There will be a water skiers' display, Indian war dances, fireworks and selection of a rodeo queen. Some 500 visitors are expected for the event.

Premiums Offered For 19th Annual Fat Lamb Show

Premiums up to \$50 are being offered this year during the 19th annual Douglas County Fat Lamb Show scheduled for June 14 at the fairgrounds in Roseburg.

Sponsored by the Douglas County Livestock Assn., the program will feature a lamb barbecue served by the Umpqua Lions Club, sheep judging contests for 4-H and FFA members, and a sheep dog contest, according to Wayne Mosher, secretary.

Kenneth McRae of Monmouth has been secured to act as judge of the exhibits, it was announced. All entries must be entered and in pens by 10 a.m. the day of the show.

In the open division, top premium for a pen of five will bring \$50; second place \$40; third place \$30; fourth \$20; and fifth place \$15. Growers whose lambs place sixth through 15th will receive \$10 premiums.

Single lambs in the open and junior divisions will bring top money of \$15, sliding down to \$5 premiums for the last five of 10 places judged. The best working sheep dog will win \$20 for his owner. Second place receives \$15, third \$10 and fourth place \$5.

Premiums run from one dollar to \$7 for winning 4-H and Future Farmers of America in the judging contest for enrolled members. Youth have an opportunity to judge one or two classes of fat lambs, compare two or three pens and judge a class of wool. Ribbons are to be awarded 4-H members exhibiting lambs in a showmanship contest, the committee announced.

Finally, special \$12.50 special awards will be offered by the Willamette Valley Ram Sale committee for the champion pen of lambs and the champion fat lamb.

New Regional Civil Defense Setup Planned

VANCOUVER, B.C. — Establishment of a new regional civil defense setup with headquarters at Walla Walla, Wash., is being considered by the federal government, an American official reported here Wednesday.

Dr. Paul A. Lindquist of Battle Creek, Mich., an assistant director of the federal Civil Defense Administration, said the proposed new region would include Oregon, Idaho, Washington, Montana and Alaska.

It would be detached from a present region which includes the entire West.

Dr. Lindquist met here with delegates attending the western branch of the American Public Health Assn. to assist in organizing a civil defense section of the organization.

Columbia River Rises Above Flood Stage

PORTLAND — The Columbia River rose 6 inches above flood stage at Vancouver, Wash., Wednesday morning. This started the usual flooding of undiked lowlands and evacuation of some low docks.

Damage was insignificant.

At Portland, the flooding Columbia had backed up the Willamette River to 15.8 feet. That is 2.2 feet below flood stage.

Elmer Fisher, river forecaster for the U.S. Weather Bureau, said a flood crest of 18 to 21 feet can be expected in the Portland-Vancouver area within the next week to 10 days. This is above average for the spring runoff, he said.

Report On Morningside Will Be Made Public

WASHINGTON — The report of a congressional probe into the operation of the Morningside Hospital in Portland, Ore., will be made public May 28.

The report was approved by the House Government Operations Subcommittee, which investigated the hospital last year.

Hearings of the hospital's operations were probed at the hearings in Portland. The hospital has held federal contracts several years for care of insane persons from Alaska.

Alaskan Statehood Backers Survive Test

WASHINGTON — Alaskan statehood advocates survived a first-round test of strength Wednesday and succeeded in bringing the admission bill before the House for action.

The House agreed by a vote of 217 to 172 to take up the Alaska bill after House Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) rejected a contention by opponents that the bill could not properly be brought before the House as a privileged measure.

Voting to consider the bill were 130 Democrats and 84 Republicans. Against consideration were 72 Democrats and 100 Republicans.

Points of order against the bill were raised by Reps. Clarence Cannon (D-Mo.), John Taber (R-N.Y.) and Howard W. Smith (D-Va.), together representing some 98 years House experience.

Basis of their contention was that the bill violated the privilege under which it was brought to the floor without rules committee sanction.

Family Of Girl Killed By Lion Plans To Sue

WASHINGTON — The family of the 2½-year-old girl killed by a lion in Washington's Zoo plans to file suit.

"We feel we should go through some sort of legal procedure," said Mrs. Harry Jackson, grandmother of Julie Ann Vogt, of Chilliwick, B.C.

"Nothing will do us any good, but it will make this zoo and all zoos safe for little children."

Since the lion seized and killed Julie Ann last Friday, a child-proof wire mesh has been installed along a guard rail six feet from the cage. Julie apparently crawled through the guard railing and went up to the cage while visiting the zoo with her grandfather.
