Crane To Help Fight \$750,000 Damage Suit

LOS ANGELES — The father of Lana Turner's 14-year-old daughter has joined the actress in asking Superior Court to dismiss a \$750,000 damage suit in connection with the death of Johnny Stompanato.

Stompanato, onetime gambler's bodyguard and Miss Turner's boy friend, was fatally stabbed by the daughter Cheryl April 4 when he threatened her mother.

Restaurant owner Steve Crane, whose marriage to Miss Turner ended in divorce in 1943, stated in his petition filed here that the damage suit could not apply to him. He said he was not involved in the slaying.

The suit was brought by television producer Jack Harris, a guardian of Stompanato's 10-year-old son John III.

Jupiter Flight Called Greatest Break-Through

WASHINGTON — Assistant Secretary of the Army Dewey Short Friday described last Sunday's 1,600-mile flight of the Army's Jupiter missile and recovery of its nose cone as "the greatest break-through yet in missile development."

Appearing before the House Armed Services Committee which he formerly headed as a Republican congressman from Missouri, Short told his one-time colleagues: "The performance of the Jupiter demonstrates that we have thrust, accuracy and the ability to bring a warhead back from outer space on target."

"It is the greatest break-through yet. It is more significant than all the Sputniks, Explorers and other developments put together."

"And what's more, we did it on a shoestring," Short went on, suggesting that more money should be allotted for a weapon that has demonstrated its value.

Departure From Testimony
The comment on the Jupiter performance was a departure from Short's prepared testimony in a hearing on proposals for military construction in the year starting July 1.

"We should concentrate on weapons for defense," Short said. "In the Jupiter we've got it. We've got something we can depend upon. The Jupiter is by far the most reliable and functional missile yet developed."

In his formal testimony Short supported the \$347,028,000 in new authorizations in military public works for the coming fiscal year.

The total is divided into \$239,959,000 for the continental United States; \$82,069,000 overseas; and 25 million for unforeseen requirements.

Graham Urges His Listeners To Slay Giants

SAN FRANCISCO — Evangelist Billy Graham urged listeners at the Cow Palace Thursday night to slay their giants, just as David killed Goliath.

The giants, he declared, are "communism, the H-bomb, racial discrimination, moral deterioration and the deterioration of our foreign policy."

Graham gave a sermon dedicated to youth before an overflow audience of 17,000.

As in previous crusade sermons, Graham was critical of President Eisenhower's foreign policy and noted former President Truman's warning "that even today we stand on the precipice of one of the greatest disasters our nation has ever seen."

The giants that youth face, the evangelist said, are "jealousy, disobedience, carelessness, sex and the temptation of conformity." To slay the giants, he said, youth can use five "stones"—faith, respect, devotional life, humility and preparedness.

The organized church also has its giants, Graham said. He listed them as indifference, hypocrisy and fear.

Movie-Television Link Experiment Is Failure

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. — Promoters of an experiment linking movies and television — considered by many as a form of pay TV — have conceded defeat.

Video Independent Theaters, Inc., of Oklahoma City will discontinue its telemovies in Bartlesville June 6.

Video President Henry Griffing said he still has faith in the idea of piping first-run movies into homes and showing them over closed circuit TV.

"We just happened to be premature," he said.

Video, a chain theater firm, has sustained heavy financial losses in the operation, he said.

Coast Guard Saves Life Of Mired Clam Digger

BAYONNE, N. J. — The Coast Guard, which has a proud history of sea rescue, saved a man's life on land Friday.

A 61-year-old clam digger, Andrew Lukac of Bayonne, became mired in the mud of New Jersey's tidal flats. Rescuers tried to free him but the mud was too soft to get a footing. He sank deeper.

When the mud got to his waist, officers at the naval supply depot nearby called the Coast Guard. A helicopter from Floyd Bennett Field across the bay in Brooklyn whirled to the rescue. With Lukac down to his armpits and still sinking, the helicopter hovered at 10 feet, lowered a sling and slowly hoisted him out.

Bookmobile Total Higher This Year At Lookingglass

A total of 2,348 books were loaned to students in Lookingglass School during last year's 16 trips made by the bookmobile.

The number was raised to 2,762 so far this year with 14 trips. Two of the trips the current year fell on a holiday and on another day when the attendance was at a record low due to an epidemic of childhood diseases.

A few adults have taken advantage of the service of the bookmobile, but the patronage is mainly confined to the children. Enrollment in the school for the current year has been increasing since the opening date. At that time there were 82 pupils enrolled. During the year new children have enrolled, so there are 95 now on the rolls.
