Another Aussie Smashes World Mark In The Mile

Texan Called Pace Setter

LOS ANGELES — Herb Elliott, the wonder from Down Under, has a world record mile run in the hopper Saturday but there's some doubt that he'll ever get it in the books.

The slender young Australian ran the distance in a stunning 3:57.8 in the Coliseum Relays Friday night, beating the recognized record held by fellow Aussie John Landy by two-tenths of a second.

But there was suspicion that the International Athletic Amateur Federation might cast a skeptical eye at Elliott's performance because of the pace-setting job done by an unheralded Texan runner, Drew Dunlap.

Dunlap, not even listed on the official program, jogged into the lead at the start and stayed there until just after the half-mile point — when he suddenly stepped out of the race.

Experts astonished Track experts said they were astonished that officials should even think of submitting Elliott's time for consideration.

But Referee Larry Moustion implied that's what will be done. And Percy Curatty, Elliott's coach, said firmly that his 20-year-old student's record should be sanctioned.

Elliott himself said he'd like to be recognized as the world record holder. Ibbotson ran a 3:57.2 last year, but the time has not been recognized — although it still could be — because of pacing.

Elliott, a 166-pounder was right on Dunlap's heels when the Texan finished a half mile in 2:00.5. The Aussie was clocked at 3:00.3 at the end of the third lap.

Lincoln Runs Second Another Australian, New Lincoln, ran second, but he was behind Elliott with a time of 4:01. This was the fourth time in his brief career that Elliott had run the mile in less than four minutes. He has never lost a mile race.

His time Friday night was the fastest ever recorded on American soil. The recognized U.S. record is 3:59.6, set by Australian Jim Bailey while attending the University of Oregon.

Oregon State got only four hits capitalized on four Husky errors and pitching wildness score twice as many runs as hits. The deciding tally was Bob Bertram's solo homer in the sixth inning.

It was Jones, a 32-year-old right-hander, who ended the Cards' losing streak at seven a week. And it was Sam who Friday night stopped a chance of another slump with a six-hitter that beat Los Angeles 2-0, with the help of Stan Musial's two-run homer.

It was the first Cardinal shutout of the year, and gave Jones his third straight victory for a 3-3 record. He walked but two, struck out nine while becoming the first St. Louis pitcher to get two complete-game victories.

Milwaukee retained first place, although stopped by rain at Cincinnati. The Chicago Cubs clipped second-place San Francisco 6-5, and Philadelphia knocked off third-place Pittsburgh 8-2.

Harry Anderson lined a two-run, inside-the-park homer in the first, and Stan Lopata belted a solo homer in the second against Pittsburgh's Bob Porterfield, now 1-1 in two NL starts after being sold by the Boston Red Sox. The Phils got two more in the third on Rip Repulski's triple.

A single by Lee Walls scored the clincher in a two-run ninth for the Cubs as Don Elston picked up a 5-0 record, all in relief. Willie Mays' two-run homer, his 10th and eighth in seven games, triggered a five-run Giants' sixth after Dale Long had doubled and homered for a 2-0 Cub lead.

In the pair of games, the situation was reversed from that of two weeks ago, when the two teams also split, as Dick Meredith threw a no-hitter and lost. This time it was Ron Beamer who came up with a perfect game and still lost.

The Indians took the five-inning opener behind Meredith 1-0, but lost the seven-inning nightcap by the same score, 1-0.

Don Wells and Beamer bagged the two hits given up lefthander Aris Akin in the first game. In the second contest it was Tribe third baseman, Ted Kolbert, belting out both blows by the Indians in the game. The first one, a double in the third chapter and the second a single in the fifth.

The one hit recorded by the coast nine in the games was in the second frame. Bulldog second baseman Jeff Allen connected for a single to pick up the only base knock off Meredith.

Late Rally In the first fray, it was a last minute inning rally for the Indians which gave them their win.

Hit Goes To Waste In the second game the Indians got going in the third as Kolbert lined out his double. Leroy Roberts and Hiney both struck out, and Wells tied out to set the Tribe down in that inning.

Again in the fifth stanza, the Tribe loaded the sacks as two men were on and one away when Kolbert singled. Again the Roseburg nine failed to score as the next two hitters were retired.

It was in the bottom of the fourth, the Bulldogs brought across the run which was to rob Beamer of no-no game. Colin Rush, the Bulldog shortstop was hit by one of Beamer's offerings. He stole second and advanced to third on a passed ball.

Pat Byrne, the North Bend catcher, then hit to the first baseman, Robert Byrne. Byrne was off with the crack of the bat and scored as the throw to the plate was late. Beamer fans 14.

Beamer pitched his usual fine ball and retired the first five men to face him on strikeouts. He went on to record 14 in the fray while walking one.

As all the meetings are behind closed doors, any bitterness in the discussions is not likely to show up in the official reports. The first of these is not due until Monday night, at the earliest. Sunday's session is a preliminary to the main event.

Although the nine faculty athletic representatives run the show and make the final decisions, athletic directors, head football coaches and head basketball coaches also will meet.
