

Two OSC Students Win Competition Entry

CORVALLIS — Two Oregon State College students have won first place in a Northwest district competition sponsored by the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

They are Myron Hurlbut, Klamath Falls, and Dale Elm, Lebanon. Their technical paper on magnetic amplifiers gives them \$100 plus an expense-paid trip to the national AIEE summer meeting in Buffalo, N. Y., in June.

At the meeting their paper will be entered in the national competition.

The Northwest district includes Alaska, British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Utah and Idaho.

Senator Kennedy Winds Up Tour Of State Monday

PORTLAND — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) wound up a two-day tour of Oregon Monday night with a speech to a standing-room-only audience at Portland State College.

The visit to Oregon included political speeches and conferences, several press conferences, and receptions at Portland, Salem and Eugene.

At Eugene, the 41-year-old senator, who is seen in some quarters

as a possible Democratic presidential nominee, said a man's religion is no bar to political office. Kennedy is a Catholic. He said he didn't think that would hurt his chances of becoming a presidential candidate. But he would not speculate on whether he would try for or get the nomination.

At Salem, he said that Vice President Nixon conducted himself well on his recent riot-torn

tour of South America and, because of this, Nixon stands a better chance of gaining the Republican presidential nomination.

At Portland, Kennedy discussed foreign affairs. He said that the greatest danger to this country is the Russian economic offensive.

And he said there were "disturbing signs that we, as a nation, may be intellectually and emotionally unprepared for the long test of endurance we surely face."

The senator left for Washington immediately after the talk at Portland State.

Man Arrested, Admits Stabbing Wife To Death

PORTLAND — Blood-spattered Harry William Braley, 36, was arrested Monday night as he was entering a tavern. Police said he had just fatally stabbed his wife.

The dead woman was Mrs. Judith Violet Braley, 42. The stabbing, which occurred before witnesses, climaxed a violent domestic quarrel.

Officers said he ran out of the rooming house, the scene of the stabbing, yelling at the landlady "now you can call the cops, if you want to."

The landlady did just that, and Braley was arrested a few minutes later.

Police said they recovered the knife from a tavern roof where they said Braley told them he had thrown it.

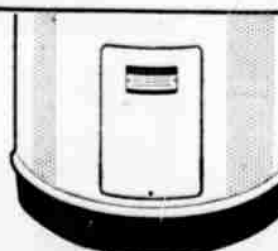
