50 feet from shore and some 50 to 75 yards downstream from the point where the youth last was seen, said police. Resuscitation attempts failed and the boy was pronounced dead by Powers about 7:35 p.m.

The victim is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Harding; two brothers, Steven Robert and John Michael; three sisters, Ethel Linda, Georgia Kay and Shelley Ann; paternal grandfather, Robert R. Harding, Roseburg, and maternal grandfather, Dee McKay, Riddle.

The youngster was born in Portland Jan. 18, 1945. The body was removed to The Chapel of the Roses, then moved to the Little Chapel of the Chimes, Portland, where funeral arrangements are being made.

Four Drown In Oregon, Washington Counts 7

Four Oregon teen-agers drowned in weekend fishing and swimming accidents as warm weather attracted thousands to cool rivers and streams.

Washington reported seven drownings, raising the total for the two states to 11.

The Oregon victims were Robert Milton Belsher, 17, Portland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton W. Belsher; David Phillip Reed, 15, Portland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Reed; Curtis Lee Wasser, 17, Goble, son of Columbia County Commissioner Louis J. Wasser; and Donald Keith Harding, 13, Portland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Harding.

Belsher drowned late Saturday in a crowded pool in the Benton-Lane Park, five miles north of Junction City. It was believed he struck his head while diving. An autopsy was ordered.

Trapped By Flood Water

Young Reed drowned in the Clackamas River when a surge of water released from an upstream dam trapped him and washed him downstream.

Wasser went under when he suffered a cramp while swimming in the "Coldwater River" near the Rainier-Longview Bridge.

Harding drowned when he stepped into a deep hole while wading in the South Umpqua River near Roseburg.

Trujillo Junior Denies Spending U. S. Aid Money

LOS ANGELES — Gift-giving Lt. Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr. says not one penny of his expenditures in this country came from U.S. foreign aid funds to his native Dominican Republic.

It was his first direct public comment on his widely discussed gifts of a \$5,400 sports car to actress Kim Novak and a \$10,000 strand of diamonds to actress Joan Collins.

The 29-year-old son of the Dominican Republic leader told a reporter last night. "To begin with, the mutual aid fund agreement between the United States and the Dominican Republic does not provide for the transfer of any cash. 'Every cent I have spent came from my own personal account.'"

"Not a penny came from the taxpayers of the United States. Not a penny came from the taxpayers of the Dominican Republic."

His free-spending ways have brought him under fire from U.S. congressmen.

Young Trujillo declined comment on reports that he is seeking a divorce in Mexico.

He came to this country to study military science at the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, Ft. Leavenworth, Kan. His wife and five of their six children accompanied him, but they have since returned to the Dominican Republic.

er" shouts were heard outside the hotel where he met the press.

Past Achievements Cited

At the outset, De Gaulle made it clear he felt that the present regime, encompassing many parties, could accomplish nothing.

De Gaulle said the powers of the republic seemed perfectly clear. He continued:

"I myself restored its arms, its laws, its name. I made the war for the victory of France and the victory of the Republic with all those who accepted to join me. At their head I re-established the Republic at home. In its name, for its account, in conformity with its genius, my government accomplished an enormous task of renovation."

He recalled that his provisional government after World War II gave French citizenship to Algerians and gave French women the vote.

He said that both Frenchmen and Moslems in Algeria had seen that Paris could not solve their problems.

The general appeared young for his 67 years.

The streets along which he drove to his hotel were quiet.

Some 36,000 security forces had taken stations at the vital points in Paris early Monday to put down any demonstration for or against the return of the 67-year-old wartime hero to power.

Alaska Statehood Bill Feared Facing Defeat

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Sam Rayburn was quoted Monday as expressing fear the Alaska statehood bill may be beaten when it comes up in the House later this week.

Rep. Clair Engle (D-Calif.) said Rayburn had advised him he believed the bill may be sent back to committee but the Californian added: "I don't think so myself."

re-election to another six-year term.

The United States over the weekend flew 18 huge Globemaster troop and cargo carriers to Europe, where they could be used to ferry arms to the Middle East or to evacuate Americans from Lebanon.

An Air Force spokesman at Frankfurt, Germany, said there were no orders for the plan yet.

CAIRO — Egypt's newspapers gave banner headline play Monday to Russia's warning to Western countries to keep out of Lebanon's crisis.

The newspaper Al Akhbar carried the story under a big red headline: "War If America Intervenes in Lebanese Crisis."

Al Akhbar's headline said: "Danger Hover's Over Lebanon."

The Soviet News Agency Tass said in a dispatch from Moscow Sunday said outside intervention in Lebanon could have serious consequences throughout the Middle East.

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
