

Milton Eisenhower Designated Honor Of Father Of Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Milton S. Eisenhower was named father of the year Thursday and promptly got congratulations from the President of the United States, his brother, Milton Eisenhower, president of Johns Hopkins University, was chosen by the national Father's Day Committee along with six other fathers outstanding in the fields of sports, entertainment and the arts, Sunday, June 15, has been designated Father's Day.

The President sent the committee a letter to read at the ceremony saying he was "delighted" and commenting, "It is difficult to picture one's youngest brother as the 'father of the year'."

Cites Devotion

He added: "In my opinion his devotion to his own children, together with his contribution to all the splendid college students he has helped develop over the years, more than put Milton in the class of outstanding fathers." Milton Eisenhower has two children, a boy and girl, both in college.

Other fathers honored were: Victor Borge, television, who has five children; Walter Cronkite, radio, two children; Peter Ustinov, stage, two children; Martin Mayer, literary, one child; Sugar Ray Robinson, sports, two children; and Eddie Fisher, music, two children.

The committee, now celebrating its 23rd award year, made a "grandfather of the year" award which went to screen star Walter Brennan; a "woman of the year" award to actress Helen Hayes; and a "husband and wife team of the year" award to Howard Duff and Ida Lupino.

Outbreak Of Head Lice Depletes Remedy Stock

PORTLAND (AP) — An outbreak of head lice has all but depleted druggists' stocks of medication in Portland.

City and county health authorities differed, however, on how widespread the outbreak is.

No one has kept statistics, but Dr. F. Sydney Hanse, county health officer, said thousands of school children have been infested since the outbreak began in February. He said it was spreading to hundreds of new children each day.

Dr. Thomas L. Meador, city health officer, said there were some lice but more hysteria. He said many people are mistaking dandruff for nits (lice eggs).

Meanwhile the druggists are nearly out of medication, and doctors are augmenting their remaining stocks with advice for parents to use vinegar or a mixture of kerosene and olive oil on children's heads.

No disease is involved. The medical authorities said head lice are not known to be carriers of any disease.

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Higher Grocery Costs Lift Cost Of Living Index To New Record Peak In April

WASHINGTON (AP) — Another record high in housewives' grocery costs sent the government's living cost index to a new peak in April.

Officials who announced the new rise Thursday had some good news for consumers, however. They said some food prices are declining in May and that the over-all living cost level seems to be "peaking out," or reaching a somewhat stable level for the summer months.

Evan Clague, Labor Department statistics commissioner, told a news conference that "in a broad general way I'd say the index has shot its bolt — there's no question about it, the big rises are now over."

The government index rose two-tenths of one per cent between March and April, reaching 123.5 per cent of the 1947-49 base period.

The past 20 months, it has declined only once in the past 28 months, despite the business recession.

The new living cost rise means a pay increase to about half a million workers based on labor contracts geared partly to changes in the government index. Most of the workers will receive boosts on June payrolls of about two or three cents an hour. Some will get as high as five cents an hour additional.

An additional 750,000 workers would normally receive living cost pay adjustments based on the April index increase. This includes employees of the major auto companies. Labor contracts for these workers are expiring at the end of this month.

The automatic raises go to workers in the aircraft and electrical manufacturing industries.
