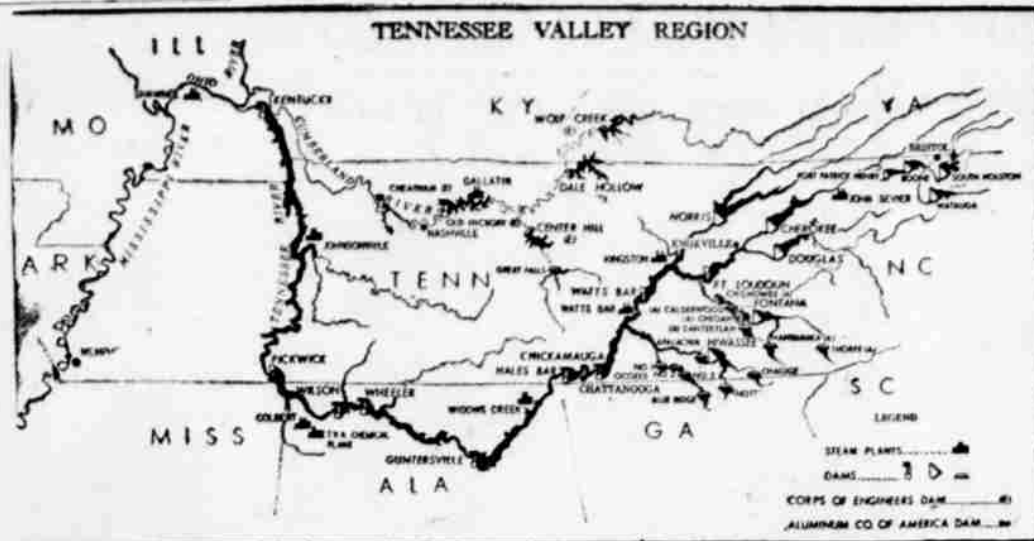

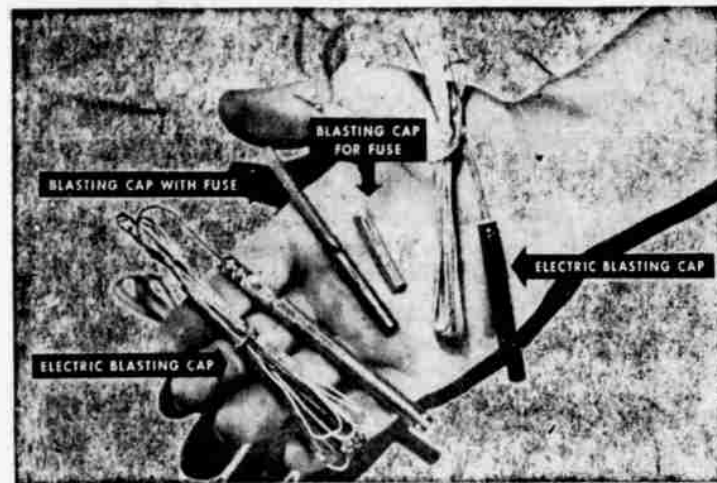

**Cement Worker's Death
Murder Trial Continues**

PORTLAND — The first degree murder trial of Harold R. Keith, 43, continued here Tuesday with selection of jurors. He is accused in the slaying of Robert E. Holloway, 44, a cement worker whose body was found on the lime-coated bottom of an abandoned well near Vernonia Dec. 19. Lee Allen Parker, 31, was convicted in the same case of second degree murder after a trial last month. Circuit Judge Frank Longman sentenced Parker to life in prison.

**Planned Assassin
Of Truman On Loose**

RALEIGH, N.Y. — Leroy Shadrick, 33-year-old former coal miner who boasted of trying robbery to finance an assassination attempt on former President Harry S. Truman, is on the loose again. Shadrick, Harlan, Ky., native, and four other inmates of the state hospital's ward for the criminally insane escaped last night by sawing a hole through a window screen.

**Supreme Court
Announces Action
On Four Appeals**

WASHINGTON — The following actions were taken this week by the U. S. Supreme Court:

Outlawed in a 6-3 decision a dual rate system of transportation charges used by scores of steamship operators groups. The system provides cheaper rates to shippers who sign an exclusive patronage contract. The Maritime Board approved the system but it was opposed by the Justice and Agriculture Departments. Called for arguments next fall on a California complaint that the state of Washington discriminates unreasonably against the sale of California wine.

In a case turning on the issue of double jeopardy, upheld 5-3 the conviction of William Hoag on an armed robbery charge in connection with a 1950 holdup of a Fairview, N.J., tavern. Hoag was accused of robbing three people at the tavern, tried and acquitted. He was put on trial again, accused of robbing a fourth person, was convicted and sentenced to 5 to 7 years.

Bus Transfer Upset

Set aside Interstate Commerce Commission authorization for the Pacific Greyhound Lines to turn over to a subsidiary, the Golden Gate Transit Lines, its bus service between San Francisco and a surrounding 30-mile area without state authorization. Threw out the contempt of Congress conviction of Harry Sacher, New York attorney in communist cause. The contempt charge was based on Sacher's refusal to answer questions put to him in 1955 by two members of the Senate Internal Security subcommittee. The high court held that questions about communist affiliations were "not clearly pertinent" to the subject matter the two senators were authorized to investigate. It was an unsigned opinion to which Justices Clark and Whitaker dissented.

BUSINESS ACTIVITY UP

SEATTLE — Business activity in Washington rose 5.2 per cent last year, one tenth of one per cent above the national average, the University of Washington Bureau of Business Research said here.

Oregon, hit hard by the lumber slump, gained only one half of one per cent.

**Pocket-Size Transistor
Radio New Police Aid**

NEW YORK — Within a month, foot patrolmen in Central Park will have pocket-size transistor radios to help in a new drive on crime. At first, receiving sets only will be issued to these officers. If experiments prove successful, tiny radio transmitters will be provided for two-way communication. The receiver weighs only nine ounces and can be carried in a case affixed to a patrolman's belt.

**Bus Strike In London
Goes Into Third Week**

LONDON — London's bus strike moved into its third week Monday and the meat strike started its second. There was no sign of a settlement in either. The butchers just cut out the trucker middlemen in the strikebound wholesale market, brought in their own supplies and kept London's shops well stocked. As for the buses, Londoners had settled into their own emergency transport arrangements by this stage.

**Holmes Claims
Law Enforcement
Cut Accidents**

SALEM — Increased law enforcement reduced Oregon's traffic accidents 16 per cent in the first three months of this year, Gov. Robert D. Holmes said Tuesday.

The statement was given by the governor at the national governors conference in Miami, Fla.

The comparison was with the first quarter of 1937. "The downturn in accident rates," the governor said, "began with my request to police agencies to issue court citations for all violations. The number of state police arrests in the first quarter went up nearly 60 per cent, and the number of rural accidents in the area they patrol went down nearly 20 per cent."

"A general increase in citations, license suspensions and warning letters is apparently getting results, and the results are leading to public acceptance of the program."
