Lowly Potato Holds High Place In Paris Crisis

PARIS — The lowly potato was the root of big trouble in Paris Tuesday.

To some Parisians it loomed more important than the political crisis.

"The situation is terrible," said Madame Grandjean. "It could mean revolution."

Mme. Grandjean cleans offices for a living and cooks potatoes for her family when she can find the spuds.

"My niece has her confirmation on Thursday," she wailed. "How can I possibly entertain relatives and friends when I can find no potatoes in Paris?"

The headline in the left wing newspaper Liberation was pitched in the same shrill note of protest, "Potatoes and The Defense of Liberty," it said.

The grave potato crisis was brought about by two factors, one political, the other economic.

For obvious reasons few, if any, new potatoes are arriving from strife-torn North African farms.

For less obvious but just as real reasons the French farmer at home is boycotting the Paris market.

Early this spring the government slapped a price ceiling of about 10 cents a pound on potatoes, a staple of the French diet. Demanding at least 22 cents a pound for his pommes de terre, the farmer is refusing to haul his new crop to the markets of Paris.

"It's awful," said Mme. Grandjean. "At the only places where potatoes are being sold this morning, there are long lines of housewives."

Student Killed Monday In Panama Demonstration

PANAMA — Students promised an orderly funeral today for a high school youth fatally injured in demonstrations against Panama's education minister.

Sixty-two persons were injured in the clash at Panama City's largest high school — 42 students, 18 guardsmen and two bystanders. Four students and five guardsmen who he said used the youths as were hospitalized.

President Ernesto de la Guardia Jr. blamed the clash Monday between the students and National Guardsmen on political opponents who he said used the youths as a shock force against his government. He agreed to meet tomorrow with student leaders to discuss their demand for removal of three guard commanders.
