead more than 250 miles with amazing accuracy, is in mass production at the Chrysler Corp. plant in Detroit.

A modified version of the reliable missile was the first stage vehicle for two successful explorer satellite launches.

Multnomah Co. Rebuffs Langley

PORTLAND (AP)—William Langley, the ousted district attorney, was rebuffed by Multnomah County's Democratic voters Friday as he sought to get back into office.

Langley ran for—but failed to get—the Democratic nomination for district attorney, the same office from which he was removed by court order after conviction on a charge of failing to prosecute gambling.

Two more charges are hanging over Langley as part of the Portland vice story which has been in the courts for two years. One says he tried to open up the town to gambling and the other accuses him of conspiring to receive a bribe.

In Friday's primary, the nomination went to Charles Raymond, a long-time aide under other district attorneys here, 3 to 2.

Republicans appeared to have nominated Don Walker to oppose him in the fall in this Democratic county, but Larry Landgraver was within striking distance in the mounting vote tally.

Kiwanians, Key Club Members To Go To Tye

Some 100 Kiwanians and Roseburg High School Club members are related to journey to Camp Tye on the Umpqua River near Tye Sunday to participate in the annual Kiwanis "cleanup day," in which the Camp Fire Girls' summer camp is ready for occupancy.

Ed Wyatt, chairman of the project, said the workers will meet at the camp, at 7:30 a.m. for a breakfast. 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time he beat Wallace better than 2 to 1.

In the six-man Republican race for governor, Hatfield, who entered politics only eight years ago while dean of students at Willamette University, won with surprising ease over State Treasurer Sig Underwood.

Unofficial returns from 2,480 of the state's 2,674 precincts gave:

Democratic—Holmes 120,645, Wallace, 55,093, and Multnomah County Assessor Wiley W. Smith 17,289.

Republican—Hatfield 98,965, Underwood 60,352, State Sen. Warren Gill 37,988. The other three candidates—Albert Eichman, George Livingston and Orval Raso—trailing far behind.

The size of Norblad's margin also was surprising, although he campaigned harder than at any time since he went to Congress 13 years ago.

In 731 of 740 precincts, Norblad beat former State Sen. Phil Hitchcock, 46,260 to 22,381.

In winning the Democratic nomination, Thornton defeated Don Metheny, Brooks onion grower, 38,029 to 12,414.

Thornton, a controversial figure because of his role as special prosecutor in the Portland vice investigation, is in the middle of his second term.

Only Republican
Norblad is the only Republican in Oregon's six-member delegation to Congress. The other three Democratic House members—Edith Green, Portland, Al Ullman, Baker, and Charles O. Porter, Eugene—won renomination unopposed.

In the only other congressional contest, John Johnston, Portland salesman and naval reservist, won the Republican nomination in the 2d District. He will oppose Mrs. Green in the fall.

Justice Rossman and Sloan will have their names on the November ballot without opposition, so their victories amounted to reelection.
