Local Radio Announcer Tells How He Originated Parodies

Doug Setterberg didn't know when he banded about Scandinavia, but he has two commercial discs behind him and another to be released shortly. He forms one-half of a singing duet, the other being a Seattle friend, Stan Boreson. Setterberg describes the pair as "sort of a Swedish Homer and Jethro," with parodies of popular tunes their specialty.

Currently under contract with KRNR, Setterberg already has recorded parodies on "The Thing," a Phil Harris novelty of some years back, and with Boreson, "Honeycomb," a recent best-seller. The parodies were re-titled "The Swedish Thing" and "Telephone."

He Had Own Label
"The Swedish Thing," commented Setterberg, was recorded on his own, independent label. He said most of its sales came on the Pacific Coast, where it received fairly extensive play by disc jockeys.

"Scandinavian Hotshot," written by Setterberg and performed by Boreson, sold over 10,000 records about seven years ago, and related its composer. He said it sold well in the Northwest and in areas of heavy Scandinavian population such as Wisconsin and Minnesota. Soon to be released is the Setter-

berg-Boreson creation, "Catch a Pickled Herring." Its derivation is obvious.

Setterberg said he and Boreson had received Northwest circulation on several records they released while employed as announcers for Seattle radio stations before their recent affiliation with Kapp.

Commenting on the tricks of the trade, the Roseburg radio man related that much of the battle lies in guessing in advance which records will become hits.

Records in Seattle
"When something comes along that sounds like it would make good parody, like (Boreson and himself) added then, if it is a seller, lyrics are worked out and the spoof is recorded in a Seattle studio.

"Of course, we can't make a parody without first getting permission from the composer of the original tune," stressed Setterberg. Instrumental accompaniment for the parodies is furnished by a group led by Gene Boresecki, Seattle, who also handles instrumental arrangement.

Setterberg relates the following in telling of the importance of foresight in selecting likely hits: "We selected 'Honeycomb' as a possible parody subject when it was rated 56th by a national rating publication. It was 30th when we recorded the parody and had jumped to the top 10 by the time 'Telephone' was released.

"We were lucky on that one," he added.

17,000 Records Sold
Setterberg said the spoof had sold about 17,000 discs as of the end of January — not a bad figure for that type of record.

"In this particular field, you're probably a little more sure that you won't take a beating on sales of your releases, because people like to laugh," commented Setterberg. "But there'll probably never be a gold record (signifying sale of one million discs) made of a parody," he added.

Setterberg, a Roseburg resident since last September, said even better prospects loom in the future for the two "Swedes." He said Kapp has indicated it is interested in releasing a 12-inch long play album consisting of both old and new Setterberg-Boreson spoofs.

Russians Bring Dead Dog Back To Life In Test

MOSCOW — Six U.S. women doctors touring Russian medical institutions told this week of watching Soviet scientists bring a dead dog back to life.

They said this happened: The scientists drained the blood from the dog until he was dead. They waited five minutes, then revived the animal and it barked.

A similar experiment was reported last January in the magazine Ogonyok, which said the Soviet scientists brought back monkeys and dogs from death through artificial refrigeration. The magazine quoted Prof. V.A. Negovsky as saying dogs have been revived up to an hour after their hearts have stopped beating. There have been cases where humans have been revived five or six minutes after heart stoppage.

The U.S. women doctors do not say whether the refrigeration method was used in the experiment they observed.

Dr. Jean Henley of Columbia University said that what they had seen so far led her to believe the Russians had come along much faster in the medical field than the United States.

FALLS TO DEATH
